MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

You Can't Take It With You (Not Even the Fondue Set)

Many of you know the joy, and by joy, I mean agony, of clearing out a house, garage, or storage unit. It's never just a quick job. It's like an archaeological dig mixed with a reality TV show. You go in thinking, "**This won't take long,**" but by hour three, you're knee-deep in boxes of random holiday décor and wondering why you still own five broken lamps and a fondue set from 1978!

Last summer, after my mother passed away, my family decided to sell the family home. Two weeks, four high school teenagers (bless their energy), and two roll-off dumpsters later, the place was finally empty. And even then, we were still saying things like, "*We should keep that lamp, Mom liked it.*" Or, "*Hey, here's my old Commodore 64 computer, this has to be worth something by now!*" **Spoiler alert: it's not!**

It's shocking how much stuff we collect. Somewhere along the way, we convince ourselves that these things are treasures. We tell ourselves, "**I might need this one day,**" even though we haven't touched it in 20 years. But Jesus' parable in Luke 12 cuts right through our clutter. The rich man stores up grain, builds bigger barns, and thinks he's set for life. God, however, calls him a fool, because while he was hoarding possessions, he wasn't storing up anything that truly mattered in the Kingdom.

Jesus isn't against "stuff." He's against the kind of thinking that makes stuff the center of our lives. He's teaching us to live with open hands rather than clenched fists. You can't take your barn with you when you die (and frankly, most barns aren't that nice to begin with).

The truth is, heaven won't care about your vintage VHS collection or the box of mystery cords we all have, you know, the one where none of the cords actually fit any modern device. What really matters is what we've given away: our time, our compassion, our love. Those are the treasures that last.

So maybe this week, it's time to let go of some clutter, not just the dusty boxes in the attic, but the clutter in our hearts. Forgive someone. Share a meal. Send that encouraging text. Because at the end of the day, God's barns are bigger than anything we could ever build, and His storage plan? **Eternal!**


This week's question: "*I'm confused! During the 'Lord's Prayer' at Mass, some people hold hands, others keep their hands folded. So, what's the correct thing to do?*"

Answer: Ah, the "**Our Father hand-holding**" debate, almost as famous as "who makes the best potato salad at the parish picnic." Here's the truth: **The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM)**, which tells us how to celebrate Mass, says that the priest prays the "**The Lord's Prayer**" with hands extended (the orans posture), but it does not instruct the congregation to do this. That gesture is reserved for the priest because he prays in the person of Christ for all of us.

So, what's the proper posture for the congregation? Standing, with hands folded or at your side, that's the traditional norm. Holding hands or raising hands is not in the rubrics, but the Church hasn't officially forbidden it either. If your family or neighbor wants to hold hands, you can choose to join or simply pray quietly with folded hands. What matters most is the reverence and unity of our prayer, not whether everyone matches in movement.

The "**The Lord's Prayer**" is about lifting our hearts to God together, not about hand placement competitions. God

Daily Prayer This Week

Eighteenth Week of Ordinary Time

On the Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, the first reading from Ecclesiastes offers a powerful caution about focusing too much on the things of this world: "Vanity of vanities! All things are vanity!" In Luke's gospel Jesus tells the parable of the rich man storing up treasures for the future, and he warns, "Take care to guard against all greed, for though one may be rich, one's life does not consist of possessions."

Wednesday is the Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord, with its own special readings. Friday is the Memorial of Saint Dominic.

We continue the story of Moses leading the Israelites out of Egypt. This week our readings are from the Book of Numbers for the first several days and from the Book of Deuteronomy on Friday.

In Matthew's Gospel this week we hear some marvelous words about faith and discipleship. The "feeding of the 5,000" comes after the disciples ask Jesus to send the crowd away because they didn't know how to feed them. Jesus tells them to "give them some food yourselves" and blesses the loaves and fishes. Jesus comes to his disciples across the water in a storm, and invites Peter to come to him, across the water; when Peter comes, he takes his eyes off Jesus and goes down. A persistent Canaanite woman begs Jesus for help for her daughter. When he refuses, she persists and he replies, "O woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish." Jesus asks his disciples, "Who do people say that I am?" and Peter replies, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." But when Peter tries to stop Jesus from talking about the hardships that are ahead, Jesus tells him, "Get behind me, Satan!" He gives his followers a guide for their lives: "Whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it." The disciples wonder why they could not drive out a demon from a boy, Jesus answers, "Because of your little faith." Faith "the size of a mustard seed" is enough.

Sunday is the Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time. In Luke's Gospel, Jesus cautions us to be ready for the coming of the Lord. "Be sure of this: if the master of the house had known the hour when the thief was coming, he would not have let his house be broken into.

This week we can ask, in the variety of ways, in the situations of our daily lives, that our eyes might be opened to see Jesus as he really is - glorified, with the Father, and ready to renew our faith and trust in him.

As we begin our day, and at brief times throughout our day, we can pull our consciousness together by letting the themes of this week's reading guide us.

One day, we might ask to keep our eyes fixed on Jesus as we go through a day full of strong wind and waves. We can ask again and again, as things get tougher and more challenging. Another day, we might focus on what comes out of our mouths. Is there cynicism, judgments, distortions of the truth, divisive and self-serving manipulation, yelling and hurtful put-downs? How do I practice using my voice to give praise to God by affirming others, forgiving them, by telling the truth, by defending the poor and the voiceless, by giving God thanks?

Another day, I might be conscious of those I regard as "dogs," those I disdain or think of as "the enemy." I might ask for the grace to open my heart to whatever faith in God they have, however different from mine. I might ask for a sense of solidarity with them, not because it is my desire or inclination, but because it is God's desire for me. How can I heal and reconcile, at least in my heart, what needs healing: racism, sexism, anti-Semitism, anti-Muslimism, fear and hatred of foreigners, hostility against the poor or my harsh judgments about "sinners."

Later in the week, we can get in touch with the call of Jesus to deny ourselves. This is not self-denial for its own sake. This is the dying to self that comes from loving in the self-sacrificing way that Jesus did. Who in my family, friends, relative, co-workers, members of my parish or congregation needs my self-denying love? How have I focused on "gaining the world" and lost some of my true self in the process? Is there some way this week that I can taste discovering my true self in giving some time, some compassion, some love, some special care to someone who needs this from me?
