## MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

Father Steven Pautler

**“Holy Cones and Heavenly Construction:  
God’s Still Working on Us?”**

If there’s one thing people in Southern Illinois understand, it’s construction. Orange cones, detour signs, and those flashing **“EXPECT DELAYS”** boards that seem to mock us while we sit in traffic on I-64 or I-57. You start to wonder if these roads have been under construction since the days of Moses. “This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and you will raise it up in three days?” Well, that sounds about right. We could easily substitute **“temple”** with **“interstate”** and not miss a beat.

But the Gospel of John gives us more than a chuckle about endless projects. It gives us a glimpse into the kind of construction Jesus had in mind. When he said he would raise the temple in three days, he wasn’t talking about the Herodian masterpiece of stone and marble. He was speaking about his own body. He was pointing to the new temple—the place where God truly dwells among his people. That’s what the Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica reminds us of. The Lateran Basilica in Rome is the pope’s church, the cathedral of the Bishop of Rome. It’s called the “mother and head of all churches,” but the celebration isn’t about brick, marble, or gilded altars. It’s about what those things represent—the living Church, built of people, not stone. You and I are part of that construction project, and unlike the highways, it never really ends.

Every time we forgive someone, every time we reach out to the poor, every time we receive the sacraments, another piece of God’s dwelling place is built. It’s messy work. There are potholes, setbacks, and plenty of detours. Sometimes it feels like the project is behind schedule. But Jesus shows us that resurrection always follows demolition. What looks destroyed is being rebuilt stronger. When Jesus cleared out the money changers, he wasn’t throwing a tantrum. He was setting things right. He was clearing away the clutter that distracted people from God. Maybe that’s where we need a little demolition too. We spend so much time maintaining our outer image, patching cracks in our pride, or re-painting our reputations that we forget to let Christ do the real renovation inside us. So as we mark this feast, maybe it’s time to take inventory of our own “spiritual construction zones.” Where are the potholes in our prayer life? Where are the orange cones blocking mercy or patience? And most importantly, are we letting Christ be the foreman, or are we still trying to design the blueprints our-selves? Yes, the roads may take forever. Yes, the cones may multiply faster than the loaves and fishes. But God’s construction is steady. It’s eternal. And while Illinois might never finish its highways, Christ finished his work in three days—and then invited us to travel that newly paved road that leads straight to heaven.

### **This week’s question:**

***This week’s question: At Mass the other day, a baby cried nonstop. I wanted to say, “Go to the cry room!” It distracted me.***

### **Answer:**

***Babies do test patience, but they’re also signs the Church is alive and growing. Jesus said, “Let the little children come to me,” and sometimes that means noisy pews. Parents should try to be considerate, but we are called to welcome, not scowl. Instead of frustration, whisper a prayer for that family. Someday, those cries may be the very sound that keeps the Church’s future strong.***

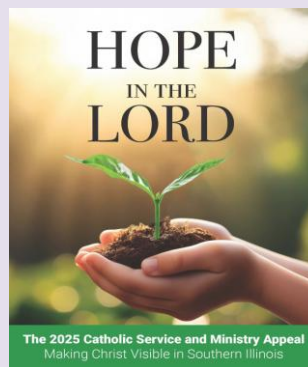

## **THE DEDICATION OF THE LATERAN BASILICA**

Sunday, November 9 is the Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica in Rome, which reminds us of the unity of the Church and commemorates the dedication of the cathedral of the Diocese of Rome.

Monday is the Memorial of Saint Leo the Great, Pope and Doctor of the Church. Tuesday is the Memorial of Saint Martin of Tours, Bishop. On Wednesday, we remember Saint Josaphat, Bishop and Martyr and, on Thursday, Saint Frances Xavier Cabrini.

As we draw toward the end of the liturgical year, our first readings this week is taken from Wisdom, a book written to encourage a downtrodden Jewish community. The vivid imagery offers us a view of the glory and justice of the Lord. "The souls of the just are in the hand of God, and no torment shall touch them."

In Luke's Gospel, Jesus turns his focus away from the Pharisees and back to his followers. "If your brother sins, rebuke him; and if he repents, forgive him." He tells them the duties of discipleship, asking if a master should be grateful to a servant who does what is commanded. "So should it be with you." We read of the curing the ten lepers - yet only one returns to give thanks. "Stand up and go; your faith has saved you." He also tells us that we should not spend our lives looking for the coming of the Kingdom "for behold, the Kingdom of God is among you." The Kingdom of God is coming, when we least expect it and, "Whoever seeks to preserve his life will lose it, but whoever loses it will save it." We must "pray always without becoming weary."

Being prepared for the coming of the Kingdom and not being side-tracked by false claims of Jesus' presence are keys to Luke's Gospel for the Thirty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time. Jesus says, "By your perseverance you will secure your lives."

## **Daily Prayer This Week**

In this process of becoming "Contemplatives in Action" by finding intimacy with God in the background of our everyday busy lives, we are seeing more and more clearly that Prayer is not really "saying prayers" but is a relationship that needs to be nourished in an ongoing way. No matter how hectic our week is, it is easy to think about our daily relationship with Our Father, with Jesus, in the Holy Spirit.

As we look ahead to the landscape of our week - with a few big things coming up, a host of ordinary responsibilities, and perhaps several bruised or difficult relationships that trouble us - we can begin to locate and formulate into words, the desires in our hearts for our Lord's help along the way. Perhaps we will have time to review a Daily Reflection each day or just the readings of the day. We may only have time to have a general sense of the Word of God addressed to us - from last Sunday and what is coming up this coming Sunday. That Word will further inform and shape how we will be in an ongoing dialogue with our Lord this week.

The rest is about developing the habit of focusing more intentionally on our relationship with our Lord, anticipating the events of our day, preparing for them, and letting our Lord be there in it with us. This is what it is to keep enough oil in our lamps. This is what it is to know that the presence of God is in our midst. This is what it takes to be good stewards of all that our Lord has entrusted to us.

So, we ask for what we need and desire, each morning, as soon as we can. We return to that desire, in brief moments, throughout the day. At the end of our day, we give thanks for this gifted relationship that sustained us and allowed us to be his disciples this day.

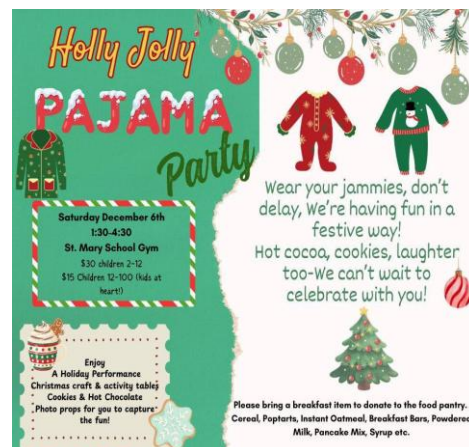
### PURRS FROM THE PEW - Sister Fluff of Divine Mischief
