MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

Father Steven Pautler

"The Thanksgiving That Taught Me Where Real Kingdoms Are Found."

I remember that Thanksgiving morning I remember that Thanksgiving morning as if it were stitched into the fabric of my heart. The hospital hallway felt still. The kind of stillness you sense when life stands at a crossroads. Mom and I sat beside my grandmother Lillie as she slept. The doctor stepped in, glanced at the chart, and delivered news that dropped like a stone. Immediate surgery. Mom's voice trembled when she answered. "But it's Thanksgiving." The doctor didn't flinch. They were prepping her within minutes. Our plans, our family gathering, the food waiting at the American Legion, all of it faded behind one truth. Grand-ma Lillie needed help, and we were staying put.

The hours dragged. That late morning hunger set in. I found myself thinking of turkey, dressing, potatoes, and the kind of feast you look forward to all year. Mom and I wandered to the cafeteria. The cook placed two round slices of processed turkey on the griddle. A scoop of stuffing from a box. Mashed potatoes made from flakes. A slice of pumpkin pie that leaned a little to the right. We carried our trays back upstairs. Mom sat across from me. The food wasn't fancy. The moment was. I looked at her and thought, this is the best Thanksgiving meal of my life! Not because of flavor. Because of love. Because we were exactly where we needed to be. Grandma came out of surgery and opened her eyes with fire. "*Take me home!*" she said. And we laughed with relief.

The readings for the Solemnity of Christ the King speak with the same clarity. They draw us away from distractions and set our eyes on what matters. In Second Samuel, the tribes come to David and recognize something deeper than earthly power. They acknowledge the one chosen to shepherd them. The psalm lifts a song of joy as the people go up to the house of the Lord. They know where their true center lies. Paul tells the Colossians to give thanks to the Father who delivered us from darkness and brought us into the kingdom of his beloved Son. In Luke's Gospel, the dying thief turns to Jesus with a final plea. And Jesus, bruised and mocked yet reigning from the wood of the cross, gives a promise stronger than death. "Today you will be with me in Paradise."

Christ our King stands at the center of these readings with a strength no earthly throne delivers. David is anointed over all Israel and entrusted with shepherding the people. His kingship points forward to the One who reigns forever. The psalm urges the tribes to journey to the Lord's house where judgment, peace, and unity rise from His presence. Paul proclaims Christ as the image of the invisible God. The firstborn of all creation. The One through whom everything holds together. On the cross, Luke shows the world's true King crowned not with gold but with sacrifice. Every reading gathers itself around one truth. Christ rules with love stronger than sin and a power that restores every broken place. Thanksgiving invites us to see His hand in the quiet corners of our lives. The small mercies. The steady presence of God. The love that holds us. And the King who never leaves His people.

Anecdote!

After a long and draining day, the hospital door opened and in walked my brother Brian, my sister in law Alice, my niece Heather, and my nephew Travis. They took one look at Grandma resting peacefully and said it was time for real food. Off we went to Ryan's Steak House. The moment we stepped in, the smell alone lifted our spirits. Turkey with flavor. Potatoes with substance. Stuffing that did not come from a scoop. We filled our plates and laughed like people who had survived something heroic. It was a meal fit for a

This week's question:

A man from our parish, who came to Mass with his family every week, was deported. His wife and children are still here, and I feel heartbroken. Is there anything I can do?

Answer:

Yes, there is. First, pray for them. Prayer isn't a small thing, it's strength when words fall short. Then, reach out to the family. Bring a meal, offer rides, help with Faith Formation, or simply listen. The Church teaches that we are one body in Christ. When one member suffers, we all do. You can also ask your pastor or parish office if there's a diocesan immigration ministry or Catholic Charities contact. Your compassion and presence speak the Gospel louder than any homily ever could. poor. Beauty lifts the soul. Charity feeds it. The Church is called to do both.



The Solemnity of Christ the King

Sunday is the Thirty-Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time and the last week of the liturgical year. As always on this last Sunday, we celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King. The readings remind us of God's faithfulness to us as he promises to shepherd the people of Israel. In Luke's Gospel we are taken to the crucifixion and Jesus being mocked as "King of the Jews." The man crucified next to him asks Jesus to remember him when he gets into his Kingdom. Jesus replies, "Amen, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise."

In the US, Thursday is Thanksgiving Day, with its own set of readings.

The first reading this last week of the liturgical year is from the Book of Daniel. These apocalyptic and mystical readings were written to give encouragement to the Jewish people in the face of persecution.

The stories in the Gospel of Luke this week offer a look at the meaning of generosity as the poor widow offers her two small coins. Jesus cautions against those who will come in his name promising salvation: "Do not follow them!" The cost of following his teaching is made clear, "You will be hated by all because of my name, but not a hair on your head will be destroyed." In a dramatic look at the end time, echoing the Daniel readings, Jesus says, "And then they will see the Son of Man coming in a cloud with power and great glory." Jesus continues the "end time" message saying, "know that the Kingdom of God is near. Amen, I say to you, this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place." He cautions, "Beware that your hearts do not become drowsy from carousing and drunkenness and the anxieties of daily life, and that day catch you by surprise like a trap."

The First Sunday of Advent begins a new liturgical year and the beginning of a season filled with the riches of our scripture readings. For the next few weeks, the main focus will be on the first reading, with the gospel chosen to accompany it. Isaiah offers the people of God a promise of peace: "They shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks." Matthew's gospel is the story of Noah and a caution from Jesus to prepare "for an hour you do not expect."

Daily Prayer This Week

The old and the new come together this week as we bring this liturgical year to a close and look ahead to Advent, which begins Sunday. We reflect that Jesus is our Savior and King. This means we are called to help build up the kingdom by loving Jesus in our poorest brothers and sisters. We will encounter readings about the generosity of a poor widow and the warning of the approaching end of time. This is meant to help us begin our preparations for Advent. The actual end of the world may not be at hand, but the Kingdom of God is always at hand for us. It takes focus and paying attention to notice the signs, the ways the Lord makes himself available to us in the midst of our busy days.

We prepare for Advent this week when we can begin a small, but honest prayer, "Come, Lord, Jesus. Come into this place and into the conflict in my life. Let me be attentive and open to see the places where I am restless, distracted and too busy. Come into my real situation - not the way I present myself to others. Come to me - the real me that needs you." We need this kind of preparation. These are challenging times. Holidays stretch us and test us. Sometimes, under the stress of it all, we regress into behaviors that are bad and destructive, because they are familiar and what so many others are doing. Relationships get strained. Alcohol rarely brings cheer without at times risking bad patterns. So, praying these days - while very busy - praying out of our needs and even our pain - roots us in relationship with the One who always comes to save us.

For those of us in the U.S., we shouldn't miss reflecting on the meaning of Thanksgiving Day. It is an important time to be grateful for what we have received and to accept our responsibility for being good stewards of what we have, sharing God's gifts to us in loving service to others.

For all of us, this is a week to be grateful and to experience the beginning of Advent on Sunday. We can prepare to walk into Church more alert, more ready to explore our longing. We can take advantage of the many resources offered on the "Praying Advent" pages.

As we grow in our practice of connecting with our Lord and friend in brief moments throughout each day, we can develop the habit of giving thanks each night for what we have received.




