SOLEMNITY OF THE EPIPHANY THE BLESSING OF HOMES AND THE CHALKING OF DOORS



20 + C + M + B + 26

On the Solemnity of the Epiphany, you are invited to take blessed chalk home and mark your door in prayer. This simple act places Christ at the center of your home and asks his protection and peace upon all who enter. It remembers the Magi who welcomed the Lord and confessed their faith without hesitation. A marked doorway speaks quietly and firmly. This house belongs to Christ.

How to bless your house: After Epiphany Mass, take home the blessed chalk. A family member, priest or deacon traces on the door lintel: a cross (+), the current year (20+C+M+B+26 for 2026), and C+M+B (*Christus mansionem benedicat: "May Christ bless this house"*). This invokes Christ's protection via the Magi's intercession, often with children in procession and offerings for charity.

Leader: "Be present, O Lord, to your servants who dwell in this house and humbly beg your blessing, that they may feel you a refuge as they dwell in it, rejoice in your companionship as they go out from it, and enjoy you as their guest when they return, until they come happily to the home you have prepared for them in the house of your Father. Who live and reign forever and ever. **R. Amen.**"



MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

“Epiphany. When the Music Stops, and God Keeps Talking .”

Epiphany has arrived, which means Christmas ends in the most official unofficial way possible. The Kings show up, gifts in hand, and many of us think, well, that’s it. Lights come down. Trees get hauled out. Somewhere in the house a box of Valentine hearts waits quietly, wherever we hid it last year.

I hope your Christmas brought rest, laughter, and time with people who matter. I enjoyed a first this year. Christmas dinner outside, gathered around a picnic table, with a s’mores fire working hard. It was seventy degrees. December felt confused. Nobody complained.

Our family adds another celebration to Christmas. My nephew Travis was born on Christmas Eve, so Jesus and Travis share the spotlight every year. Travis handles it well, which makes him easy to tease. His uncle Steve takes that responsibility seriously. Each year I look for something new. This year delivered. I found a birthday card with a special feature. Once opened, it sings Happy Birthday. Loudly. Repeatedly. It does not pause. It does not rest. It does not forgive. The only solution involved the s’mores fire. Even then, it took time. Family laughter followed. Travis survived. Christmas memories secured.

Epiphany reminds us God often speaks after the noise settles. No crowds. No announcements. The Magi notice. They kneel. They offer what they brought. Then they leave changed, thinking differently and choosing a new direction. Epiphany invites us to do the same as the year begins. Pay attention. Give what you have. Move forward with clearer purpose.

Epiphany also marks the moment when the nonstop Christmas soundtrack finally ends. Parties wrap up. Shopping bags disappear. Next week we remember the Baptism of the Lord, and Ordinary Time begins. Life returns to its steady rhythm, faithful and familiar.

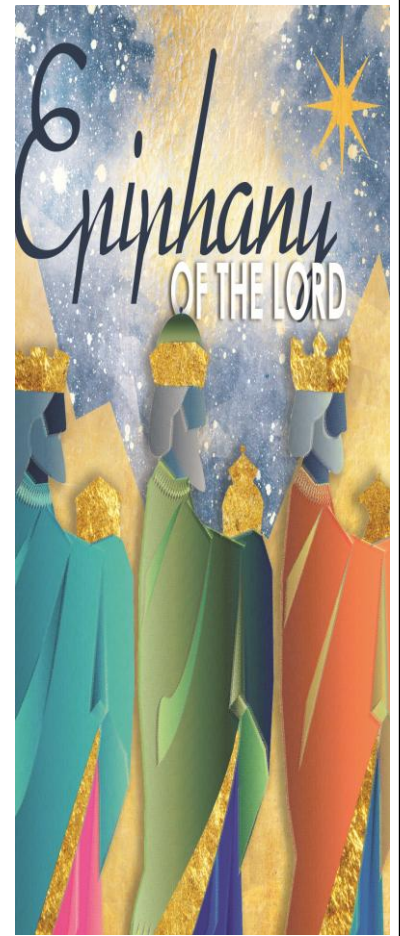
Our journey does not stop with Christmas decorations packed away. God keeps working. Grace keeps nudging. Faith keeps growing. Much like that birthday card, the message does not shut off easily. It keeps going, sometimes louder than expected, often longer than planned. The difference is this message brings life. Welcome to the new year. Keep your eyes open. God is still revealing himself. And if someone hands you a singing birthday card, head for the fire without delay.

This week’s question:

Our manger scenes show three kings front and center. When I searched the Bible for their big entrance on Christ-mas night, I came up empty. Where do the Magi appear, and why do they seem to run late?

