





Fr. Charles Klocke

The only priest stationed on the Illinois Central Railroad from Effingham to Cairo, he attended the missions of Pinckneyville, DeSoto, Dubois, Radom, Centralia, Odin and Sandoval, he preached in German and English. He served St. Mary's from August 2 until November 15, 1868.

Fr. Philip Becker



Born in Jacksonville, Ill., on May 15, 1856, he was assigned to St. Mary's parish following his ordination on July 29, 1881 by Bishop Joseph Baltes. He was described in one account as a "forcible and eloquent speaker, an extensive reader and a close oberver." He served St. Mary's parish from September 25, 1881 until January 26, 1896. See page 29.

Fr. Otto Meier

Served St. Mary's from April 6, 1896 until Aug. 18, 1903. One parishioner described him as "warmhearted, lovable and devout, a hard worker and a very practical economist.'



rank Francois graduated from St. Mary's School in about 1899. Frank and Phoebe had six children, all of whom attended and graduated from St. Mary's and were also married there. Of their 20 grandchildren, 12 graduated from St. Mary's. Five great-grandchildren have graduated from St. Mary's and at present there is one great-great-grandchild attending St. Mary's. Two greatgrandchildren were married at the church. Dean and Kathryn celebrated their 60th anniversary at St. Mary's ... what a happy time. Our collective memories of St. Mary's was and is a place of memories, some sad, but mostly happy occasions of our Catholic faith, recalls Mrs. François.

Fr. John H. Bruns

Fr. Bruns was born near Borken, Prussia, on June 30, 1870. In the days of his boyhood, his parents and the rest of the family emigrated to America, and settled near Pinckneyville, Perry County, Ill. He was ordained to the priesthood on June 16, 1895. For eight years he



was assistant at the Cathedral in Belleville, before coming to Centralia. Father Bruns was instrumental in realizing a longtime vision of establishing a hospital in Centralia. Served from Aug. 23, 1903 until Oct. 12, 1919. "Charity loves man for God's sake," Fr. Bruns once said. "Charity tells us to see in our neighbor, the child of God. Hence, if we love the Father, we must also love His children. Charity is universal, not national, racial, or sectarian."

Fr. Emil M. Chuse

When war was first declared in April 1917, the National Catholic War Council was formed "in order to promote spiritual and temporal well-being for the men in the armed forces." To do this, it provided chaplains. Among those serving from the Belleville diocese was Fr. Emil Michael Chuse, who would serve St. Mary's in Centralia from Nov. 2, 1919 until April 6, 1922.

Fr. Eugene Fix

Fr. Fix was born at Belleville, the son of Joseph and Theresa (Zimmerman) Fix. He graduated from Quincy College and Kendrick Seminary in St. Louis. He was ordained in Belleville on Dec. 21, 1918, b the Most Rev. Henry Althoff, D.D., Bishop of Belleville.



He came to Centralia on June 23, 1932, as pastor of St. Mary's Before coming to Centralia, he was assistant pastor at St. Dominick's Church in Breese, pastor of St. Henry's Church in East St. Louis, pastor of St. Leo's Church in Modoc and St. Mary's Church in Harrisburg.

Rev. Father Fix was a fourth degree Knight of Columbus, secretary of the Aviston Deanery Conference and past secretary of the clergy aid.

Father Fix observed his 25th year in the ministry in 1944 and was honored at a silver anniversary Solemn High Mass on Jan. 5 that year at the church. He was also honored at a banquet attended by about 50 priests of the area.

Fr. Fix died June 9, 1953, still officially the pastor of St. Mary's, although he had been in failing health for about 2 years. He was survived at the time of his death by his mother and a brother, Hugo Fix of Belleville.

Fr. Fred M. Halbig

Fr. Halbig was the son of Bernard and Mary Halbig and was born at Mt. Carmel on Sept. 3, 1906. He attended St. Mary's parochial school there and attended high school and college at Jasper College and St. Meinrad Preparatory Seminary. He studied philosophy and theology at Kenrick Seminary in St. Louis.



Fr. Halbig was ordained by the Most Rev. Henry Althoff, D.D., on June 7, 1931, at St. Peter's Cathedral in Belleville. He said his first Mass at St. Mary's Church, Mt. Carmel. Fr. Halbig served as assistant professor at four churches early in his career, St. Elizabeth's, St. Patrick's and Sacred Heart, all in East St. Louis, and St. Luke's in Belleville.

For a brief time he was administrator of St. Francis Church in Carbondale and then was appointed pastor of St. Patrick's Church in Enfield in 1936. He was there until 1941, when he became a chaplain of the Civilian Conservation Corps in the sixth corps area of Southern Illinois for five months. He became pastor of St. Ann's Parish in Nashville before assignment to St. Mary's in August of 1953. following the death of Fr. Fix Aug. 8, 1956

On April 1, 1956, Fr. Halbig celebrated his silver jubilee as a priest. Shortly afterward, he departed on a trip through several European countries. When he returned he was ill and for a time was hospitalized at East St. Louis, where he underwent an operation. Only 49 years of age, he departed this life on Aug. 7, 1956, at St. Mary's Hospital.

Fr. Alphonse Bernard Schomaker

Born the son of Martin and Theresa (Brockhoff) Schomaker of Damiansville, he was educated at St. Meinrad Prepatory Seminary at St. Meinrad, Ind., and Kenrick Seminary Webster Groves, Mo. He was ordained to the priesthood by the Most Rev. Henry J. Althoff in St. Peter's Cathedral in Belleville



on June 10, 1934. He served as assistant pastor at St. Mary's and was later assigned to the parish as full time pastor following Fr. Halbig's death in August 1956. Fr. Schomaker served the parish until his death in 1969.

Fr. Dennis F. Voss

Fr. Voss was born May 30, 1938 in Germantown, son of Lawrence B. and Marie (Schomaker) Voss. He attended St. Boniface Grade School in Germantown and St. Henrys Preparatory Seminary in Belleville. He went on to study at St. Mary of the Lake Seminary in Mundelein. He was ordained to the priesthood on May 16, 1964 at St. Boniface Church in Germantown.

Fr. Gerald C. Miriani

Fr. Gerald C. Miriani celebrated 25 years of priesthood in 1987. He was ordained on June 2, 1962, by Bishop Albert R. Zuroweste at St. Peter Cathedral in Belleville. Fr. Miriani was born in Herrin on March 7, 1935, the only child of Lena and Mike Miriani.



Fr. Miriani spent one year at St. Henry's Preparatory Seminary studying Latin and Greek and then entered the major seminary at St. Meinrad Archabbey, St. Meinrad, Ind. After finishing his undergraduate work in philosophy and secondary education, he continued for four additional years of Theological Studies at St. Meinrad

Seminary.

