MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

"Floodlite" in a Can and Grace from a Rock!

In the summer of 1993, the river decided to take over. The late spring thaw started it. Then the rains settled in and refused to leave. I grew up on the Kaskaskia River near where it meets the Mississippi. When the Mississippi rises, the backwater pushes upstream and reminds small towns who is really in charge. That year, it felt like we were living in the middle of a lake.

At the time, I was serving as an elected official, so I was not watching this from a lawn chair with a glass of iced tea. Every day we waited for updates from the Conservation Office about how much water was being released from Carlyle Lake. That meant we were getting it from both directions. The Mississippi was pushing back from one side, and Carlyle Lake was sending it down from the other. More water coming. More water rising. It felt like we were in the middle of a slow moving squeeze-play. We worked hard to protect our water treatment plant. We purified the water. It tested clean. It looked clean. It was clean. The health department still said no. Not for drinking.

So there we were. Surrounded by water and thirsty. You learn something in moments like that. Not all water gives life. Some water surrounds you and still leaves you empty.

It did not take long for people outside the flood zone to show up. Pickup trucks and vans rolled in with cases of canned water. Then Anheuser Busch sent a tractor trailer of canned water. We nicknamed it "**Floodlite.**" If you cannot laugh in a flood, you are in real trouble. That generosity made a hard season bearable. We were reminded that even when the river rises, so does kindness.

On the Third Sunday of Lent, we hear about thirst. The Israelites grumble in the desert. They are tired and afraid. Angry at Moses. God tells Moses to strike the rock and water flows. At another well, in Samaria, Jesus meets a woman at noon. He asks for a drink, then offers something greater. Living water. A spring welling up to eternal life.

In 1993, we learned the difference between water you see and water you trust. In the desert, Israel learned it too. At Jacob's well, the Samaritan woman discovered it for herself. You can draw from the same well every day and still be thirsty in your soul.

We live in a culture flooded with activity, noise, and information. We are busy and connected and still thirsty. We try to drink from work, success, entertainment, even good things. By morning, the thirst returns. Jesus speaks plainly. Whoever drinks the water I give will never thirst.

Lent asks a direct question. What well are you drawing from. I will never forget standing in a town surrounded by water yet unable to drink. It is a clear picture of the spiritual life. We can be surrounded by blessings and still need the one thing that truly satisfies. This Lent, let us stop at the well. Let us admit our thirst. And let us ask, with the Samaritan woman, **Sir, give me this water!**


This week's question:

When I was growing up, I always looked forward to the statues being covered with purple during Lent. We do not do this anymore. Why?

Answer:

First, you have a good memory. Covering statues in purple during the final weeks of Lent is an old and beautiful custom. It usually begins on the Fifth Sunday of Lent, sometimes called Passion Sunday. The Church goes visually quiet. The beauty is hidden so we focus on the suffering of Christ.

The practice never disappeared from the Church. It is still permitted and encouraged. Some parishes continue it. Others stepped away from it after the liturgical changes following the Second Vatican Council. In some places it faded out simply because no one ordered new purple cloth or no one wanted to climb the ladder. It is not a doctrine. It is a custom. A good one. And like many good Catholic customs, it can come back. Lent is not meant to be pretty. It is meant to prepare us for Easter. When the statues are unveiled!

Third Week of Lent

For the Third Sunday of Lent we read of the Samaritan woman who encounters Jesus at the well. He offers her lifegiving waters and then shows her how intimately he understands her. She runs back to town to spread her news: "Come and see a man who told me everything I have ever done! Could he be the Messiah?" At some Masses, we will hear the [Scrutinies](#) for RCIA candidates.