Answer:

The Magi appear in Matthew chapter two, not on Christmas night. By the time they arrive, Jesus is living in a house, not resting in the manger, which explains why the wise men stand off to the side in many nativity scenes. Epiphany celebrates seekers who take their time and reminds us life needs quiet moments and joyful ones to stay balanced. It tells us faith grows through showing up and paying attention.

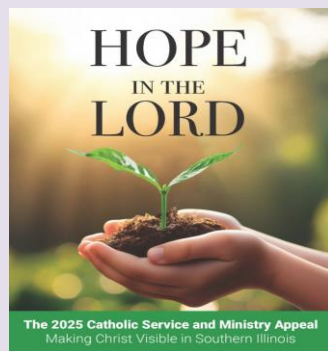

VOCATION CORNER: JANUARY 04, 2026

What a wonderful Gospel account of the Magi traveling to meet the Lord. They followed the star – their "call" – to come and offer their gifts to the Lord. But the question arises as to how the Magi noticed a star at night and no one else really did. Perhaps we need to embrace the "night," the stillness, to "see and hear" our call. How are we doing in discerning our call to Holiness – in living our vocation as man, woman, or child; married or single; priesthood or religious – of being called to something beyond our selves?

Quote for the week: It is Christmas every time you let God love others through you

Christmas Week 3

Sunday is the celebration around the world of the Epiphany of the Lord. The light has come into the darkness of the world and our salvation was made known to the Gentiles. The Prophet Isaiah offers us a vibrant image of hope and fulfillment: "Rise up in splendor, Jerusalem! Your light has come, the glory of the Lord shines upon you." Matthew's Gospel brings us the story of the Magi and their encounter with Herod on the way to "do homage" to the newborn King of the Jews. "And behold, the star that they had seen at its rising preceded them, until it came and stopped over the place where the child was."

In the week that follows the Epiphany we continue with more of the beautiful first readings from the First Letter of John. He wants us to believe the message: we are from God and are loved by God and "Whoever is without love does not know God, for God is love."

The Gospels this week are from all four gospel writers, Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. We read of Jesus traveling through Galilee "teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the Gospel of the Kingdom, and curing every disease and illness among the people." He feeds loaves and fishes to the hungry and exhorts his disciples, "Take courage, it is I, do not be afraid!" when they are caught in a storm at sea. When he reads from the scriptures at the synagogue, he proclaims, "Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing."

Sunday is the The Baptism of the Lord. We hear the Lord say in the first reading from Isaiah, "Here is my servant whom I uphold, my chosen one with whom I am pleased, upon whom I have put my spirit." Those words are echoed in the reading from Matthew's Gospel, "'This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased.'" This feast marks the end of the Christmas season and the beginning of Ordinary Time on the Church calendar.

Daily Prayer This Week

This week is a time with two special Sundays book-ending the week. Both celebrations offer an "epiphany," an understanding and insight into the essence of who Jesus really is. When the Wisemen visit the poorest of families and find the baby Jesus, they have a clearer idea of what kind of king he will be.

At the Baptism of the Lord the following Sunday, Jesus is baptized and the skies open and the voice of God proclaims, "This is my beloved Son." More than just a prophet, this special relationship with God is made manifest in that moment.

How can we make this week a special one as the Christmas season draws to a close? In some parts of the world daylight is plentiful right now, but for many of us the days are short and the dark of night surrounds us many hours each day. This could be the week to reflect on that darkness and the light that Jesus brings into our hearts.

Each morning as our feet touch the floor next to our beds, we can open our hands briefly in the darkness and ask God to show us the light in our lives. Gratitude is a wonderful way to pray and to recognize the light we sometimes don't notice in our lives. Maybe in this final week of Christmas, we can light a candle at dinner and remember a special blessing we have been given or something we are grateful for in our lives.

Dear Lord,

You came to your disciples when they felt alone on the stormy waters and comforted them with your presence. Be with me today and let my heart be touched by the the love you so lavishly give to me. Let me remember to turn to you in my fears and darkness and know that you will heal me.

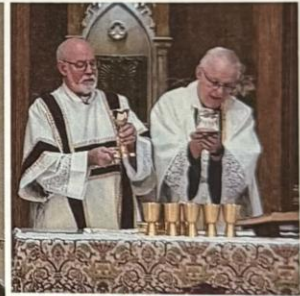

A Church Full of Joy, Children, Families, and Faith at Christmas.

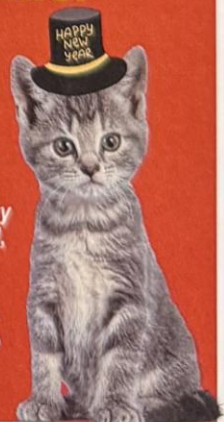

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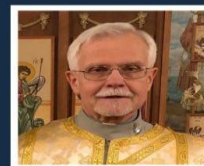