After ordination, he served as associate pstor of St. Patrick's Church in East St. Louis, St. Cyril in Edgemont and St. Teresa in Belleville. During these years as associate pastor, he also served as a part-time instructor at St. Theresa Academy in East St. Louis and Notre Dame High Academy and Althoff High School in Belleville. He then returned to St. Meinrad for further studies and began to work full time at Gibault in Waterloo. From Waterloo, he moved to Mater Dei High School in Breese, where he worked for eight years, until 1977 when he came to Centralia to serve as pastor of St. Mary's. He served here until 1988.



Fr. James Dougherty

Born in Cairo, Illinois, Oct. 8, 1942, the son of John and Stephanie (Flamm) Dougherty, Fr. Dougherty studied at St. Henry Seminary, Belleville, and at St. Meinrad Seminary in Indiana. He was ordained June 1, 1968. Among his career duties, he has served as associate pastor at St. Joseph in Olney and

Holy Childhood in Mascoutah; chaplain of St. Joseph Hospital Murphysboro, St. Mary's Hospital in Centralia: pastor of St. Edward's in Fairfield, St. Joseph in lebanon, and is currently at St. Mary in Trenton. He served as assistant pastor at St. Mary's Church in Centralia and chaplain at the hospital from 1973 to 1975. He later served as the full time pastor of St. Mary's from 1988 until 1998. Many parishioners fondly recall Fr. Dougherty and his mother from their years here.

Fr. David Darin

Fr. David Darin, a native Centralian, was assigned as the new pastor at St. Mary's Catholic Church in July, 1998.

The son of Danny and Mary Darin of Centralia, he is a 1978graduate of St. Mary's School, a 1982 graduate of Centralia High School, a 1984 gradu-

ate of Kaskaskia College, a 1986 graduate of College of St. Thomas in St. Paul, Minn., earning a bachelor of arts in communications degree, and a 1991 graduate of the University of St. Mary of the Lake in Mundelein, earning a master of divinity.

Before attending the University of St. Mary of the Lake, he took a year off from school and worked for his parents at their family restaurant, Pinky's in Central

His first assignment was assistant pastor at St. Peter's Cathedral in Belleville, where he served for four years. He next was pastor at St. Agatha in New Athens for three years before being assigned to the Centralia parish.

Darin succeeded Fr. James Dougherty, who was pastor of St. Mary's when Darin celebrated his first Mass as a priest on June 2, 1991, the day after he was ordained in Belleville.

Darin spearheaded the many activities surrounding the parish's sesquicentennial observation before being assigned as pastor of St. Luke and St. Teresa parishes in Belleville in July 2007.

He entered seminary and was ordained on July 15, 1995, by Most Rev Dr Albert Kanene Obiefuna, then Archbishop of Onitsha. His brother priest, Fr. Justin, is from the same diocese in Nigeria.

The Rev. Fr. Justin Obunike Olisaemeka was born on July 15, 1972, to the family of Frederick and Veronica Olisaemeka in Anambra State, Nigeria, Africa. He entered seminary at the age of 12 and was ordained a Catholic Priest for the Arhchdiocese of Onitsha, Nigeria, on Aug. 4, 2001. He left seminary work for mission work in the United States in May of 2007.

HISTORY OF ST. MARY'S PARISH

n the decade prior to this nation's great Civil War, the Illinois Central Railroad cut a path through the Prairie State and in doing so, founded and named the town of Centralia in 1853.


Scattered among the settlers brought here by the Illinois Central construction was a group of Catholics. Because of their small number, the spiritual needs of this infant flock were ministered by visiting priests, and not by a resident pastor. From extant record we find that prominent among these early missionary priests was Father Rudolph Heimerling, who made regular trips from nearby Shoal Creek, now Germantown, to minister to the needs of Centralia's Catholics. It was he who later became the first resident priest in Centralia.

Familiar to many present day members of our parish are the names of the early Catholic immigrants who followed the construction of the railroad. Among others, the following were the early Catholic settlers in our city— Thomas Cummings,

The original church cost nearly \$1,000 and could seat about 100 people.

Daniel Delaney, Frank Dowd, Joseph Doyle, Martin Dwyer, John Jacob Egger, Jacob Garnier, Michael Gleeson, John Graney, William Green, Thomas Green, Sam Thompson, Thomas Whalen, Fredolin Spinner, Terrance Byrnes, Wm. Casson, Jacob Oswald, Nicholas Scheriger, Dennis Driscoll, Thomas Dougherty, Henry Vogt, Wendelin Spinner, Andrew Schoening, John Kaney, Henry Merkel, John Pendergrast, John Zick, Conrad Bills, John Hold, Edward O'Conner, John Marsh, Joseph Friant, Louis Thouveneau and John Hediger.

Since there was no Catholic Church in Centralia during these early years, Father Heimerling

celebrated Holy Mass in the homes of the native Catholics. Records show that the Holy Sacrifice was frequently offered in the homes of William Green in nearly Central City and in the home of John Graney in Centralia.

During the administration of Father Heimerling, lots 9 and 10 in block 17 of the Original Town of Centralia were acquired. The first Church, a simple frame structure, was built on lot number 9 and was dedicated to Our Lady under the title of the Assumption. It was this church which for many years served the needs of the faithful of Centralia and Central City. It had a seating capacity of 100, and stood on the site where the rectory later stood for many years. The cost of the building was about \$1,000. To this original structure a belfry was added in 1879. This modest building also served as a school for the parish from 1892 to 1899, when it was sold.

The site of the present church, lot number 10, became parish property in 1859. As the parish grew in size, more parochial property became imperative. Accordingly, lots number 1.

2, 3 and 4 on the east side of the same block were acquired. They are occupied by the school, convent, playground and rental property today (1957). Lot number 8 was also acquired and is at present occupied by the custodian's home.

On the east side of block 17, St. Mary's hold title to all lots with the exception of lot 45. All of these are now devoted to the school, recreational facilities and the Sisters' home.

The first recorded baptism is that of Sophie Rein-

hardt on Oct. 1857. administered bv Father Heimerling. The first death in the parish occurred on Dec. 27, 1857. The first recorded marriage was that of


Matthew O'Brien and Anna Mason on Aug. 16, 1858.

It was not long, however, before the original church provided inadequate. The steadily growing parish demanded better and larger facilities. On Sept. 28, 1896,

during the pastorate of Father Phillip J. Becker, the cornerstone for the new church was laid. The humble frame church, which had served the parish so faithfully for so many years, now gave way to an imposing brick church better suited to the needs of the expanding parish. The new gothic structure measured 111 by 41 feet. It accommodated some 400 parishioners and was constructed for about \$30,000.

The debt incurred by the necessity of the new church

we ighed heavily on the struggling parish. However, through the zealous and tireless efforts of Father Otto Meier, who served St. Mary's as pastor from 1896 to 1903, the

1907. Finally, a new pipe organ was obtained for about \$1,500 in 1916.

An assistant pastor was appointed to Centralia when the hospital facilities were enlarged during the pastorate of Father Chuse and Eschmann. He also assumed responsibility of the two missions of Salem and Kinmundy, which were attached to St. Mary's. These missions were cared for by Centralia's assistant pastors until 1940, when the first resident pastor was appointed to Salem, who then assumed the care of the mission at Kinmundy.

