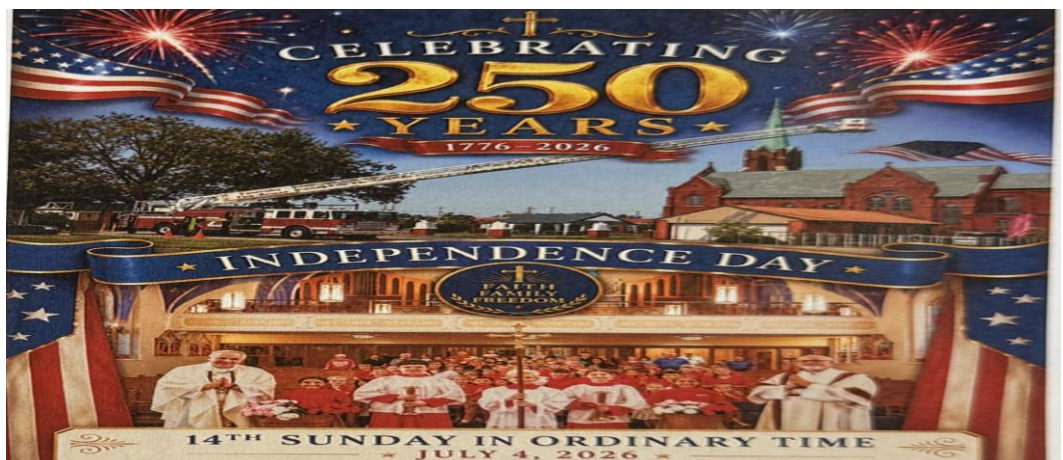

This Independence Day weekend, our nation marks the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence. In the second paragraph, we find words still worth pondering: **“We hold these truths to be self-evident, all men are created equal, endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, among them Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.”** Those words endure because they speak to something deep in the human soul. Our rights do not come first from government, wealth, popularity, or power. They come from the Creator. Every human person carries a dignity given by God. This truth is older than America. It is written into creation itself.

From the beginning, the Church knew persecution. The first Christians were mocked, hunted, imprisoned, and killed because they followed Christ. In some places today, believers still suffer openly for the faith. In other places, persecution comes quietly through ridicule, pressure, exclusion, and efforts to push faith out of public life. The names change, but the struggle remains. Many of the first immigrants who came to what became America came seeking freedom from religious and personal oppression. They wanted a place where they might worship, work, raise families, and live without fear.

Today, we see people fleeing many of those same burdens. They leave homes, languages, graves, memories, and everything familiar. **Why do so many people want to come to the United States?** What do they seek? They seek what weary people have always sought: safety, dignity, work, faith, family, hope, and a future. Depending on where we get our world news, this issue is treated with great seriousness or brushed aside. Yet behind every headline stands a human person created by God, carrying hopes, fears, wounds, and prayers.

In today’s Gospel, Jesus says, **“Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest.”** Those words belong at the heart of this weekend. Political freedom matters. Religious freedom matters. Human dignity matters. Yet the deepest freedom comes from Christ. He frees the heart from hatred, fear, pride, and despair. He teaches us to see every person as a child of God. As we celebrate Independence Day, let us give thanks for the freedoms handed on to us. Let us remember those still searching for them. A nation is strongest when it remembers its soul. A disciple is strongest when he rests in Christ.

QUESTION:

How does the Catholic Church view immigration, especially when people enter the country without following legal procedures? *Answered by Father Steven Pautler*

ANSWER:

The Church asks us to hold two truths together. Nations have a right and duty to protect their borders, provide order, and promote the common good. At the same time, every immigrant, documented or undocumented remains a child of God with dignity. People fleeing violence, hunger, persecution, or misery deserve mercy, protection, and fair treatment. The Church does not teach open border, nor does it bless cruelty. Laws matter. So do families, safety, justice, and compassion. Immigrants also carry responsibilities: respect the laws, culture, and good of the country receiving them. Catholics should speak about this issue with truth and charity, not fear or contempt. The Gospel never lets us reduce a person to a problem

