

MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

“Testing the Water and Claiming the Beloved.”

Baptisms sit near the top of my list of favorite moments as a priest. Families arrive gathered together with a mix of joy, nerves, and pride, holding a child who has already changed their lives. A baptism gathers grandparents, parents, godparents, cousins, and friends into one space for one purpose. A new life is being welcomed not only into a family, but into the life of God.

Before the baptism begins, I enjoy inviting one of the younger family members forward to help me. I ask them to check the water and tell me if it feels cold. The answers range from confident yeses to thoughtful shrugs, and sometimes an honest “I don’t know.” Then I ask if they think the baby will cry. Laughter follows, predictions fly, and suddenly the youngest members of the family are part of the moment in a real way. They are not watching from the pew. They are involved, included, and remembered.

As the baptism approaches, I invite everyone to step closer. I want them to see it happen, to hear the words, and to notice the water. Baptism is deeply personal for the child being baptized, yet it also belongs to everyone present. Each baptism renews something in all of us, whether we realize it or not.

The Gospel today places us at the Jordan River, where Jesus steps forward to be baptized by John. This scene deserves our attention. Jesus does not begin his public ministry with a sermon, a sign, or a display of power. He enters the water with everyone else. He stands among sinners and receives baptism, even when John hesitates and questions the moment. Jesus insists, because this is where his mission begins. Heaven opens, the Spirit descends, and the voice of the Father declares love and approval.

The baptism of the Lord reveals the heart of God. God chooses closeness. God enters ordinary human moments and fills them with grace. The Jordan River becomes holy ground because Jesus steps into it. From that day forward, water tells a new story. Every baptism carries that same story. Water flows, a name is spoken, and God claims a child as beloved. The child may cry or sleep through the moment, yet God’s promise does not waver. Parents and godparents make promises they will spend years learning how to live. The Church surrounds them and accepts re-sponsibility for helping this child grow in faith.

When I ask whether the baby will cry, I am not worried about the outcome. Noise, movement, and tears belong to real life, and God works there with ease. Baptism does not require perfection. It requires presence. Each baptism reminds us who we are and who we belong to. We are not gathered as strangers. We stand together as sons and daughters of the same Father. The words spoken over Jesus at the Jordan still echo today. Beloved. Chosen. Claimed. That truth holds steady long after the water dries.

This week's question:

I heard an interesting thing the other day. Someone I knew was upset because her daughter and son in law never had their newborn baptized. She went ahead and baptized the baby in the kitchen sink! Was this a legitimate baptism?

Answer:

Yes, it could be a valid baptism, but it was not done properly. Baptism is valid when real water is used, the words “I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit” are spoken, and the person intends to do what the Church does. The location does not matter. What matters is intention and form. A grandparent baptizing without parental consent, outside an emergency, acts against Church order. Valid does not mean appropriate!



WORLD DAY OF CONSECRATED LIFE



VOCATION CORNER: JANUARY 11, 2026

Our Gospel for today tells of Jesus beginning his public life by being baptized in the Jordan. He accepts His "call" from the Father to evangelize and ultimately save us from our sins. "This is my Beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased." Our mission is to follow our own call to evangelize. This may be through the priesthood, sisterhood, marriage, or the single life. We need to step up to accept our mission so the Father can say of us "with whom I am well pleased."

Quote for the week: *Remain faithful to the grace of God*

Ordinary Time Week 1

Sunday is the The Baptism of the Lord. We hear the Lord say in the first reading from Isaiah, “Here is my servant whom I uphold, my chosen one with whom I am pleased, upon whom I have put my spirit.” Those words are echoed in Matthew’s Gospel, ““This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased.” The Baptism is the feast that marks the end of the Christmas season. We begin 34 weeks of “Ordinary Time,” which are all of the weeks outside of the Advent/Christmas and Lent/Easter seasons. Ordinary Time will continue until Ash Wednesday on February 18.

Saturday is the Memorial of Saint Anthony, abbot.

During the weekdays, we begin a three-week cycle of captivating readings from the First Book of Samuel. We read of Samuel’s mother, Hannah, who promises the Lord, “if you give your handmaid a male child, I will give him to the LORD for as long as he lives.” Samuel hears a call from the Lord and responds, “Speak, for your servant is listening.” An epic battle against the Philistines ends in devastating losses for Israel and the capture of the Ark of the Covenant. In his old age, Samuel rules Israel and the elders ask Samuel to appoint a King to rule them.

For the next few weeks, until the beginning of Lent, the weekday gospels are from Mark’s Gospel. Mark offers us a look at the beginning of Jesus public ministry. Jesus calls his first disciples, fisherman at work: Simon and Andrew, then James and John. “Then they left their nets and followed him.” He drives out evil spirits and heals the sick. He hears the cry of the leper: “If you wish, you can make me clean,” and Jesus, “moved with pity” heals him. Jesus extends an invitation to the despised tax collector, Levi: “Follow me.”

The Second Sunday of Ordinary Time offers us beautiful readings. From the Prophet Isaiah: “I am made glorious in the sight of the LORD, and my God is now my strength! It is too little, the LORD says, for you to be my servant... I will make you a light to the nations...” In John’s Gospel we see the story of John the Baptist and his followers walking down the beach as Jesus walks toward them. John says, ““Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world.

He is the one of whom I said, ‘A man is coming after me who ranks ahead of me because he existed before me.’ ‘A man is coming after me who ranks ahead of me because he existed before me.’

Daily Prayer This Week

In this first week of Ordinary Time, we might find ourselves feeling a little let-down after the Christmas season, especially in parts of the world where it seems cold and dark most days. This is where we can ask for the grace to let the stories of the gospels come alive in our hearts.

The vivid narratives of this week’s gospel are packed with stories of Jesus’ entering into the lives of real people and touching them in extraordinary ways. These are not far away stories, but ones that have a real meaning for us. This is a week of invitation from Jesus to us, with two invitations for us to ponder in our hearts this week.

Jesus encounters Levi, a Jewish tax collector. Because of his profession, he was probably wealthy but he has humiliated his family and made himself a pariah to most of those around him. Jesus’ response to this “outcast” was to invite him to be one of his closest disciples - and to dine at his house.

In our own lives we may find a loneliness or separation from people in our family or others in our lives. We have parts of our lives that are dark and embarrassing and seem unchangeable. It is into this very darkness and discomfort that Jesus extends the same invitation to us - “Follow me.” This clear and personal call to us is from Jesus who already knows us and our failings and yet asks us to be with him. We can hear this invitation more clearly if we can be touched with awareness of our own failings and understand more deeply how much we need a savior in our lives. It is then that our hearts open to accept this invitation.

The Sunday gospel is a warm story of Jesus calling two more apostles, asking them, and us, “What are you looking for?” This is a good week for us to contemplate with Jesus, what we are looking for and how much we want to turn and follow him. We can pray to Jesus for the strength to leave the patterns and habits of our lives that so often turn us away from him and ask for the grace to make a new beginning in our lives. If we can sit with our hands open in humility, we can accept that we can’t do this on our own, but know in our hearts that with the help of God, nothing is impossible.