The oil boom of the 1940s brought another wave of parishioners to the church.

A significant note in our history is that many early members of St. Mary's parish were immigrants. The flourishing mining industry was especially instrumental in bringing many Italians, Polish, Lithuanian and other European nationalities to our area. They settled, to a great extent, in Glenridge, then a part of our parish, and in Wamac.


Influential, too, on the history of St. Mary's Parish was the discovery of oil in and around Centralia. Oil was first produced in our midst in commercial quantities in 1936, and hit its peak in 1941-42. The oil industry brought many people to Centralia, from virtually every state in the union, but especially from the South and Southwestern part of the country. Among them were many fine Catholics who swelled the membership of our parish. Many are still among us today.

Dear to the heart of the faithful of St. Mary's is their love and devotion to the Blessed Mother. Ever mindful of her powerful intercession before the throne of her divine Son, it is a common and pleasing experience to see them kneel before her image.


Their loyal devotion to Mary culminated in the inauguration of the devotion to Our Mother of Per-

Among extensive many the improvements made by him were the complete water proofing of the church's exterior, and the replacing of the slate shingles of the lofty and beautiful spire of the church with copper sheathing. He also refurthe bished interior, enlarged the sanctuary remodeled the altars and put in padded kneelers for the comfort of the people.

When Father Fred Halbig was named pastor of St. Mary's in 1953, the church was again in need of extensive repair. Therefore, he immediately undertook the task of renovating the church and rectory. Because of the ever increasing needs of the parish, the balcony of the church was extended to provide additional seating facilities.

Father Emil Chuse served as a U.S. Army chaplain during World War I.

New pews were obtained; old altars were the replaced; new lighting was installed; and the entire interior of the church was refinished and redecorated in attractive colors. And hidden away in the basement of the church, making its presence felt only in the cold of winter and the heat of summer, is the new heating plant and an air conditioning system capable of producing the comfort of a 100-ton unit. This renovated edifice stands today as a

living memorial to the loyalty and cooperation of her faithful.

The rectory, too, was completely remodeled. In 1951, Father Fix initiated the work, adding additional facilities to the old building. Father Halbig completed the entire work of renovation in 1956.

During the pastoral care of Father Fred Halbig, 1953 to 1956, more renovations took place. Because of the need for additional seating, the balcony of the church was extended. This also allowed the organ to be expanded. New pews were given by the Knights of Columbus Council. A new main altar and side altars were a gift from the parish Altar Society. New lighting in the Gothic theme was installed, a gift from the Catholic Daughters of the Americas Court. The entire interior of the church was redecorated. The most outstanding addition to the structure of the church was the large art glass window



over the entrance depicting Our Lady of the Assumption. All other art glass windows were re-leaded and reinforced. Large murals were affixed to the walls above the side altars and in the baptistery. A new staircase to the balcony was constructed, which provided easier access. And hidden

away in the basement of the church, a new gas fuel heating system and a 100-ton air conditioning unit was installed, making St. Mary's the first air conditioned church in the Diocese. The cost of all this renovation was approximately \$80,000, or almost three times the original cost of the church

building. These new heating and air conditioning units would serve their purpose for almost 30 years, being replaced in 1992 for a cost of \$100,000.

Thirty years would pass without any more major renovations, but in 1983, during the pastorate of Father Gerald Miriani, the church was again extensively remodeled. A new parquet floor was installed in the sanctuary and the side pews were removed from the sanctuary area. The existing altar and pulpit were reworked with matching wood trim and the tabernacle was placed along the back. Some of the most distinguishing additions to the interior were the construction of a wooden screen separating the tabernacle area from the altar, the addition of wood molding around the side entrances and the back wall of etched glass, creating an entrance area to the church, where the baptismal font and Easter candle are placed. Eugene Becker created the Easter candle holder and the Cross which is suspended from the sanctuary ceiling by cables. The organ console was moved to the south sanctuary area and a grand piano would later be added to the north sanctuary area. The church was rededicated by Bishop Keleher on Oct. 5, 1986.

Under the pastorate of Father Jim Dougherty, 1988-1998, the parish purchased the Savings and Loan building in 1990, located at 400 E. Broadway, and renovated it into a day care facility, Mary's House. Approximately 100 children, ages 6 weeks to 12 years, were enrolled during its operation. The daycare facility was sold by the parish in June 2000 and the facility was rented to

and renovated by People's Bank. A courtyard on the south side of the church was created and the north entrance of the church was renovated. The church offices were moved from the rectory to the unused convent at 424 E. Broadway. The chapel in the convent was also renovated. Eugene Becker created much of the artwork in the chapel. Sister Cheryl Pautler, A.S.C., served as pastoral associate during a portion of Father Jim's pastorate.

In 1998, Father David Darin, a native son of the parish, became pastor. With

the hiring of Sister Jacklyn Pritchard, CDP, as principal, the second floor of the convent was renovated as living quarters. Also the basement area was converted to a room for the quilters, along with a new restroom. A home was purchased at 645 S. Lincoln Blvd. to serve as the rectory. The existing rectory was demolished, increasing the size of the south courtyard area. Sister Annette Kaba, OSF, was hired as pastoral associate in July 2001. She too moved into the living quarters above the parish offices. A new principal was hired for the 2001-2003 school year, and Sister Jacklyn commenced service as parish life coordinator to St. Lawrence Parish in Sandoval, while also serving as coordinator of religious education for St. Mary.

In the fall of 2001, the outdoor Stations of the Cross were presented to St. Mary as a gift from the Felician Sisters and St. Mary Good Samaritan Hospital. The Stations were installed on new brick pedestals in the courtyard by the Knights of Columbus and parish volunteers, and were then refinished with concrete texturing paint. In the spring of 2002, additional trees, shrubs and flora were added to the landscaping of the courtvard. A new slate roof, replacing the badly deteriorating original slate roof, was added in the fall of 2002.

In 2003, Sister Carol Markus, SSND, became full-time director of religious education. Sister Carol took an out-of-state position after one year and Sister Annette became interim director of religious education for the 2004-2005 year. Sister Marlene Buese was hired full-time as director of religious education in July of 2005.

Major renovations to the church interior began in the fall of 2005. The interior was completely repainted; granite-look vinyl tile replaced the downstairs carpeting; and the upstairs carpeting was replaced with new carpet; the Stations of the Cross on the wall and the suspended crucifix were repainted in jewel tones;

two rows of wooden pews were replaced with padded chairs with movable kneelers, for better handicap access; the remaining pews were refurbished to match; the chairs in the sanctuary were recovered; two confessionals were taken out to make for a larger entryway into the church; the altar servers' sacristy was converted into a single confessional; a handicap access ramp was installed in the sanctuary; and an access panel was put into the floor of the main entrance foyer for future installation of a new baptismal font. These renovations were completed in the fall of 2006.