At the heart of every human person is the call to love. Young or old, single, married, widowed—we are each capable of becoming a gift to another. We become a self-gift when we sit beside a friend in need, offer our time in service, faithfully "show up" for our children, choose love when it is most difficult, and when husbands and wives give themselves to one another freely, totally, faithfully, and fruitfully. *In giving ourselves away, we do not lose who we are; we discover who we were created to be.* Through these daily acts of self-giving love, we reflect the very heart of God and His infinite, unconditional love for each of us. The call to become a gift of self lies at the heart of God's beautiful plan for marriage and family. Through St. John Paul II's Theology of the Body, discover the deeper meaning of authentic love. The Fourteenth Week in Ordinary Time

The Fourteenth Week in Ordinary Time begins with a Sunday that offers pastoral comfort to us all. In the Zechariah reading, the Lord promises Israel, and us, a savior who “shall proclaim peace to the nations.” Matthew’s gospel points to Jesus as the source of that peace, as he affirms his identity as the Son of God. Jesus offers himself as a relief from the burdens of our days, promising “you will find rest for yourselves. For my yoke is easy, and my burden light.”

Saturday we celebrate the memorial of Saint Benedict.

The first readings this week are from the Book of the Prophet Hosea. Hosea was a powerful prophet to the northern kingdom, tender in expressing God’s relationship to Israel in terms he knew. His “wife” was unfaithful to him, yet he still loved her. On Saturday, we begin reading from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah, beginning with the call of Isaiah.

This week Matthew’s Gospel shows us how Jesus calls his Apostles and how he sent them out on mission. Jesus heals an official’s daughter, and along the way he heals the woman suffering hemorrhages. When he heals a mute man, the Pharisees accuse him of using evil powers to do this. Jesus continues to heal. He tells his disciples to pray for even more disciples. Jesus selects twelve special disciples, his Apostles (those who are sent), and gives them the power to heal and to proclaim, “The Kingdom of heaven is at hand.” They are sent to “Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse the lepers, drive out demons.” And they are not to charge for their ministry. They are to be discerning: “Behold, I am sending you like sheep in the midst of wolves; so be shrewd as serpents and simple as doves.” He tells them that they will be persecuted, “but whoever endures to the end will be saved.” Jesus tells them not to be afraid, for God will protect them.

The Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time is about God’s fidelity. The promise of Isaiah 55 and Parable of the Sower from Matthew’s Gospel remind us that no matter what obstacles we face as his disciples, as sowers of the Good News, God will work effectively through us. “But the seed sown on rich soil is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields a hundred or sixty or thirty fold.”

Daily Prayer This Week

Last week as we reflected about images of Jesus beginning his ministry, we simply let ourselves grow in admiration and attraction to him. This week we take the next step by watching him call and send his Apostles. As we go through each day this week, in the background of our consciousness, we can make an ongoing reflection on our call and mission.

We might pray each morning, for just 30 seconds or so -- when we first stand up beside our bed or when we are in the shower or while dressing -- “Dear Lord, I sometimes forget that I am called by you to be your disciple. I forget that you call me each day to live the mission you give me. Help me be more aware of your call and more faithful in living it today.”

We might begin the day talking to our Lord, with our own words: “Lord, I have some challenges to face today. Help me enter those challenges with faith and trust in you. Calm my fears, heal my resistance to placing my trust in you. Then, let me bring your healing to the conflicts and wounds I encounter today.”

We might focus on what Jesus said about sending us like sheep among wolves. “Lord, there are so many ways that I have just become a part of the values of the world around me. Give me the freedom to hear your call today and to live it counter-culturally. I want to live more simply and to try to hear the cry of the poor. With your grace, I desire to be freer from the attachments that blind me, so that I might be guided by your Spirit in dismantling unjust social structures. Today, Lord, I place my trust in you.”

In these simple prayers, we find ourselves having a new focus each day. While we continue to be busy and do what we are committed to, our days are transformed. In brief conversations with Jesus, our hearts and desires become more closely aligned with his. Practicing this kind of prayer is very fulfilling and soon becomes a habit. We become more reflective as we grow in intimacy with our Lord, in the midst of our daily lives.

As we review our day each evening before going to bed, we recognize God’s presence with us that day. Expressing our gratitude each night claims the graces we have received and helps us trust God’s presence with us more and more.
