MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

The Question Everyone Asks and Jesus Answers.

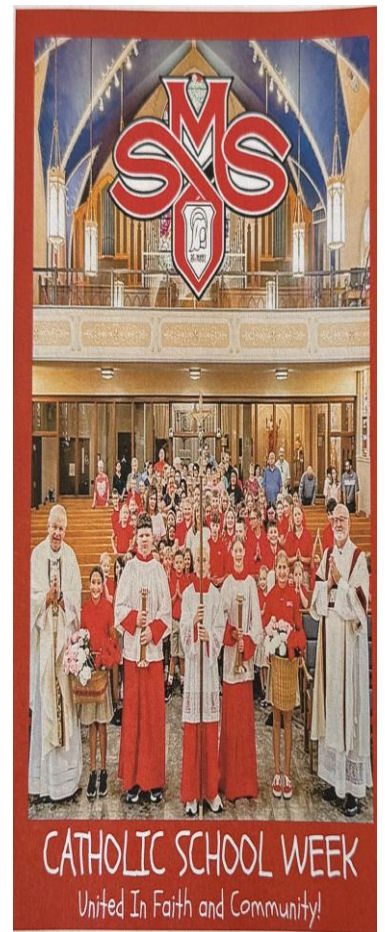
Every family gathering has a moment. Dessert plates sit half full. Then, someone finally leans back in their chair, clears their throat like it is a formal interview, and asks the senior in high school the question. It lands somewhere between a pop quiz and a background check, and everyone suddenly stops chewing. Where are you going to college next year? The answers roll in fast. KC. SIU. SEMO. Harvard if Uncle Bob is listening! Others answer with honesty. I do not know yet. Still deciding. A few brave souls say it out loud. I am not going to college. The room nods. Conversation moves on. The pressure lingers. Planning a future shows up early in life. People talk careers before graduation. Dreams form. Expectations stack up. Some adults smile and feel content with where life landed. Others replay choices during quiet moments. A few avoid the whole topic and keep moving. Life keeps asking the question anyway. What are you going to do with your life? The Gospel of Matthew tells a simpler story. Jesus walks along the Sea of Galilee. No career fair. No five-year plan. He sees Simon and Andrew working. Nets in hand. Boats ready. James and John sit nearby with their father. This family business paid the bills. Fishing brought food to the table. Their future looked predictable. Then Jesus speaks. Follow me. I will make you fishers of people. No resume review happened. No interview followed. No guarantee came with benefits listed. They dropped the nets. They left the boat. James and John even left their father behind. It sounds bold. It sounds risky. It also sounds honest. Jesus did not promise comfort. He offered purpose. Vocation does not always arrive with fireworks. Many follow family trades. Some work jobs chosen out of necessity. Others stumble into roles they never imagined. God works through all of it. The call shows up in ordinary places. A classroom. A kitchen. A job site. A hospital room. A parish hall. The question shifts. Who am I following. Jesus still walks past busy lives. He still sees people working hard. He still calls without shouting. The invitation remains simple. Follow me. Some answer quickly. Others need time. A few feel unsure for years. God stays patient. High school seniors feel the pressure first. Adults feel it too. The Gospel reminds us vocation involves listening more than planning. It grows through faithfulness in daily work. James and John did not stop being fishermen. Their nets changed shape. Their purpose deepened. The real question at Christmas tables deserves an update. Who are you following next year. The answer shapes every path worth taking.

This week's question:

I get this question all the time. Father Steve, why did you wait so long to become a priest?

Answer:

Because God took the long road with me. I lived a full life first. I worked hard. I paid bills. I fixed copy machines. I loved my family. I learned patience the slow way. I learned humility through mistakes. I learned how ordinary people carry faith into long days and tired nights. Priest hood did not arrive late. It arrived on time. God was forming me while I thought I was simply living. When the call came, it came with clarity and peace. I knew who I was. I knew what I was leaving. I knew what I was giving my life to. Waiting was not wasted time. It was preparation. God does not rush souls. And at the right moment, He said, now.

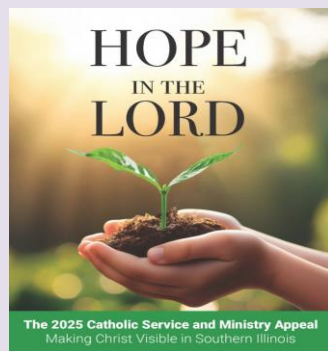

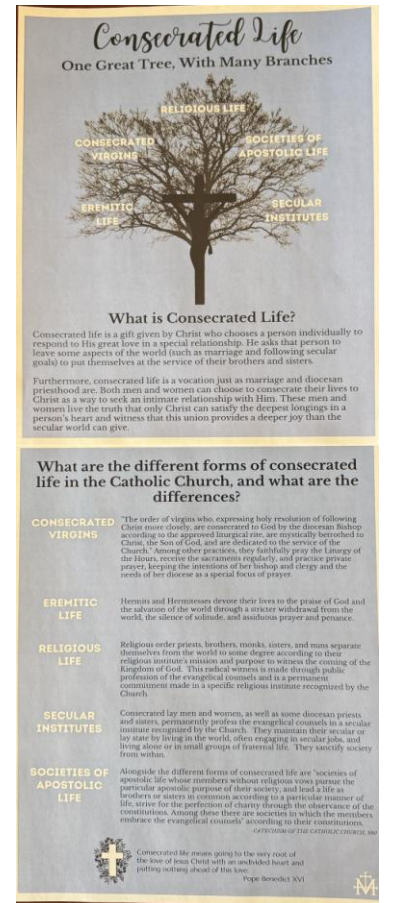

VOCATION CORNER JANUARY 25, 2026

Today's Gospel is the story of Jesus beginning His Church on earth. He calls Peter and Andrew to be "fishers of men." He likewise enlists James and John, Zebedee's sons, to follow Him. We are ALL called to be fishers of men, women, and children through the example of our daily lives. We are charged with "abandoning our nets" and help each other to live the vocation we've each been uniquely called to. We need to minimally pray each day for an increase in vocations to the Priesthood and Consecrated Religious Life.

