MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

Father Steve Pautler

Theme: "The Quiet Work of Lent."

The First Sunday of Lent brings us into the desert with Jesus. The Gospel from Matthew places him alone, hungry, and worn down after forty days of fasting. This scene feels distant until it does not. Temptation rarely announces itself with drama. It shows up quietly, persistently, and at moments when strength runs low.

Yes, resisting temptation feels hard. Anyone who has spoken with a person in recovery knows this truth. Anyone walking that road knows it even better. Temptation presses from every side. Habits promise relief. Shortcuts promise comfort. Distractions promise escape. None of this fades with time. The world keeps offering more noise, more access, more excuses. Lent does not pretend otherwise. Lent tells the truth.

In the desert, Jesus faces three temptations. Each one aims at control, relief, and recognition. Eat and feel better. Prove yourself and gain attention. Take power and avoid suffering. These offers sound familiar. They echo in daily life. When pain runs deep or loneliness settles in, people reach for something to dull the ache. Families later say the same painful words. I never saw it coming. He seemed fine. She never said a word. Hurt often hides behind smiles and routines.

Temptation grows stronger when suffering stays unspoken. Silence feeds it. Shame protects it. The devil works best in isolation. The desert tests Jesus, yet it also reveals his trust. He answers each temptation with Scripture. He does not argue. He does not bargain. He stays grounded in who he is and who his Father is. Strength flows from relationship, not willpower.

I saw this truth clearly while speaking with a group of third graders. I tried to explain how Jesus fasted for forty days. Their eyes grew wide. Almost together they said, I would starve to death. Their honesty made me laugh. It also made me pause. Most adults think the same thing but hide it better. Jesus endured what most people never would. He did not fast to impress. He fasted to listen, to pray, to prepare his heart.

Lent invites a similar honesty. It does not ask for heroic feats. It asks for awareness. There are things in life beyond control. There are also choices within reach. Wisdom lies in knowing the difference. This season gives space to name struggles aloud, to seek help, and to stop pretending strength never falters.

The desert does not last forever. Angels come. Strength returns. Jesus leaves the wilderness ready to preach hope. Lent leads there too. Through prayer, fasting, and honest reflection, hearts grow steadier. Temptation loses some of its grip. Trust deepens. God meets people in the quiet and walks with them toward healing and new life.

This week's question:

Why meat, why Fridays, and why does dessert feel harder than steak?

Answer:

Friday is tied to the Cross and abstaining from meat became a shared sign of penance. In the United States, we keep that rule on Fridays in Lent, and the rest of the year we are asked to choose some real form of penance on Fridays. Meat is not sinful and fish is not magic. What matters is choosing something that actually stretches the heart, and yes, for many of us, skipping dessert hits closer to home.

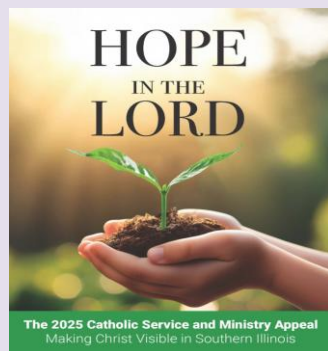

VOCATION CORNER FEBRUARY 22, 2026

"From a young age, I desired to be noticed by Jesus in a particular way. By age 13, Good Friday left me with an ache to suffer with the crucified Lord. At age 16, I read the Song of Songs and declared "I want a love like that." Jesus became my first love. Though I was open to religious life, I also love the idea of marriage. In college, I replaced Jesus as the center of my life with the man I thought I'd marry. Deep down, I felt Jesus' claim on my life and fought against Him for it, in restless pursuit of a tangible spouse. But Jesus brought me to surrender. In the Eucharistic presence of the divine bridegroom the attraction of all earthly bridegrooms faded away. Jesus gave himself entirely for me on the cross. I now yearned to give my whole self to him. Today, as a Passionist nun, I stand at the foot of the Cross, wedded to Redeeming Love. Jesus crucified does not disappoint. He is the fairest bridegroom of all." First Week of Lent

On the First Sunday of Lent, we begin our Lenten journey, remembering how God re-established the covenant, after the flood, and we reflect on how Jesus began his public ministry with a retreat of forty days - led to the desert by the Spirit.

