## Reverend Steven Pautler

Some of you remember the days when Catholic school desks came equipped with only the bare essentials: a No. 2 pencil, a holy card of St. Jude (because we were all hopeless), and a copy of the Baltimore Catechism—which, let's be honest, weighed more than most second graders.

Before Vatican II, you didn't "talk about your faith." You recited it. Word. For, Word! You knew the answer to every question because *Sister Mary Adrenaline* was standing over your desk with a ruler in one hand and eternal consequences in the other. Personal reflection? That was what you did when you got sent to see Father.


Then came the post-Vatican II era. Suddenly, we traded in the "Q and A" for "Let's hold hands and imagine walking on a beach with Jesus while writing a haiku about inner peace." And hey, who doesn't love Jesus on a beach? But somewhere along the shoreline, we dropped our catechism in the surf. Out went memorization and in came meditation—just with a little too much lava lamp and not enough doctrine.

To be fair, there was some beauty in learning to pray from the heart, but let's not forget—knowing what we believe gives power to what we believe. You can only "walk with Jesus" so far before someone asks you why you're walking with Him... and if all you've got is a vague sense of "good vibes" and the scent of incense, you might end up accidentally quoting a yoga poster instead of the Nicene Creed. Now, we've wised up. Turns out, there was some wisdom in those old-school memory drills. After all, when someone asks, "What is the Blessed Trinity?" I don't want to say, "It's like a clover... or a triangle... or a really complicated family reunion." I want to be able to say, "One God, three Divine Persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Boom."

Memorization wasn't just about parroting lines—it gave us anchors. Solid truths that don't shift with the tide. No matter your generation, from the nuns-with-rulers era to the guitar-Mass crowd, one thing has never changed: *The Holy Trinity. Three Divine Persons in one God.* Let that sink in.

And for the record... yes, the Father is God. Yes, the Son is God. Yes, the Holy Ghost is God. No, they are not triplets. Got it? Good. Now go find your old catechism, dust it off, and remind yourself why you memorized it in the first place. Sister might still be watching... and God definitely still is.

And here's the funny thing—what we memorized as kids has a sneaky way of showing up just when we need it. At a bedside. In a cri-sis. In a moment of doubt. Like spiritual muscle memory, those lines we drilled into our brains echo back and remind us: we are loved by the Father, redeemed by the Son, and filled with the Holy Ghost. That's not just theology, *it's truth worth re-*



# The Eleventh Week of Ordinary Time

The week begins with **Trinity Sunday**, which always follows **Pentecost**. It celebrates the un-knowable relationship between the Father, Son and the Holy Spirit - and their loving support for us in our lives.

On Thursday, most of the world will celebrate the **Body and Blood of Christ**, (Corpus Christi). In the U.S., this will be celebrated next Sunday.

In the **Second Letter to the Corinthians**, Paul is defending himself. He tells the people of Corinth -- and us -- not to receive the grace of God in vain. Paul reminds them about generosity and cheerful giving. He begs the community not to dismiss him because of his poor speaking abilities saying, "Even if I am untrained in speaking, I am not so in knowledge." He boasts about his weakness, which he had at first begged to be freed from by the Lord, who said to him, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness."

In the **Sermon on the Mount** Jesus calls us beyond simply being moral. His message is not an "eye for an eye," but turning the other cheek, loving our enemies and praying for them. Jesus cautions us about performing good deeds for others to see. He teaches us to pray simply, because our Father knows what we need. "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and decay destroy, and thieves break in and steal.... For where your treasure is, there also will your heart be." Focus on God, not the world: "No one can serve two masters... You cannot serve God and mammon."

Sunday in the U.S. is the **The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ**. For the rest of the world it is the **Twelfth Week of Ordinary Time.** We have **Luke's Gospel**with powerful words of sacrifice and focus for our lives: "If
anyone wishes to come after me, he must deny himself and
take up his cross daily and follow me. For whoever wishes to
save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake
will save it."

# **Daily Prayer This Week**

There is nothing like the Sermon on the Mount to help us hear the message of Jesus, and to let ourselves be addressed by those words. All of us can ask for the graces Jesus promises us - with real people and real daily circumstances in mind. We know with whom we need to "turn the other cheek" and to love more. We know the situations in which we are tempted to "be religious" in those circumstances only.

Upon reflection, each of us can take the time to "locate" our hearts, by discovering what we tend to treasure. How can we really know what we treasure? We can make a list of the "five most important things" in our lives. Then we make a list of the five things we spend most of our time on. Comparing the lists will help us get concrete about asking the Lord for the grace we need to put our lives back in balance. All of us can name what we worry about. And so we can all ask for the graces to "seek first" the Kingdom of God.

All of this reflection can happen throughout the week in the background of our daily life, if we get into the habit of focusing for a few moments each morning. If we take just 30 seconds, at the edge of our bed each morning, it will begin to establish a habit of living more reflectively.

Thank you for this day, Lord. Help me to be focused today on not getting so hooked by Mary's ways or Chris' harsh words. I need your grace to place my trust in you. Help me especially before I have to talk with Mary on the phone and let me stay focused before Chris comes home from work.

This version of a brief moment with the Lord - friend to friend - can be repeated and made more specific, while we are going about our days. Some days, we might have 20 such moments of prayerful conversation with our Lord - guided by the Word, the desires that are surfacing, and the events of our daily lives. And, each night, we can give thanks for this deeper relationship with the Lord that is developing in our hearts.




