“A house is only a place. It needs human voices, activity, and laughter to come alive.” Erma Bombeck, the twentieth-century columnist who wrote so honestly and humorously about everyday life, gave us this wonderful thought. A house might be beautiful, spotless, and filled with expensive things, but without people living, laughing, eating, arguing, forgiving, and loving within its walls, it remains only a building. Everyone lives differently, and everyone has treasures. The question is, how many of our treasures are locked away because we are afraid to use them?

During our rummage sale at St. Mary, I enjoy walking down the aisles and looking at all the treasures people collected throughout the years. There they sit, carefully arranged on tables, marked for twenty-five cents or fifty cents. My favorite section is the beautiful china. Many of those plates and cups were packed away in cabinets for decades, saved for a special occasion. Growing up, I remember using my mother's china only twice. It was beautiful. It was valuable. It was safe. Yet most of its life was spent behind a closed door.

In today's Gospel, Jesus speaks about a treasure buried in a field and a pearl of great price. When these treasures are found, the people in the parables respond. They act. They rearrange their lives around what they have found. God has placed treasures within each of us. Some have the gift of sitting quietly with someone who is hurting. Some know how to welcome strangers and make them feel at home. Too often, those gifts remain packed away like the good china. We wait for the perfect moment, the right opportunity, or a special invitation. We fear embarrassment, failure, or criticism. So the treasure remains hidden.

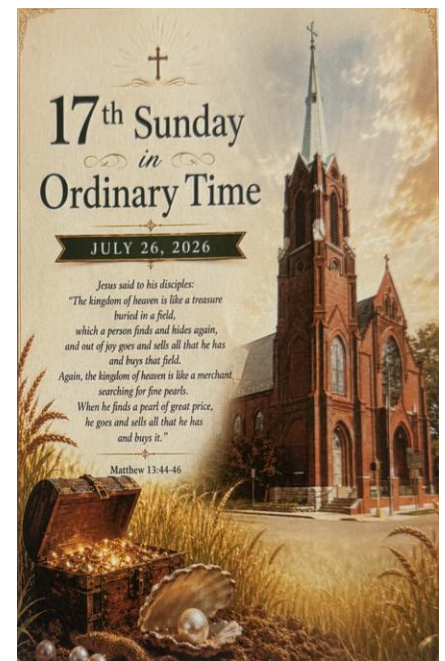
Jesus reminds us today that life is meant to be lived. Gifts are meant to be shared. Love is meant to be expressed. Faith is meant to shape our daily choices. One day, everything we own will sit on a rummage sale table with a small price tag attached. The treasures we shared, though, will live in the hearts of others. Bring out the good china. Tell the story. Sing the song. Make the phone call. Share your gift. Fill your home and your life with human voices, activity, laughter, and love.

QUESTION:

If a priest leaves active ministry and gets married is he still a priest? What is he allowed to do?

ANSWER:

Yes. A man ordained a priest remains a priest for life. Ordination leaves a permanent spiritual mark that cannot be erased. If he leaves active ministry and receives permission from the Church to marry, he is usually no longer allowed to function publicly as a priest. He normally does not celebrate public Mass, hear confessions, or wear clerical clothing. Most go on to live ordinary family and work lives. Still, in danger of death, the Church allows him to hear confessions and give absolution. God wastes nothing, including a priest's vocation.



Vocation Corners July 26, 2026

"I'll never forget the first time I saw a nun. I was 5 years old, and my family had gone to a convent for Mass. Seeing a woman in a habit, I asked, "Mama, why is she wearing those clothes?" Her reply captivated me: "She's married to Jesus." I thought, "I want to marry Jesus, too." Christ was my first love, and I've never gotten over Him. Growing up in Catholic school, I struggled with academic and social pressures like any girl, but the desire to radically serve Christ kept burning within me. The idea that he could be calling me to be his bride was exciting. Continuing to discern in college, I was open to marriage, but I felt that I had too much love to give to one family. I wanted to be a spiritual mother and adopt the world. My decision to follow Christ came in adoration. After an hour of silence, I heard him say, "Be crucified with me." I knew he was asking me to give my life to him completely. My greatest joy was returning to my first love." 2026 Natural Family Planning Campaign Week 4

"The Feminine Genius"

Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

On the Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time we see how God admires Solomon because he asked for wisdom rather than riches. Jesus is the source of God's wisdom and teaches us more about the Kingdom of Heaven. We imagine the passion of one discovering a treasure buried in a field or finding a pearl of great value, sacrificing everything to buy what is so deeply desired. A dragnet hauls in fish that can nourish others as well as what is not useful for others. Jesus invites us into deeper reflection on what we value and prepares us for our mission.