The fall of 2006 began the re-leading and repair of the stained glass windows. An outer safety glass has been added to the windows to prevent further weather damage.

St. Mary began its sesquicentennial year in January of 2007. Many activities were undertaken, including an outdoor Mass/picnic held in June of 2007. New perennials and flora were added to the courtyard in the spring of 2007.

Father David Darin was reassigned to St. Teresa and St. Luke Parishes in Belleville. Fathers Michael Mbonu and Justin Olisaemeka were welcomed to St. Mary on July 10, 2007.

Thus, in this sesquicentennial year, St. Mary's reviews its sesquicentennial of growth. It's heart is filled with prayerful gratitude to Almighty God for the bountiful blessing He has showered upon it from its inception 150 years ago. St. Mary's, too, remembers the loyal and zealous priests whose lives of sacrifice and love for their spiritual children were always an inspiration. With hearts brimming with love and gratitude on this centennial day, we pause to honor their treasured memory.

No historical account of a parish is complete without a tribute to its parishioners. Certainly, St. Mary's stands today as living monument to the faith and loyalty of its people. There were times in its history which presented a trying challenge. Sacrifice, courage and generosity characterized our heroic forbearers. Only an undying faith and a steadfast devotion to the Church could have brought them triumphantly through the struggles which at times harassed their beloved parish.

Our prayer today is that Almighty God will continue to shower His richest blessings on the priests and faithful of St. Mary's parish.

HISTORY OF ST. MARY'S SCHOOL


atholic parochial education began in Centralia in 1867 when the first Catholic school, a frame building, was constructed through the efforts of Father Thomas Walsh. The original school was under the care of lay teachers.

The first Sisters took over the teaching in our school in 1889. The first three Sisters, Poor Handmaids of Jesus Christ, who came to Centralia were Sister M. Henrica, superior; Sister M. Gregory, teacher; and Sister M. Leonilla, who did private nursing.

When the Sisters took charge of the school, it was a one-room frame building occupying the site of the present church. In 1893 another classroom was added to the school and a second teacher was added to the staff, Sister M. Adelheide.

In 1899, a new school was erected. It was a two-story structure, situated to the rear of where the rectory stood for many years (now home to the church courtyard). In 1907, an addition was made to the school and facilities by this time included four classrooms and a large assembly room which was also used for special gatherings. The Sisters who taught at the school at this time were Sisters Borgia, Rigorberta, Clementine and Claudia.

During the pastorate of Father George Lohman, plans for a new school were formulated. In 1927, under his supervision, the modern school was erected for approximately \$60,000. The




The second St. Mary's School building was erected in 1899.

school contained six classrooms on the second floor, the first floor was occupied by a kitchen and parish hall.

Until 1939, the Poor Handmaids of Jesus Christ had charge of the school. In that year, the operation of the school was transferred to the Felician Sisters, who also assumed charge of the administration of St. Mary's Hospital. The first teachers of the new community were Sister M. Leonella, Sister M. Polycarp, Sister M. Theodora and Sister M. Cordia. The Sisters who staffed the school in the parish's centennial year of 1957 were Sister M. Louise, Sister M. Vitalia, Sister M. Adelma, Sister M. Alphonsanetta and Mrs. Hazel Hamm. The enrollment of St. Mary's School in 1957 was 219 pupils. The 2006-07 enrollment stood at 77 pupils.






ST. MARY'S HOSPITAL

he Catholic Church has always subscribed to the adage that a sound mind lives in a healthy body. Realizing that man is composed of a body as well as a soul, the church has never neglected the material part of man. She has always been anxious to provide institutions which provide care for God's afflicted children.

This same realization accompanied the Catholics to Centralia. It soon became evident that the city of Centralia, its population swelled by the coming of the railroad, industry and mining, stood in need of some provisions to care for the needs of the sick and infirm. The necessity of a hospital within its limits became apparent.

The original two-story 1909 hospital structure had a bed capacity of only 22

In March of 1905, during the pastorate of Father Bruns, St. Mary's Parish purchased the plot of ground at the corner of Elm and Noleman streets for a hospital. The Business Men's Association set about soliciting funds for the project. However, since the necessary support was lacking, the idea of a hospital was temporarily put aside.

In 1908 the hospital project was again revived. A new subscription list was circulated by a special committee of L.M. Bostwick, president; Dr. W.A. Stoker, vice president; Father John Bruns, treasurer; Dwight F. Haussler, secretary; E.A. Tartman, Dr. J.W. Armstrong and Dr. Otto Diehl. The cornerstone was laid in 1909. When completed, the hosptial was a two story structure with a bed capacity of 22. The hospital was was solemnly dedicated on Thanksgiving Day, 1909, by Bishop Belleville. Janssen

The original hospital soon became too small for the needs of a growing com-

nity. In 1911, a thirteen bed wing was added, and in 1922, during the pastorate of Father Chuse and Father Eschmann, another wing was added, bringing the total bed capacity to 86.

During those years, the hospital was owned by the Diocese of Belleville. It was staffed by the Poor Handmaids of Jesus Christ until 1939, when Bishop Henry Althoff requested that the Felician Sisters assume operation of the hospital. On Aug. 27, 1947, ownership of St. Mary's Hospital was transferred from the Diocese of Belleville to the Felician Sisters.

From the beginning, the spiritual needs of the hospital were looked after by the priests of the parish. In order to give more efficient spiritual care to both the patients and the Sisters, Father Edward J. Ratermann was appointed the first resident chaplain in June of 1955 by the Most Rev. Bishop at the request of the Sisters.

Increasing difficulties in providing the best medical care for the community with the present facilities made a new hospital imperative. Thus, with the hope that they could some day build a new modern hospital in Centralia, the Sisters purchased in 1948 a 20-acre site on the west side of Pleasant Avenue between Rexford and McCord streets. The Sisters asked the people of the community to contribute toward \$250,000 \$3,000,000 hospital as a token of their good will. A financial drive was initiated, and the interest of the citizens was reflected in their response to the project.

The groundbreaking ceremony took place on Nov. 21, 1955. The first spade of earth was turned by the coordinated efforts of His Excellency, Bishop Albert R. Zuroweste, Bishop of Belleville, the Honorable Herbert Blankchard, Mayor of Centralia, and Sister Mary Paschalisa, administrator of the hospital. The construction of the hospital began in February of the following year. The cornerstone was laid by the chaplain, Father Ratermann, on Sept. 12, 1956.

During the court's history in Centralia, it has contributed to the religious and social affairs of the community. It has conducted study clubs, days of recollection, and donated financially to the church, school and hospital.

