MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

Father Steve Pautler

A Pinch of Grace and a Whole Lot of Light. Jesus speaks plain today and I need plain some days!

You are salt. You are light. No riddles. No fine print. He names a job and hands it to people like me who still manage to burn toast and overcook pasta. Salt has one task. Give food a reason to show up at the table. Skip it and even a good meal falls flat. Add too much and dinner turns into a rescue mission for the water pitcher. I have learned the pause in the kitchen. Taste. Adjust. Taste again. Life runs on the same rule. When every hour fills with noise, worry, screens, and running from one thing to the next, faith gets crowded out. The flavor fades. Not because God left. Because my attention wandered.

Jesus also calls us light. Light does one thing. It lets people see where they stand and where they head next. Nobody lights a lamp and shoves it in a drawer. Nobody flips a switch and says, let us keep this a secret. Light shows the room as it is. Mess and all. Blessings and all. It points to the door when people need a way out. I do not need a spotlight. I need steady habits that let Christ show through. Here is the part I need to hear again and again. Jesus does not say, be impressive. He says, be seen doing good. Hold doors. Speak kind words. Show up on time. Pray for people who test patience. Bring soup. Write a note. Forgive first. These acts stay small and steady. No parade. No trophy. Still, people notice. They feel less alone. They start to trust God again.

A quick kitchen confession. ***Hot sauce fixes many problems.*** It also hides many mistakes. Dump it on every dish and every meal tastes the same. ***Faith works in a similar way.*** When faith turns into noise or a show, people stop tasting grace.

They taste heat. Jesus asks me for steady goodness, not fireworks.

Balance keeps me honest. Work matters. Family matters. Rest matters. Prayer matters. Miss any one and life wobbles. Keep them in play and days hold together. Salt stays strong. Light stays bright. Not flashy. Faithful. Jesus ends with a clear aim. Let people see good works and give praise to the Father. Credit goes up the ladder. I stay on the rung where hands meet real needs. God handles the glory. I handle the kindness.

So today I season the day with prayer in the morning and patience in traffic. I turn on the light with honesty at work and mercy at home. I keep faith in the middle of the plate, not pushed to the edge. Jesus asked for salt and light. He already picked the person. Now I live the part.

This week's question:

I watch Mass at home because getting out is hard. Does that count, and does it count for my daughter too?


Answer:

If health or serious difficulty keeps you home, the Sunday obligation does not bind, and watching Mass is a good and holy way to stay connected. For someone who is able to go, the livestream does not replace being there in person. So you are doing exactly what the Church hopes you will do, and your daughter still belongs in the pew, not in the recliner with the remote.




Consecrated Life

VOCATION CORNER FEBRUARY 08, 2026

A sage once wrote that a good marriage is like a fire around which others come to warm themselves. So, as we celebrate World Marriage Day on this Sunday, we realize that no matter what our station in life - married, single or religious - we have benefited from this sacred covenant relationship whether through the example of our parents, grandparents, and other role models or through our own stewardship of the marriage covenant.

Fifth Week of Ordinary Time

On the Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Jesus encourages his disciples to let their light shine: "Your light must shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your heavenly Father." Tuesday is the Memorial of Saint Scholastica, Virgin. Saturday is the Memorial of Saints Cyril, Monk, and Methodius, Bishop. The first reading this week, from the First Book of Kings, continues the story of David's family as his son the wise Solomon is now King of Israel. He is honored and praised for his wisdom, but falls away from the Lord and worships false gods, and for that the Lord tells him he will lose the Kingdom of Israel. During the week, the fast-paced Gospel of Mark continues with stories of Jesus healing, teaching and challenging the authorities. As Jesus and his disciples step on shore, people scurry from all over to bring those in need of healing. The Pharisees, watching for Jesus to break rules, criticize his followers for not washing their hands. Jesus responds, "You disregard God's commandment but cling to human tradition." Jesus teaches his followers, "Nothing that enters one from outside can defile that person; but the things that come out from within are what defile." Jesus goes to Tyre and tries to slip into a house unnoticed, but a foreign woman finds him and Jesus, impressed by her faith, heals her daughter. He heals a man of his deafness and speech impediment and like so many others he healed, he orders him not to tell anyone. "But the more he ordered them not to, the more they proclaimed it." Moved with pity, Jesus feeds the huge crowds who had followed him for three days. "They ate and were satisfied. They picked up the fragments left over – seven baskets. There were about four thousand people." On the Sixth Sunday of Ordinary Time we hear Matthew's Gospel. Jesus speaks to his followers about religious laws and also of our own relationships. Go to offer gifts to God at the altar, but first, Jesus says, "Leave your gift there at the altar, go first and be reconciled with your brother, and then come and offer your gift."

Daily Prayer This Week

"My heart is moved with pity," Jesus says in one of the gospels this week, and we see his compassion in the healing stories in this week's gospels. This seems like the perfect time for us to ask Jesus for the healing we need in our lives.

We can take one gospel and pray with it as if we were in the story - like Monday's story. Jesus and his disciples cross the sea and as soon as they land, people rush to bring those who need healing to him. We can imagine ourselves seeing Jesus, the crowds gathering, the jostle of people bringing their sick on mats. People yelling for Jesus' attention.

Then we can imagine a moment where Jesus steps away from the throng and takes us aside. With loving eyes he looks at us and asks us, "Where do you need healing? Where can I be with you?" It is there in that powerful moment that we can speak to Jesus as we would a friend. We can search our hearts and ask Jesus for the healing he already knows we need:

"Help me, Jesus, with my impatience with my family. Let me not nag at those I love so much. Heal my lack of compassion for them." "Touch my heart,

Jesus. Give me the selfless love I need in my marriage and help me avoid the temptation to 'keep score.' Only with your help can I continue to be loving, even when it feels like some days I am the only one carrying my marriage."

"Jesus, I become afraid of failing and I feel like one of those people lying on a mat, waiting for you to touch my life. Yet when I sense your healing presence coming close, I roll away from you so you don't see me. Give me the courage I need to ask for your healing and to get up and answer your call for me to serve."

When we pray with a gospel, we can carry an image of that prayer with us all day long. As we get out of bed in the morning, cook meals or go about our day, we can be aware of Jesus standing with us, ready to heal us, if only we would ask.

What is it that needs healing in me this week? Where will I allow Jesus to touch my life?

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
It's a wrap, Catholic Schools Week!
