MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

Father Steve Pautler

“Bethlehem, Main Street, and a Pastor Who Needed a Breather.”

Fourth Sunday of Advent brings a quiet steadiness. The candles burn low. Hearts lean forward. Schedules spin. I know the drill. Taking a few days away during Advent is not something I usually do. I broke a cardinal rule and tried to finish every Advent task before I slipped out of town last Sunday. It did not work and I am not shocked. Advent never bows to our timetables. Still, I stepped away, returned with some peace in my bones, and feel ready for Christmas.

My days away mixed rest with prayer. They also mixed prayer with four long days at the Magic Kingdom in Orlando. Yes, you read that correctly. The pastor ran off to see a giant mouse. I first visited the place when I was eleven and it had not opened yet. They called it a preview. I called it incredible. Since then, I have been hooked. This visit felt different. The whole park shimmered with Christmas spirit. Bright garlands. Towering trees. Carols drifting from every corner. They even make it snow on Main Street. I know it is soap and water, but at my age if it looks like snow and falls like snow, it is snow.

There was another detail that lingered with me long after the fireworks faded. The sheer number of people from every corner of the globe. I stood in line for a ride and heard five languages in six minutes. I watched families from Europe, South America, Asia, Canada, and every one of our fifty states. They stood with the same wide eyes. They saved their money. They made the trip. They hoped the experience would be worth the effort. These small things echoed in my heart. The Gospel this Sunday draws us into another journey. Joseph wrestles with fear after learning Mary carries a child not his own. He tries to act with honor. He thinks in silence. Then in the stillness of night, God interrupts him. Joseph is told to take Mary into his home. He is told this child will save the world. He wakes with clarity. He obeys and begins a road that will take them from Nazareth to Bethlehem.

I watched crowds move through a theme park and thought of those ancient travelers. People crossing hills and valleys for a census. People carrying customs, accents, and stories. Joseph and Mary walked among them. Their journey held no fireworks. No artificial snow. Only trust and quiet courage.


As this final week of Advent opens, I hope you find rest. I hope you step back long enough to let the Lord steady your heart. Christmas is near. Let us walk toward Bethlehem together.

This week's question:

Why are there different seasons like Ordinary Time, Lent, Christmas, Advent, and Easter?

Answer:

The Church's seasons are like a rhythm that keeps our faith alive and moving. Ordinary Time helps us grow in steady grace. Advent teaches us to wait in hope. Christmas bursts with joy and wonder. Lent pulls us back to prayer and penance. Easter celebrates victory and renewal. Each season tunes our hearts to a different note in God's great symphony. Without them, faith could get flat and dull, like singing "Alleluia" on repeat with no breaks. God knew we'd need both quiet and celebration to stay balanced.





Fourth Week of Advent

On the Fourth Sunday of Advent, we read in Matthew’s Gospel about Joseph and his decision to divorce the pregnant Mary. An angel comes to Joseph: “Do not be afraid to take Mary your wife into your home. For it is through the Holy Spirit that this child has been conceived in her.”

Luke’s Gospel is our guide this week. Monday, Mary responds to her cousin Elizabeth: “My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord; my spirit rejoices in God my savior for he has looked upon his lowly servant...From this day all generations will call me blessed.” Tuesday is the naming of John by Zechariah. Wednesday, during the day, we hear Zechariah’s prayer of praise after being allowed to speak again. The scenes and canticles, or songs, which are part of the story, are so well known to us that we can miss hearing them with an open heart. If we celebrate the Vigil of Christmas on Wednesday, Matthew’s Gospel (though any of the gospels for Christmas may be used at any of the Christmas liturgies) offers the history of Jesus’ family.

The first celebration of The Nativity of the Lord is the Mass at Midnight. The first reading is from Isaiah: “The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; upon those who dwelt in the land of gloom a light has shone.” This powerful reading deserves a slow contemplation. The Gospel is from Luke: the journey to Bethlehem, the birth, the angels announce the birth to the shepherds. The second celebration of The Nativity of the Lord is the Mass at Dawn. The Gospel is from Luke: the shepherds visit the newborn child. “And Mary kept all these things, reflecting on them in her heart.” The third celebration of The Nativity of the Lord is the Mass during the Day. Here the Gospel is from the beginning of John’s Gospel: “And the Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us, and we saw his glory, the glory as of the Father’s only Son, full of grace and truth.”

December 26th celebrates St. Stephen, the first martyr. December 27th is the feast of the Beloved Disciple, St. John, Apostle and Evangelist. The Sunday that follows Christmas is always the celebration of The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. It is also the second day in the eight days of celebrating Christmas. There are wonderful readings from the Book of Sirach, the First Book of Samuel, Paul’s letter to the Colossians or the First Letter of John. The gospel from Matthew is the story of the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream, telling him to flee with Mary and their newborn son, Jesus, to Egypt so Herod could not find them. After a time, they returned and lived in Nazareth, “so that what had been spoken through the prophets might be fulfilled, he shall be called a Nazorean.”

Daily Prayer This Week

This may be one of the most difficult weeks to be reflective throughout each day. This weekend may be quite full for many of us. Others of us may be alone although we may be a part of the faith community on Wednesday or Thursday, or perhaps daily this week. While some of us have guests staying with us and a house to clean this week, others of us will be reviewing memories and struggling, even a little, with being alone.

Even though this may be a very busy week, with final Christmas preparations, or perhaps travel to visit family, it can be a contemplative week if we focus our desires each morning. No matter what our days hold, we can take a few minutes in the shower or while getting dressed to consciously ask for the grace to approach Christmas with faith and with a heart open to the graces offered us. “Lord, help me today to stay focused on your coming in the flesh to be with us. While I’m busy about this and that, I ask your help. Keep reminding me throughout this day about Mary’s acceptance of your plan for her, about the poverty into which Jesus was born.” We will use our own words to connect these stories of our Salvation with the concrete interactions and events of our upcoming day.

Then, throughout the day, we will be able to let familiar parts of the story sustain us this week. All of us can relate to Zechariah’s hesitation. We can look for and notice the times when we are hesitant to place our trust in God and how little we have to say about faith. But, when Zechariah could write “His name is John (God is gracious),” Zechariah could speak again. As we rush from one place to another, we can pray, “Lord, I know you are gracious, even when I act like I doubt it. Let me place my trust in you.”

Mary herself can be a wonderful guide for us this week, and we can be bold in asking her to show us the graces her Son wants to give us this week. The one who says “Behold the handmaid of the Lord” and “My being proclaims the greatness of the Lord” can help us find words for our “yes” and for our giving praise to God this week.

It could be a great grace to pause before going to church, Christmas Eve or Christmas morning, as individuals or for a brief prayer as a family, to ask for the grace to be touched by how he came in history for us and how he comes now among us still, to set us free.

From now until the celebration that closes the Christmas season - the Baptism of the Lord on January 12th -- we can enter more fully into this sacred season.



EPA Cleaning Up Lead in Sandoval – Free Yard Testing

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, with U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, **requests access** from property owners in Sandoval to test their soil for lead and arsenic. **Lead can be toxic and is especially harmful to children.** Waste material from the former Sandoval Zinc Co. smelter was used as fill in village properties and roadways. 