Wednesday is the Memorial of Saint Martha with its own special readings. On Friday, Jesuit and lay partners from around the world celebrate the Memorial of Saint Ignatius of Loyola, the founder of the Society of Jesus. Saturday we remember Saint Alphonsus Liguori, bishop and doctor of the Church.

The first readings this week continue to be from the Book of the Prophet Jeremiah. Jeremiah delivers God's messages about the laxity of the rulers. It is a powerful call to conversion for all of us today.

We continue to read from Matthew's Gospel this week, entering into sayings of Jesus about the Kingdom of God. God's reign is like mustard seeds and it is like yeast. It's coming and growth is small and slow, but it is assured. The Kingdom is like a buried treasure or a merchant's search for a really fine pearl. It is worth investing all we have in it. The Kingdom is like the dragnet used for fishing which gathers everything in it. It is at the end of time when God will gather all to separate the good from the evil. We hear that Jesus could not work miracles in his home town, because of their lack of faith in him. They thought they knew him and therefore took him for granted. Herod arrested John because John's preaching was bothering his conscience. He had John beheaded to honor a drunken promise to his niece and an oath to impress his guests.

On the Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time we celebrate how Jesus fed the crowds by making it possible for the disciples to give the people what they had. It was not enough, but became enough because of the compassion Jesus had for the people. Isaiah 55 invites us to come to the water when we are thirsty, to come and eat though we have no money. We can stop spending on what fails to satisfy. Paul consoles us, too, by reminding us that nothing can "separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."

Daily Prayer This Week

It can be an important week to give thanks for the priests and ministers among us who have responded to the call to serve. Saints Ignatius and Alphonsus Liguori are wonderful examples of priest servants. We might write a note to priests we know to thank them for their fidelity in service for us.

This is also a wonderful week to reflect and break open these parables about the Kingdom of God among us. Jesus must have wanted to assure his disciples and followers, who could have been vulnerable, like us, to being discouraged. Sometimes, we get confused or down about how it seems that evil wins out over good, that God's presence is so imperceptible that it tempts our faith in God's presence at all.

In the habit of reflecting in the midst of our daily lives that we have been practicing, we can spend several days noticing the growth and grace offered us - as powerful as yeast or as small as a tiny seed. This can change our spirits and give us more hope and trust. We can spend several days placing our trust in God in the midst of those days when it just seems like there are so many "weeks" standing the way of whatever good we try to do.

It would be great to spend a few days keeping our focus on the buried treasure being offered us - in this particular day or in my life in general. Am I willing to let go of so many smaller rewards in order to embrace that treasure? What will it cost me?

Where are my greatest resistances? We tend to do or give our energies to what we really want. How can we grow in our desire for what God wants to give us? We can ask for that grace a number of times this week.

We can also reflect on the people in our midst - in our homes, or family relations, in our faith community, in our association of friends - who need our presence in their lives in some way. We can reflect on how we are being called to be present to those people, even those we think we can't help very much, because we know them too well.

Every evening we can continue our practice of returning thanks to God who has showered blessings upon us and we focus our background reflections this week.

Ann (Oakes) Dunn shares that her favorite memories are, "of grade school days, mostly involving the nuns, namely Sister Claudette, Sister Carmelita and Sister Felicissima — what wonderful teachers they were. But what I remember most are the processions in church for Forty Hours, Corpus Christi and Holy Thursday's. The girls had special dresses made — I wore one that was blue organdy and one that was yellow dotted Swiss. It was always so exciting at the close of Forty Hours, when many visiting priests were here, to wonder how forceful and loud the visiting celebrant would begin to chant, 'Pange Lingua Gloriosi!' That truly brought goose-bumps. Another thing I like to remember is how very beautiful in white and gold the north side of the Altar was on Holy Thursday for Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament and making that special Holy Hour and how wonderful that old Christmas Nativity background scene was, reaching high up the south side Altar wall."
