

“Walking This Christmas With You.”

Merry Christmas!

What a joyful time of the year. Once again we gather around the mystery we never outgrow. The Word made flesh. God choosing closeness. God choosing to enter our lives without conditions or fanfare. The warmth of love radiates from the Christ Child and reaches every corner of our lives, even the places we keep guarded.

For some of you, I have celebrated many Christmas seasons with you. We have shared baptisms, weddings, funerals, and countless ordinary Sundays. For others, this is our first Christmas together. New faces. New routines. New beginnings. Both matter. Both belong. This past year has asked a lot of us. Parish partnerships. Shared pastors. Shared resources. Shared schedules. None of this has been easy. It has stretched patience. It has tested trust. It has required generosity of spirit. At times it felt heavy. At times it felt uncertain. Still, you showed resilience. You stayed rooted. You kept showing up. Communities do not survive on convenience. They endure through commitment.

Christmas reminds us why we keep going. God did not choose ease. God chose presence. A child born into a real world with real challenges. A family doing their best. A quiet arrival into a noisy place. This feast speaks plainly. God enters life as it is. We each celebrate this joy in our own ways. Some gather with full tables and loud laughter. Others sit quietly, holding memories close. Some carry gratitude. Others carry grief. Christmas holds all of it. No one arrives at the manger the same way. All are welcome.

I am deeply grateful to each of you. For your faith. For your patience. For your willingness to walk a road that has not always been smooth. It has not been an easy journey, but it has been an honest one. I see the effort you give. God sees it even more clearly.

If this Christmas feels bright, give thanks. If it feels heavy, you are not alone. The Christ Child does not demand cheer. He offers peace. Bring what you have. Leave with hope. Take a moment during these holy days to slow your steps. Sit in the church. Light a candle. Say a simple prayer. God listens to honest hearts. Thank you for allowing me to serve you as your pastor. Thank you for trusting me to walk with you. I carry that responsibility with care. May Christ's peace rest in your homes. May love grow stronger. May forgiveness come easier. May hope take root again. Merry Christmas and God bless you.—Father Steve

The Church gives us structure so we don't drift, like a coach who wants the team to play their best. The rules aren't fences. They're guide rails that help us reach heaven without driving into a ditch. We'd need both quiet and celebration to stay balanced.



Christmas Week 2

The Sunday that follows Christmas is the celebration of The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. The gospel from Matthew is the story of the angel appearing to Joseph in a dream, telling him to flee with Mary and their newborn son, Jesus, to Egypt so Herod could not find them. After a time, they returned and lived in Nazareth, “so that what had been spoken through the prophets might be fulfilled, he shall be called a Nazorean.”

Monday, we look in on Simeon, in the temple, through Luke’s eyes, and Anna on Tuesday. When the Holy Family returns to Nazareth, “The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favor of God was upon him.”

Wednesday, we hear the beginning of John’s gospel: the story of the Word becoming flesh, among us.

Tuesday, New Year’s Day, is the Solemnity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of God and also the Naming of the Child, Jesus, a special day for the Society of Jesus. In addition, it is a celebration of World Day of Prayer for Peace. A new calendar year begins, and we can always have a new beginning, because of Jesus coming among us.

On Friday, we hear the testimony of John the Baptist about Jesus, from John’s gospel. And, on Friday John tells of what he was told about Jesus. Saturday, is the story, from John, about the call of the first disciples - Jesus saying to them, “Come and see.” They went and spent the day with him.

On Sunday, the U.S. will celebrate the Epiphany of the Lord, although most of the world will celebrate it on Tuesday, January 6. The Epiphany celebrates the light that has come into the darkness of the world and that our salvation was made known to the Gentiles. Outside of the U.S., the Second Sunday of Christmas is celebrated, with the beginning of John’s Gospel and its poetic images of light and the Word. “From his fullness we have all received, grace in place of grace, because while the law was given through Moses, grace and truth came through Jesus Christ.”

Daily Prayer This Week

There is a lot going on in the readings for the week after Christmas.

It helps to recognize this and let ourselves enter each part of the mystery of the Incarnation. We are living in the flesh each day of our lives. He came to enter this life and be with us in it. After Christmas, we have this wonderful Christmas season, days to let the blessing of Christmas settle in before we move toward Ordinary Time again.

Each one of us can begin our post-Christmas and the beginning of our New Year’s time by staying in touch with ourselves in the flesh - as people who are touched by Jesus’ coming. We can turn to our Lord throughout each day and have real conversations with our Savior: over the kitchen sink, by the dishwasher, in front of the washing machine. This practice can make sacred any part of our “ordinary life” that we hold up to God.

During our preparation for Christmas we asked the Lord to open our hearts, to let us wait with patient trust, and to come to us. Last week we experienced joy and the mixed challenges of Christmas. This week we have the opportunity to have ordinary conversations with our God who came to be with us.

Thank you so much, Lord, for becoming flesh for me. And, thank you for being with me now, in the midst of each day’s joys and sorrows. I ask you to increase my trust in you, my desire for closeness with you and my commitment to turn to you all day long. Continue to be with me when I have to make difficult decisions, when I need extra patience and care when in challenging situations. Continue to let my heart experience the joy of Christmas this week as I see signs of your presence with me.

When these words take on our own voice and our details, it will feel very personal. And, when we speak about our fears, our needs, when we express our gratitude and our deep desires, we are living and intimate relationship with the one who became flesh that we might never need feel alone again.





EPA Cleaning Up Lead in Sandoval – Free Yard Testing

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, with U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, **requests access** from property owners in Sandoval to test their soil for lead and arsenic. **Lead can be toxic and is especially harmful to children.** Waste material from the former Sandoval Zinc Co. smelter was used as fill in village properties and roadways.