A singular honor came to the court in 1938, when Mrs. J.T. Boyle, a charter member, was elected State Regent of the State of Illinois.

In 1940, the court organized the junior Catholic Daughters, whose threefold program of spiritual, charitable and recreational activities aimed to stimulate Catholic ideals, to encourage the habit of serving others and of providing wholesome recreation under Catholic leadership

In 1952, Mrs. Huey White, grand regent of the Court, was selected to be one of eight state delegates to the National Catholic Daughters of America convention, held in Lake Placid, NY, that year. White had attend-

ed the state convention that year, along with Catherine Ducci, Merce e des Campbell, Mrs. Leo Bieser and Mrs. Agnes Boyle. The

ALTAR SOCIETY

he Altar Society is one of the oldest parish societies, dating back beyond the memory of any living parishioner, as noted in the 1957 St. Mary Centennial history. The primary work of the organization consists in providing for the needs and furnishings of the altar. However, the society is always prepared to share in other parochial activities. The 1957 history noted that, "in recent years, it has made substantial financial contributions toward the new St. Mary's Hospital, toward the renovation of our church, toward a new set of vestments and toward the recent project of renovating and rebuilding the church organ."


The society is the result of a merger of the original society with the St. Ann's Guild. The two organizations were consolidated during the pastorate of Father George Lohman.



hrough the efforts of James L. Brady and Michael O Brien, members of the Jack-Council, T.J. sonville Dempsey and J.E. Dempsey of Canton Council in Ohio, D.A. Ryan of Murphysboro and Frank J. Clettenberg of DeSmet Council in St. Louis.

The then resident pastor, Rev. John H. Bruns, was prevailed upon to invite the then State Chaplain, Rev. William J. Healy to come to Centralia and explain the Order to the Catholic men of

the vicinity.

While the field was a difficult one, the visit of Father Healy brought good results, and a short time thereafter, Maurice V. Joyce of East St. Louis, then District Deputy for the territory, was invited to assist in the preliminary work, and after a brilliant address by Mr. Joyce, over 30 applications were signed and a date was set for the institution.

In the meantime, the men above mentioned succeeded in bringing the list of candi-

dates up to 53.

At the institution, officers of Effingham Council conferred the first degree, East St. Louis the second and District Deputy Maurice V. Joyce and staff the third.

This was one of the greatest days in the history of Catholics in Centralia.

A large procession was formed downtown and marched to Mass. Dinner was served to the candidates in the school hall, and they were kept together until the completion of the ceremonies, after which an elaborate banquet was served in

a downtown hall.

A number of charter members of the Centralia Council were residents of DuQuoin and for a time, the DuQuoin members constituted a semi-auxiliary to Centralia's Council, but local pride prevailed and shortly after, they withdrew to become charter members of the DuQuoin Council. Carlyle Council is likewise an offshoot of the Centralia Council.

While Centralia never organized a first or second degree team, a year or so after its institution, Frank A. Traymor, who was afterwards Grand Knight, was appointed District Deputy by State Deputy Lewis E.

Sauter, and took an active part in a large number of degrees in Illinois and Indiana, and he and his assistant, J.L. Brady, were well known in Southern Illinois.

For some years, the membership diminished through transfers and withdrawls, but there was a revival of interest with new and young blood infused.

Out of a membership of 58 at the time of the outbreak of the First World War, 18 went in the service.

The Council did its full share in the home war work and the members took a prominent part in the war activities of the community.

K of C marked half-century in 1955

or God and Country" was the general theme of speeches and remarks made Oct. 13, 1955 at the Golden Jubilee banquet of the Centralia Council of the Knights of Columbus.

Approximately 260 Knights of Columbus members, families and friends gathered at the American Legion Cottage at 8 p.m. for the banquet, following Pontifical Low Mass said at St. Mary's Church by

Bishop Albert Zuroweste of the Belleville Diocese.

Toastmaster James E. Hudson introduced special guests and local Grand Knight William Remacle gave the welcoming address. George Griffin, state K of C secretary of Chicago, followed Remacle on the program and pointed out the accomplishments made by the local council and all the other councils in connection with the Catholic Church. George Zimmerman, district deputy, congratulated the local chapter for their 50 years of accomplishments.

Congressman Charles Vursell praised members of the Knights of Columbus as the "right arm of the Catholic Church" and congratuated the local council on service to God and country. State Sen. Dwight Freidrich pointed out that not only had the organization promoted activities for the good of their church, but also had promoted good citizenship.

Prior to the main address by Bishop Albert Zuroweste, Mayor H.B. Blanchard extended congratulations to the K of C Council from the Centralia City Council and the people of Centralia.

Bishop Zuroweste related the history of

And if the local council is to have another 50 good years, it will be because of the same type

From an original charter membership of 55, Council 1025 grew to a membership of about 300 members in 1957. During the group's centennial year of 2005, membership was at about 140.

In 1950, the local council established its own home in Centralia, purchasing for \$25,000 the Knights' Home with its modern furnishings and facilities. The council now has headquarters on Centralia's south side.


CALVARY CEMETERY

everence for the dead is a main Christian hallmark. In her maternal solicitude to provide suitable burial for the deceased members of Christ's Mystical Body, the Church has always set aside special resting places for the deceased. Ever mindful that in life the body of man was a temple of the Holy Spirit, destined to share the joys of heaven, it is easy to see why Christians during all ages exercised great care in providing for their beloved departed.

Inspired by this same lofty motive, the Catholics of St. Mary's in 1906, during the pastorate of Father Bruns, purchased a plot of land which they designated as the hallowed resting place of their beloved dead.

Prior to this time, Centralia's Catholics were buried at the city cemeteries. The first to be buried in the new cemetery was Anthony Rindokis on May 1, 1907

The 1957 St. Mary Centennial book notes that Calvary ranks favorably with all Catholic cemeteries in the diocese of Belleville. In 1955, Father Halbig undertook the work of beautifying

the cemetery. he erected a large crucifix in the center. The Calvary group was completed by Father Schomaker, who added the statues of Our Lady and St. John.

The terra cotta statues of the Virgin Mary and St. John are the fruits of Mrs. Frances Duty and Mr. and Mrs. A.J. Scheriger.

The monument to Father

Halbig located in front of the crucifix was donated by the parishioners.

The parishioners of St. Mary's indicated their desire that a new priests' burial plot be set aside around the Calvary group. Former pastors of St. Mary's to be buried here are Father Halbig and Father Schomaker.

Through the efforts of Father Schomaker and the support of parishioners, a life-size statue of the Sacred Heart graces the cemetery. It was erected as a memorial to Father Eugene Fix, who gave many fruitful years of his priestly life to the service of St. Mary's parish.



n 1790, Fr. John Carroll of Baltimore was named the first bishop of the United States. His diocese included all of the United States, including the Illinois country. In 1803, the Illinois territory was put under the authority of the newly-created diocese of Bardstown, Kentucky. For a time Illinois was divided between the dioceses of St. Louis (created in 1827) and Vincennes, Ind., until the diocese of Chicago was created in 1843. The Alton diocese was created in 1857, under the leadership of Bishop Henry Juncker. Fr. Peter Joseph Baltes succeeded Juncker as bishop upon his death in 1868. Baltes died in 1886 and the following year a new new diocese - the diocese of Belleville - was created.



