MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

Simple Steps, Blessed Lives.

Matthew 5:1 to 12a never stays on the page. It walks into hospital rooms, sits at kitchen tables, shows up on ball fields, and yes, more often than I wish, stands beside caskets. When I sit down to prepare a funeral homily, I reach for the Beatitudes. I look at a life and I see pieces of them already written in real days and real choices. Kindness offered when nobody kept score. Patience held onto when it ran thin. Mercy given when pride wanted the last word. These words from Jesus fit real people with real stories.

Still, the Beatitudes speak far beyond funerals. They teach us how to live on an ordinary Tuesday. They guide how we treat the clerk at the store when the line moves slow. They shape how we answer the phone when the name on the screen brings mixed feelings. They help decide what to say, and when to stay quiet. The Beatitudes shape habits, not headlines. They work best in the small moments that never make the news but shape the heart.

I like to picture them as the voice of a GPS for the soul. “Siri, guide me to heaven. Now loading the Beatitudes.” And off we go. Make a left turn toward mercy. Slow down near the school zone of patience. U turn ahead when pride grabs the wheel. Railroad tracks coming up when life jolts without warning. Speed camera detected when temper starts to rise. All very familiar. All very human. If we laugh at this, it is because we recognize ourselves in it.

Life does not move in straight lines. It loops. It stalls. It asks for reroutes. Some days feel smooth and others feel like every light stays red. The Beatitudes keep speaking through every bend and every delay. Blessed are the poor in spirit. Blessed are the meek. Blessed are the peacemakers. These words sound gentle, yet they ask for strength. It takes strength to forgive. It takes strength to stay calm when voices rise. It takes strength to keep loving when gratitude stays quiet. These are not lofty slogans. They are simple directions, steady and firm, spoken by One who knows the road and walks it with us.

Here is the part I love the most. When we miss a turn, God does not shut off the guidance. He does not leave us stuck on the shoulder. Grace keeps speaking. The invitation keeps coming. We learn, we grow, and we try again. The Beatitudes never shame us for falling short. They keep calling us forward, step by step, heart by heart. And after many miles, after long seasons and short ones, after laughter and tears, after prayers whispered and prayers shouted, there comes a line every heart waits to hear. “You have arrived at your destination.” No traffic. No delays. No more rerouting. Only welcome. Only home. Only the joy promised by Jesus when he first spoke these words to the crowd on the hillside.

So today, hear the Beatitudes as more than beautiful lines from a familiar Gospel. Hear them as daily guidance. Small steps count. Quiet choices matter. Faithfulness in hidden places shapes the whole trip more than any single moment ever will. Walk with mercy. Choose peace. Stay gentle. Trust God with the rest. And keep listening for the voice that never gives up on giving directions.

This week's question:

Last weekend our parish held a funeral on Sunday. I thought funerals and Sundays did not mix.

Is a funeral on Sunday allowed, and if I attend, does it fulfill my Sunday obligation?


Answer:

Yes, a funeral Mass is allowed on a Sunday in Ordinary Time, just not on Sundays of Advent, Lent, Easter, or on solemnities. On those Ordinary Time Sundays, the Sunday readings stay, the funeral prayers are added, and the Lord's Day still gets top billing. If you attend that funeral Mass, your Sunday obligation is fulfilled. If it is a funeral service without Mass, your prayers and hugs still count, but you still owe Jesus a visit at Mass later.





What is Consecrated Life?

Consecrated life is a gift given by Christ who chooses a person individually to respond to His great love in a special relationship. He asks that person to leave some aspects of the world (such as marriage and following secular goals) to put themselves at the service of their brothers and sisters.

Furthermore, consecrated life is a vocation just as marriage and diocesan priesthood are. Both men and women can choose to consecrate their lives to Christ as a way to seek an intimate relationship with Him. These men and women live the truth that only Christ can satisfy the deepest longings in a person's heart and witness that this union provides a deeper joy than the secular world can give.

Fourth Week of Ordinary Time

On the Fourth Sunday of Ordinary Time, we hear Jesus preach the Beatitudes in Matthews Gospel.

On Monday, we celebrate the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord. It celebrates Mary and Joseph bringing their baby, Jesus, to the temple and their remarkable encounters with both Simeon and Anna. Simeon tells them, “Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel,” while Anna “gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were awaiting the redemption of Jerusalem.”

Thursday is the Memorial of Saint Agatha, Virgin and Martyr. Friday we remember Saint Paul Miki and Companions, Martyrs.

The story of David we have been following for the past two weeks will end with his death as we conclude the readings from the Book of Samuel. As the narrative moves to the Book of Kings, David’s son Solomon, has succeeded him on the throne and for the next week, the tale of notable leaders of Israel’s history continues to unfold.

In Mark’s Gospel this week, Jesus continues to heal and teach. The young daughter of a synagogue official is sick and on the way to heal her, as Jesus stood in a crowd, he felt the power go out of him as a woman with a hemorrhage touched his cloak. “Your faith has saved you,” he reassures her. To the father he says, “Do not be afraid; just have faith” and heals the daughter. He teaches in the synagogue in his hometown “and they took offense at him.” He was not able to perform miracles there, because of their lack of faith. Jesus sends his disciples out to preach and heal, telling them to take nothing for the journey but a walking stick. Though the demons know who Jesus is, Herod thinks he is John the Baptist, whom Herod had beheaded. Jesus encourages his busy disciples, “Come away by yourselves to a deserted place and rest a while.” But as they tried to get away “and saw the vast crowd, his heart was moved with pity for them, for they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things.”

On the Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Jesus encourages his disciples to let their light shine: “Your light must shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your heavenly Father.”

Daily Prayer This Week

This is a wonderful week to use the brief background times of our lives to talk with the Lord about our need for healing. We can begin each day by naming some desire we have for healing and deeper wholeness and peace. Putting these desires into words, early each day, as soon as we get up or while in the shower or while dressing, helps us give focus to our relationship with the Lord that day. “Lord, thank you for this day. Be with me as I face the challenges before me today. I especially need patience and more compassion, Lord. Heal the anger I feel, and give me peace, so that I can love the way I know you want me to.” Each of us can make this 30 second prayer specific to what we need to do each day, and what graces we need to do it. Getting in the habit of naming what I need and asking for it will shape how we spend the day, confidently aware of our God’s presence with us.

Throughout the day, we can continue our simple conversation with our Lord, speaking friend to friend. We may encounter some spirits within ourselves that aren’t very clean. Anger or resentment, fear or paralysis, jealousy or pride, lust or greed, self-pity or judging of others are all spirits that distort our ability to love others the way we are loved by our God. When we encounter them, we can ask the Lord to heal us, to drive these spirits from our hearts. Each experience of our need for a Savior can deepen our desire, and our ability to name them each morning.

The healing stories in the gospels make it clear that faith is key to the healing. When the people in Jesus’ home town say, “Isn’t this just the carpenter’s son?” their lack of faith is saying, “He can’t heal us.” In our own struggle with letting Jesus be our Savior, two things can get in the way. First of all, we need to know we need healing. Secondly, we need to want to be healed. If I cling to being angry or have become comfortable being afraid, I will first need to acknowledge what a difference freedom would mean in my life and come to desire healing. Then, I need to believe our Lord can heal me. The rest is easy. This honest dialogue with our Lord, throughout our days, no matter what we are doing, can help us grow in faith in the One who wants nothing more than to keep freeing us to know his love for us and to share it generously with others.