Quote for the week: You don't have to search for a miracle, it will find you.

Ordinary Time Week 3

The Third Sunday of Ordinary Time brings us to a cycle of Matthew's gospels that will be used during most Sundays of Ordinary Time this year. This week we see the call of the first disciples as Jesus stops Andrew and his brother, Peter on the beach. "'Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men'. At once they left their nets and followed him."

Monday is the Memorial of Saints Timothy and Titus, bishops. Wednesday is the Memorial of Saint Thomas Aquinas, priest and doctor of the Church. Saturday is the Memorial of Saint John Bosco.

This is the third week of readings from Samuel, this week from the Second Book of Samuel. A young David is anointed King of Israel and with his army, captures the city of Zion. In the festivities that followed, Samuel offers the delightful image of a joyful David at the Ark of the Covenant, "dancing before the LORD with abandon ... with shouts of joy and to the sound of the horn." The Lord tells David, "I will raise up your heir after you, sprung from your loins, and I will make his Kingdom firm." David sees Bathsheba, the beautiful wife of Uriah the Hittite and after having relations with her, he orders Uriah to the front of a battle where he is killed. Nathan the prophet confronts David, who repents.

In Mark's Gospel this week, we have many familiar stories. The scribes, hearing of his many healings, accuse Jesus of being possessed by Satan. He replies that a house is divided against itself cannot stand. Mary and other relatives arrive at a home where Jesus is teaching, but Jesus does not go to them, saying, "Whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother." He tells the parable of the sower and the seeds which fall on fertile ground and rocky soil. "Those sown on rich soil are the ones who hear the word and accept it and bear fruit thirty and sixty and a hundredfold." He encourages his disciples not to hide their light "under a bushel basket" and tells the story of the mustard seed, the tiniest seed which grows into one of the largest bushes. In Saturday's gospel the apostles are frightened on a boat in a storm until Jesus awakens to calm the wind and seas.

On the Fourth Sunday of Ordinary Time, we hear Jesus preach the Beatitudes in Matthews Gospel.

Daily Prayer This Week

This is a week where Jesus speaks of seeds being planted and of growing. We are still at the beginning of a new year, and this is a good time to answer the call in our hearts to spend more time with Jesus, in prayer.

"I'm not very good at prayer," we might say. "I don't have the time to pray." Jesus is not waiting for us to be perfect before we talk to him - he is simply waiting, right now, for us to come to him in our own humanity. This week we are invited to uncover the light of our faith, the light that warms the longing we feel in our souls for something different or deeper in our relationship with God. At this beginning of the year, we might step back and examine the ways we talk with Jesus - and the ways we hold him at arm's length.

We are being called into a relationship, a friendship, with someone who delights in us and waits for us to release our fears and come out of hiding. Where do we start? With the desire.

It can be so simple to take the empty moments of our day and just tell the same Jesus who healed and loved on earth, what is in our hearts. In the early morning moments before we get out of bed, while in the shower or traveling to work, cooking or walking the dog - we can stop and open our hearts. "Jesus, you know what is in my heart. You know what my needs are. Help me to be more open to the way you are calling me in my life."

Our prayer can be as simple as opening our hands on our lap for a moment and saying in our own words, "Show me how to come out of hiding. Give me the courage to let go of my fears and bring myself to you in honesty. Let me drop the many defenses I carry that keep me from feeling how deeply you love and accept me."

There is no right or wrong way to approach Jesus - the only right thing is that we come with an open heart and our own desire for something deeper.

Every evening as we end our day, we can sit at the edge of our bed with our hands open and say, "Thank you." We can reflect on the many ways we felt the love of God in our lives that day. What tiny seed was planted in my life to bloom? Where did I shine the light of my own faith on someone?

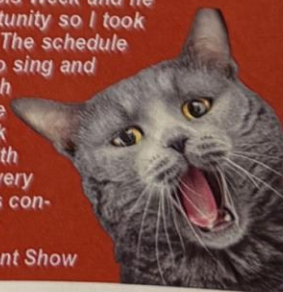
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Purrs from the Pew, Sister Fluff of Divine Mischief

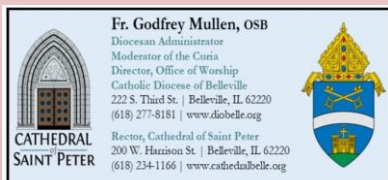

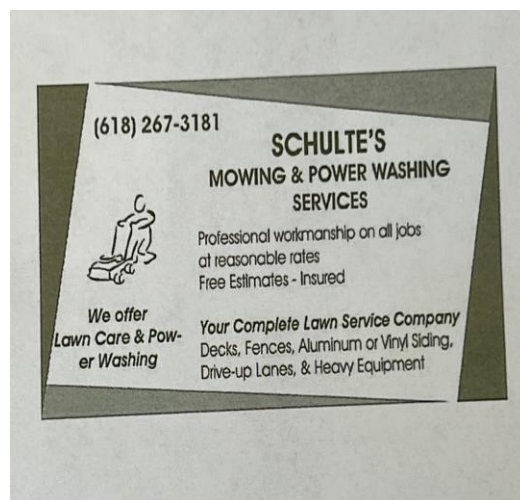