THE EARLY YEARS

1936 letter recounts dedication of early St. Mary's pastors

The following was a letter addressed to Rev. Eugene Fix, pastor of St. Mary's Church in Centralia from a D. A. Ryan, address 6617 Minerva Ave., Chicago. The letter was dated the 18th (month illegible) 1936.

Reverend dear Father:


For a long time it has been my intention to write you in regard to a picture I made several years ago of the original church sanctuary of Centralia, my native parish - where I was Baptised and received my first Holy Communion and was Confirmed by Bishop Baltes from before Belleville was an Espicopus See.

Very few are remaining who will remember the old church and fewer who will remember the struggle and hardships borned by the priests of those days when the Sunday collections totaled an average of .85 to \$1.25, the latter amount when reached being an occasion for thanksgiving.

"Winter mornings ... the water would freeze in the cruet because there was neither coal or wood to make a fire in the old stove."

When if a Bazaar or Fair of those nights netted \$125 there was rejoicing and gratitude beyond measure. I served mass for 8 years—winter mornings when the water would freeze in the cruet, because there was neither coal or wood to make a fire in the old stove, that was minus one leg and 3 bricks at one corner to act as a substitute for the missing leg.

When, Father Becker morning after morning had

only dry bread and coffee for his breakfast and many unless someone brought in something in the way of food that constituted the menu for the day. He had 5 parishes and was subject to call for sick calls in the surrounding towns that had no churches. He had Centralia, Sandoval, Odin (they had a church), Kinmundy and Patoka. No hard roads nor automobiles and I positively know of his going on foot 4 or 5 miles through slush and mud and in winter through snow at night to administer the Last Sacraments to some who never thought of him only at such a time. I can see him yet starting out with an old railroad lantern as his only bit of equipment and returning at daylight with his clothes frozen to the waist line. He never refused to go. He never complained. What wonder,

if he later weakened under the strain and disappointments which I know were his, for I was very close to him for many years. He gave every-

thing he had — physically, mentally, spiritually — only to be rewarded here with ingratitude and criticism. It was he, who laid the foundation of what the parish is enjoying today. I knew his dreams and his ambition to lift the parish from the stigma of being the poorest in the diocese — which it then was — to a higher and more worthwhile position. May God in his omniscient Justice and Love give him peace and Eternal rest -He earned it.

His successor Otto Meier was certainly a wonderfully fine and devout priest. Poor man, to him fell the task of completing the church which was only enclosed. He also found a more than depleted treasury and personally made a begging tour — not borrowing — through the Diocese. He would I know rather have had all his teeth pulled as he was a retiring soul, in no sense ostentatious, but warm

hearted, lovable devout, a hard worker and a very practical economist. I was a co-worker when he built the rectory which he didn't want - not because he didn't need it — but because he was willing to live in the old shack where he sat all day — that is, what spare moments he had all day — in the kitchen with his mother in order to save fuel. He didn't want to burden the parish with any additional debt. I've always thought the years he spent in Centralia took two for one from his life span, for he was always frail. He too has many years since gone to the reward he so greatly merited. God grant him eternal happiness.

Then came Father Bruns, churchman, educator and "go getter" organizer and disciplinarian — with the courage of his convictions — under all circumstances

and no reticence about defending them at any time or on any occasion. God never made them any better than he. High minded, energetic,

ambitious for God, not self, it is my opinion that his effort, his spirit, his democratic policies, vitalized and animated the people of the parish into a closer unity of purpose and effort than had existed at any time previous. I moved here (to Chicago) during his pastorate, but always kept up our friendship and correspondence until his death in Carlyle some years since. God grant him Eternal rest.

I am proudly interested in the Catholic progress of Centralia. The thirty two happiest years of my life were spent there and on my recent short sad visit there I marveled at the marvelous development of Cethologism and its heavity.

Catholocism and its beautiful group of institutions, contrasted with those of the picture I am sending you. When at that time — the late 70s and 1880s, to acknowledge being a Catholic was almost as popular as being a victim of







The Pilgrim Virgin - 1949

In an effort to unite and encourage the world's Catholics, Pope Pius XII declared 1950 a Holy Year. It began with solemn ceremonies at noon on Dec. 24, 1949, initiating a five-year period of unusual piety and devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary.

The Belleville Diocese had begun to deepen its devotion to Mary even before Holy Year, with a peace pilgrimage. In 1949, the Pilgrim Virgin of Fatima came to Southern Illinois, and made a stop in Centralia on Oct. 17.

According to the Sentinel, an estimated 500 Catholics from the area attended the services held at St. Mary's that day. The Pilgrim Virgin was one of two images blessed by the bishop of Fatima at the Portuguese shrine in 1947.

Revealing the tensions that had already appeared in the young Cold War, Bishop Zuroweste commended the diocese's response to the Pilgrim Virgin, then went on to say, "When the atom bombs start to fall, I would like to be in Belleville Diocese, for she [Our Lady] certainly will shower her blessings and graces and favors there."

Children from St.Mary's formed an escort for the statue, which was borne on a litter. Fr. Eugene Fix placed a gold crown on the head of the statue and Rosary services followed.







NO. 5 MINE DISASTER — 1947

erhaps no other single event has impacted the parish of St. Mary's as did the terrible tragedy that occurred on March 25, 1947. The Sentinel described it as "the worst catastrophe in Centralia history."

It was the explosion deep inside the No. 5 Mine in Wamac on March 25, 1947, which killed 111 men. There were only 31 sur-

vivors.

The tragedy, which has come to be known simply as the "mine disaster," touched not only the average Centralian, but in particular the Catholic Centralian, for very many of those poor souls were immigrants or sons of immigrants, and members of St. Mary's parish

members of St. Mary's parish.

How did it happen? A shot charge — a charge intended to loosen coal — created a flash of flame that ignited suspended coal dust. It was mid afternoon, and the shift was nearly done. There was a brief, deafening explosion, which overturned railroad cars used to haul coal and threw miners against the walls of the mine and

against the overturned cars.

Those who survived the blast 545 feet underground then faced another peril—deadly black damp—the poisonous gas that seeped down the mine's corridors

after the explosion.

Rescuers arrived from Benton, Belleville, West Frankfort, Springfield, Herrin, Eldorado, Benld and Du Quoin, but with the exception of the very first local rescue workers who entered the mine, the efforts to find any miners still alive were futile.