Jesus challenges the people in his hometown of Nazareth to look at him in a new way - "No prophet is accepted in his own native place." In a fury, they drive him out of the temple. Peter asks Jesus the limits of forgiveness. Jesus says that we must forgive again and again. He tells the parable about the servant, who though forgiven himself, does not forgive his fellow servants. Jesus has come to fulfill the law and the words of the prophets, not abolish them. Jesus heals a demon that wouldn't let a man talk. When someone claimed that Jesus must be using Satan's power to heal, Jesus responds with words that have a double meaning: there is only one source of grace; it is from God and it resists evil; there is only one source of evil; it is from Satan and it resists God's grace. When asked to name the "greatest" commandment, Jesus names two, thus putting together the necessity of loving God with our entire being and loving our neighbor as our very selves. The week ends as Jesus tells a powerful story of the Pharisee and the tax collector praying in the temple. I tell you, the latter went home justified, not the former; for everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and the one who humbles himself will be exalted."

The Fourth Sunday of Lent brings the story of the man born blind. His disciples ask, "Who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" Jesus heals the man who now sees more clearly than the Pharisees the true identity of Jesus. "I do believe, Lord."

Daily Prayer This Week

This is a pivotal week of Lent. We can solidify the patterns we have begun or we can make a new start, if we haven't been able to get started yet. If we have begun to recognize what needs realigning in our lives and have begun to fast and abstain from some things that get in the way of our relationship with the Lord, then we are engaging in a struggle. We are likely uncovering resistance and experiencing our personal sinfulness face-to-face. This is all preparing us for a deeper conversion, a readiness for reconciliation with God and the graces that will allow us to be a source of reconciliation with others. This is the time when we begin to see and experience how much God loves us at a new and more personal level. These graces prepare us to keep our eyes focused on Jesus in the weeks ahead - to learn from him, to fall in love with him more deeply and to be drawn to imitate him more completely. If we are just getting started with our Lenten journey, renewing our desires for these graces will be all we need to begin with a renewed openness. God does not need a lot of time to convince us of his love for us.

This is a week about God's love for us and our call to love others the same way. It is a time blessed by our gratitude for the fidelity of Joseph and Mary, who responded to God's fidelity to them. It is a week to keep our daily focus on naming a desire each morning. The day ahead will shape what we ask for as our feet hit the floor in the morning. Pausing to thank the Lord for this day and to ask for the grace to let our mind and heart be renewed in the concrete circumstances, relationships and obligations of our day. Throughout the day, we can then return to those desires in background of our awareness. Our request for the Lord's help is always there and our consciousness of it, will help us make the choice we desire to make, to let go of what we need to let go of, to add what we need to add. This will take us deeper and deeper into self-awareness and a sense of our need for a Savior, who is right there to embrace us and give us the graces we ask for.


**A Night to Remember

Purrs from the Pew, Sister Fluff of Divine Mischief

Beneath the Bleachers and Other Lenten Trials

Peace be with you. It is I, Sister Fluff. Small in stature. Large in spiritual depth. Last Friday nearly five hundred souls filled my parish hall. The scent of fried fish floated upward like proper incense. Volunteers marched in formation. Plates clattered. Laughter echoed. And I, vowed to simplicity, stationed myself beneath the bleachers. Close enough to monitor. Far enough to avoid temptation. Lent demands sacrifice. I practice it daily. I surrender sun soaked windowsills to early arriving grandmothers. I relinquish my pew when a handbag claims it first. I endure enthusiastic Sign of Peace moments from sticky hands. I offer these penances quietly. I do not complain. Out loud. Then there is the incubator in the Kindergarten room. A glowing box. Warm. Humming softly through the night. Inside it. Eggs. Future chickens! In my building! Each evening I conduct security rounds. I sit beside the machine like a cloistered sentinel. Tail wrapped. Eyes steady. I examine the shells and wrestle with complex theological questions. Why are we nurturing birds indoors. Who approved beaks in a Catholic classroom. Is this a test of obedience. I confess there have been moments of curiosity. A tap of the paw. A gentle sniff. I repent immediately. Even thinking about scrambled eggs on a Friday feels spiritually suspicious. The fish fry teaches generosity. The incubator teaches patience. Lent teaches restraint. If chicks arrive during Holy Week, I will accept the symbolism. From a distance. Holiness requires vigilance. And perhaps self control around poultry. *Sister Fluff, F.D.M.