After last week's first four days, the next three weeks of Lent represent a period of instruction, originally designed for the Catechumens (those preparing for Baptism at the Easter Vigil). We can read these readings as a catechism of renewal for us all.

The first weekday reading for the first full week is the great giving of the Commandments: "Be holy, for I, the LORD, your God, am holy." Jesus gives the great parable about the last judgment - separating the charitable from the uncharitable: "whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me." Then, Jesus teaches his disciples to pray. He says that it is an evil generation that looks for "signs." He is the sign - a call to repentance. On Thursday, when we hear the desperate but faith-filled prayer of Esther, Jesus tells us to pray confidently. And he sums up the whole law and the prophets for us: "Do to others whatever you would have them do to you." Jesus says our holiness has to go beyond the letter-of-the-law holiness; it must touch our anger, our judgments of others, and be reconciled with those we've wronged. The holiness Jesus proposes for us calls us to love our enemies, even to pray for those who persecute us. We are called to love the way God does.

The Second Sunday of Lent offers us Matthew's Gospel of the Transfiguration. When the stammering disciples are overwhelmed at the reality of who Jesus really is they "were very much afraid. But Jesus came and touched them, saying, "'Rise, and do not be afraid.'"

Daily Prayer This Week

This first week of Lent is the time we are given to begin our Lenten patterns, to re-align our priorities, and to make use of more reflective time each day. It is a time to fast and abstain from those things that hinder our relationship with the Lord, and to consider being more generous to the poor.

As we make this beginning, we are offered some beautiful instruction about what is expected of us. These readings describe a very Jesus-like love. We can examine our care for the hungry, thirsty, naked, sick or imprisoned. We can reflect upon who in our lives needs us and whether we love them as we want to be loved. And we can look at the deeper things, like our anger or how we treat others, and our response to those who are our "enemies." What is most important this first week, beyond a sharper examination of our consciences, is to see this as a time for God's grace to work in us. So, it is a time to ask for the graces we are starting to see we need.

Each morning this week we can ask our Lord to help us focus this day on the neediest people around us. We can ask to begin new patterns this week by practicing special charity and love, where I haven't been so generous or kind before. The key is to ask and to be very specific. Then, throughout the day, we can keep talking with our Lord, in the background about these graces we ask for and the concrete circumstances we find ourselves in. It is in the particular events of our day that we will become attentive to our need for our Lord's presence and grace, as well as our need to choose a new pattern. Each evening, we can briefly review the day and recognize some missed opportunities to connect with the Lord or take advantage of a situation here or there, but most of all, we can thank the Lord for the moments of connection that have begun our Lenten journey.

LENT REGULATIONS



Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast with one full meal and abstinence from meat, while all other Fridays of Lent require abstinence, with dispensations limited to sickness or those recognized in canon law. Catholics ages 18 to 59 are obliged to fast and those 14 and older to abstain from meat, with automatic dispensation for the ill, those with chronic conditions such as diabetes, and women who are pregnant or nursing, guided by common sense and care for health. Observing these penitential practices remains a serious obligation, and the Easter duty of receiving the Eucharist once during the season is fulfilled from the First Sunday of Lent on February 21 to 22, 2026 through Trinity Sunday on May 30 to 31, 2026, with allowance for another time for a just cause.

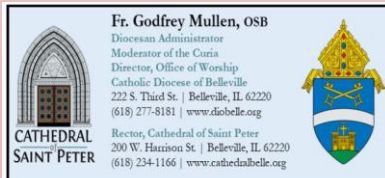