Among the first on the scene were Fr. Michael Podrasky and seven Felician Sisters of the hospital. Joined later by Fr. A.B. Schomaker of Salem and several other area priests, they watched and prayed and aided rescue attempts.

As the bodies were removed from the mine, workers took them to temporary morgues. The Kavanaugh Bus Service garage on East McCord Street was the main morgue. For some of the surviving miners, the Community Center on Walnut Street

was used as an emergency ward.

Funeral homes were overwhelmed by the magnitude of the disaster. Orders were placed for dozens of extra caskets. Funeral services were held in homes, and in many cases, the funeral homes' services included as many deceased miners and their families as could be accommodated at one time.

A day after the explosion, Bishop Althoff visited the area. The Knights of Columbus distributed food to rescue workers.

The disaster had left 99 widows and 78 children younger than 18 without fathers.

Six days after the No. 5 Mine disaster, a still stunned Centralia learned that 12 of the miners who died had written notes in their dying moments as the gas reached

them. They were notes of farewell to their families.

Among the notes left by the miners was this one: "Well hon, it looks like this is the end. Please tell mom and dad I still love them. Please get the baby baptized and send (name) to the Catholic school. Well, I love you all, and please take care of them and raise them a good Christian. I love them all. Love to all of you."

On March 25, 1997, a special Mass was held at St. Mary's, just as a community

service had been held here in 1947.

During the 1997 service, 111 candles burned on the altar. Each represented a coal miner who died in the No. 5 Mine explosion, more than half of whom were Catholics, not just at St. Mary's, but at other Catholic churches in the area, including Sandoval's.

Rev. Wilton Gregory, bishop of the Diocese of Belleville, was the main speaker at the 1997 Mass.

"Fifty years ago on this very day, Southern Illinois became a national symbol of sorrow," Gregory said. "Fifty years ago, families in Southern Illinois were united in grieving the loss husbands, fathers, uncles, brothers, relatives and neighbors in this terrible tragedy. Common sorrow drew them together. Religious differences were less different, for a moment, than the bonds of sorrow that united families. It is to be hoped that this bond has endured the passage of time. It has shown us just how much we need

one another."


He said, "We commend these men into the shelter of God's care." He also told the area residents attending the Mass, "We must keep solidarity and unity as our legacy."

The 50th anniversary Mass was open to all members of the Centralia community.

"We hope that survivors of any of the victims, Catholic or not, will feel most welcome to attend," Rev. James Dougherty said in advance of the service.



ony Kaney shares that, "right after I started school at St. Mary, I went to school one day wearing blue jeans and Sister said that I looked like a workman and wasn't fit to be in class so she sent me to the basement to spend the day helping the janitor. I thought it was great fun.

"When they showed the movie 'My Blue Heaven' at the Illinois Theatre in about 1952, we were ordered by the nuns not to see it; it had been banned by the church because they used the word 'virgin' in it [I'm not making this up!]. So naturally we were all determined to go see it anyway, and many of us did [all boys, I remember]. However, unknown to us, Sister had posted one of her little 'spies' [a teacher's pet] to stand on the corner on Saturday afternoon and make a list of all the kids from school who she saw going into the theatre for the matinee. On Monday, Father Pastor came into class and gave us all a sermon and made us stand in the back all day. Once again, mom blew her stack and went in and gave Sister a lecture about how she and only she decided which movies I could see. Of course, I stood there smirking and loving it, but got no more static from sister about movies after that."

These affairs were sponsored by the Catholic Daughters of America, Altar Society and the Knights of Columbus.
















In 1955, Father Schomaker was named pastor of the Immaculate Conception Church at Columbia and one year later he became pastor of St. Mary's Church following the death of the Rev. Fred Halbig.

With the exception of the year spent at Columbia, Father Schomaker has been a resident of Marion County since 1939.

3,000 Witness 1963 Dedication of St. Mary's School

Bishop Albert R. Zuroweste of Belleville dedicated the new St. Mary's Catholic Grade School and Convent in Centralia on March 16, 1963, before a crowd of approximately 3,000 persons.

Also participating in the Sunday afternoon dedication ceremonies were the Rev. A.B. Schomaker, pastor of the local church, and the Rev. John J. Vogt, assistant pastor.

Bishop Zuroweste dedicated the 10-room grade school and spacious convent to culminate the efforts of many local Catholics. The buildings were erected at a cost of \$338,238.

Students total 277 and there are five sisters.

Following the dedication, an open houes was held in the school for inspection by the general public.

Building Committee members included Louis Logullo, Gordon Elliston, Joe Mondino, Matthew Schwartz, Fred

Seip and Ralph Sprehe.

The school replaced a 1927 structure which was erected for \$60,000. The new school had many extra features, such as heat-resistant glass, adequate blackboards and was built of haydite brick in a contemporary style.













Paris MEMORIES

The following memories were shared by Josephine Smith, whose family photos are featured on this page:

Church and the wonderful pastors who were always so nice to me. When I was young, I cleaned the church Saturday and had dinner with Father Halbig and his housekeeper Lucille. My faith in God and the church was very strong because of all his help, and because of his teaching me right from wrong, I was able to grow strong and wise in my Catholic Religion. I sang in the choir at the Cathedral when His Excellency Bishop James P. Keleher came to Belleville. It was my first time in the Cathedral and I was very excited. I attended by first year of school in a Catholic school in Belleville.

Father J. Ralph Arnold Baptized my daughter Margie Sue Smith on April 8, 1972. Shirley Hudson was her godmother. The Rev. Albert R. Zuroweste Confirmed both my daughters, Margie Sue Smith and Betty Ann Fowler, on March 22, 1973. Margie Sue graduated from St. Mary's School in 1975. Father Dennis Voss came to our house in 1977 when Margie Sue died. Father Voss and Ed Schaefer said the funeral Mass and Sister Cecilia organized the music.

Father Gerald C. Miriani was pastor at St. Mary's from 1977 to 1988. He was responsible for the renovation and rededication of the church. I sang with the St. Mary's choir downstairs in front of the church. In 1979, I started as a special minister of the Eucharist. I minister Communion at the nursing homes with Sister Annette Marie Kaba. She is very nice to work with. I attend a Scripture study group led by Pete Donnelly Jr. at St. Mary's Parish on Mondays; on Tuesdays, I go to Dolores Sanders' Group Faith Sharing meetings; and on Wednesdays I go to the Come and Learn Scripture class with Sister Marlene. I am a member of St. Mary's Altar Society and Court St. Theresa 788 Catholic Daughters of the Americas. I am thankful for Sister Barbara Habing, the principal at St. Mary's School, who sees that our Catholic children get an excellent education.

Father Patrick Peter gave the liturgy for my son, George Michael Smith's funeral service. Father David Darin said the funeral service

liturgy for my husband, George J. Smith. My family and friends said that the church was beautiful and that Father Darin did a wonderful job. George would have been very appreciative.

George and I were married on Dec. 14, 1947. On Nov. 21, 1968, the Rev. James Blazine married us at St. Mary's Church. We celebrated our 25th wedding anniversary in 1972, our 50th in 1997 and if George had lived we would have celebrated our 60th anniversary this year. Father James R. Dougherty blessed our 50th wedding anniversary. Father Dougherty's mother, Stephanie Dougherty, was also a very nice person.

Our family includes a daughter and son-in-law, Betty Ann and Fred Fowler; a daughter-in-law,

Debra Smith; and two grandsons, George Michael Smith and Michael Frederick Fowler, all of Centralia. My son, George Michael Smith, and daughter, Margie Sue Smith, are deceased.














GARNIER CHRISTMAS CHURCH





St. Mary's receives INC Award

St. Mary's Catholic Church at 133 N. Elm St. was a 1989 winner of the Investing Now in Cetnralia Award, which Centralia Clean and Green bestows monthly on businesses, industries or organizations which make special efforts to beautify and maintain their property.

The St. Mary Parish history began along with Centralia and the advent of the Illinois Central Railroad. In the beginning, Masses were celebrated in the homes of

parish members.

In 1857, Rev. Heimerling built the first church, a simple frame structure which seated 100 people and stood on the site of today's rectory. The building cost \$1,000. A belfry was added in 1879, but soon the building provided

inadequate.

On Sept. 29, 1896, Rev. Becker laid a cornerstone for the new church, a gothic structure measuring 111 feet by 41 feet. It seated 400 parishoners and cost \$30,000. The church greatly reduced this debt under the persistence of the Rev. Otto Meier. In each Father's direction, different changes have been made.

Most recent has been the restoration of the outside of the building and a newly remodeled interior. The Rev.

Gerald Miriani directed these changes.

St. Mary's has been a constant maintenance program, directed by Gene Becker, who is responsible for the entire church, rectory, school offices, the convent and the lawn.











A STORY IN STAINED CLASS

Madonna in Glass featured at St. Mary's

The following article by Mrs. Perry Crawford appeared in the Dec. 4, 1959, edition of the Morning Sentinel. It is especially noteworthy due to the recent renovation of the church overseen by Father David Darin, which restored the interior decor to much of what this article describes.

The Madonna in the window of the facade is rich in ecclesiastical art. She is portrayed standing within the glory of the Aureole. This large oval halo is also known as the Mandarola, Italian for almond shape. The master painters of the Renaissance enriched the use of this symbol, especially the sixteenth century Murillo of Spain. He is famous for his many paintings of the Assumption of the Madonna, and the Ascension of Christ. The Madonna in a shimmering gray robe has a radiant blue mantle draped toward the front in rich depths of darker blue. A bit of gray veil is on the back of her head, contrasting with the long jade green scarf across the shoulders, cascading down each side with one long end swinging across the front with the mantle. Her discaled, or bare, feet are seen standing on gray clouds.

She is surrounded by a dazzling radiance of golden rays shading into bronze at the tips. The highest part of the Aureole seems to extend up beyond an elaborately carved stone canopy of regal pinnacles and scrolls. It actually looks like stone, the glass being so realistic in coloring. This stone effect continues in slender pillars down each side of the window to an ornamental base across the lower edge. Above the canopy is a background of ruby red, adding much to the window when illuminated each night and viewed from the street. Below the Madonna at each side are three adoring angels in robes of purple, with two of them offering her the spray of lilies, symbol of purity, and the palm, symbol of victory.

The front of the mensa, or altar table, shows a tall Chi Rho, embellished at the center with star-like rays. Chi Rho are the first two letters in the Greek name of Christ. It was carved by the early Christians in the catacombs under Rome until the year 315 AD, when Emperor Constantine gave an edict permitting the use of the cross as the emblem of the Christian church.

A red panel at the back of the mersa is painted with scrolls of grape vines and sprays of golden wheat. The chalice containing the host/Communion wafer has gold rays of sanctity emanating from it, this is a beautiful presentation of the symbos of the body and blood of Christ.

High on the wall in back of the mensa is a large oak crucifix. Near the top I appreciate reading the familiar INRI, Jesus Nazarenus Rex Judaeorum, the Latin for Jesus of Nazareth, King of the Jews. At the foot of the cross are Mary, Mother of God, and John the Favorite Disciple.

The valuted ceiling of the chancel forms two arches clearly painted with symbols for all to behold. The arch close to the altar portrays 1500-year-old symbols of the four evangelists, showing the angel of St. Matthew, the lion of St. Mark, the ox of St. Luke and the eagle of St. John. As is often customary only the heads are shown in this design, similar to those of cherubim used in a decorative manner close to the

heads

On the front of the arch above the altar is the lettering "Ecce Agnus Dei," on a scroll below the colorful painting of the "Lamb of God" standing on the Bible which has the seven seals across it. The triradiant halo belongs to the lamb as one of the Holy Trinity, and the lamb is holding a staff bearing the white banner of Victory, symbol of the Resurrection. From the lamb's breast blood flows into the chalice. a subject which has been the inspiration of many paintings, including the large masterpiece painted in 1450 in Holland by the Van Eyck brothers. This has long been regarded by world art authorities as the most perfect painting in the world. Perfection is found not only in the symbolic portrayal, but also in every painted detail of carved wood, embossed leather and rich draperies in the background. Jan Van Eyck was the first to perfect the use of oil mixed with pigment for the oil painting as we know it today, and he used it for priceless religious paintings.

The other arch higher up displays an inspiring row of symbols including the Descending Dove of Pentecost, the artichoke as a reminder of the power to burst the tomb, the scourge and the circle of 3 fish of the Holy Trinity, a beloved symbol since the first century after Christ. This is also displayed in a large gold design on the altar front in the Trinity Lutheran Church of this

city. The fish, anchor and ship whose mast often resembled a cross, were three favorite symbols of the early centuries as seen in hundreds of carvings of them in the Catacombs.

The 12 tall stained glass windows contain in unison the soft tones of orchid in the upper corner, shading down into cream and on into yellow. At the top and bottom are contrasting colors and designs, sky blue prevailing in floral scrolls at the top, while at the bottom angular patterns of red, blue and orange prevail.

Exploring the high medallion windows starting on the north side, nearest the front door. I appreciate favorite, the blue anchor, ancient symbol of hope and security. The anchor is also seen beside the front door in the Methodist Church nearby. The next medallion contains the blue lilies which are always the symbol of the Madonna, while their blue symbolizes the heavens, truth and fidelity. Next is the cross draped with a violet strand for mourning. Next are the intertwined M and A, for Ave Maria. Latin for Hail Mary. Next the IHS showing a tall I in the middle for the cross with H and S below forming the monogram in Greek for the first three letters in the name of Jesus. The next medallion is above a statue of the Virgin Mary and it contains "Immaculate Heart of Mary." Opposite, on the south wall, is the "Sacred Heart of Jesus."










