






SOIL CONDITIONS

I am a hopeless gardener. I never met a plant I couldn't swiftly kill with good intentions and poor understanding of soil conditions.

Because really, it's all about the soil conditions—at least, that's what Google tells me when I help-lessly search phrases like "Why aren't any of my seeds sprouting? Please, I tried so hard." I can never seem to match the right type of soil offering the right type of drainage and texture with the right plant. I can't understand why it's not enough to bury the seed in whatever ground is available, sprinkle some water and ask it, very nicely, to grow.

This is also a quality that makes me a poor evangelist to people who do not share my beliefs. How many times have I encountered a friend or loved one who left the faith, and I tried to coax them back by hurling Catechism passages in their direction, offering advice they never asked for and are ill-equipped to understand? I sow these seeds of witness and bang my fists in frustration that they rot where I plant them, never realizing that *it's all about the soil*.

It is Christ, and Christ alone, who works within the heart. It is Christ who is the sower of the seed, not me. When I leave him out of the equation, when I fail to offer the Person and instead only offer the teaching, I can anticipate that any witness I have to offer will rot where it is planted just as sure as a tulip bulb in a bed of clay.



No entiendo por qué no basta con enterrar la semilla en cualquier terreno disponible, echarle un poco de agua y pedirle, muy amablemente, que crezca.

Esta es también una cualidad que me convierte en una pobre evangelista para las personas que no comparten mis creencias. ¿Cuántas veces me he encontrado con un amigo o un ser querido que dejó la fe, y traté de persuadirlos de que regresaran lanzándoles pasajes del Catecismo, ofreciéndoles consejos que nunca pidieron y que están mal equipados para entender? Siembro estas semillas de testimonio y golpeo mis puños con frustración porque se pudren donde las planté, sin darme cuenta de que todo se trata de la tierra.

Es Cristo, y sólo Cristo, quien obra en el corazón. Es Cristo quien es el sembrador de la semilla, no yo. Cuando lo dejo fuera de la ecuación, cuando dejo de ofrecer la Persona y en cambio solo ofrezco la enseñanza, puedo anticipar que cualquier testimonio que tenga que ofrecer se pudrirá dónde está plantado tan seguro como un bulbo de tulipán en una cama de arcilla.

OBSERVANCE

José Luis Sánchez del Río was born on March 28, 1913, in Sahuayo, Michoacán, Mexico. Nicknamed "Joselito", he grew up in a strong Catholic family who prayed the rosary frequently and attended church as often as they safely could during the unrest in Mexi-

Going to church publicly in Sahuayo was dangerous for José and his family was the Cristero War which broke

co at the time.



out in 1926. During this time, the Mexican government began trying to secularize the nation, enforcing anticlerical laws, and violently targeting churches and Christians, specifically Catholics. The government closed religious schools, exiled and executed priests, nuns, and other religious people, and seized church buildings and properties for their own use. In response to this violent disruption, Catholics across Mexico organized and took up arms against the government united under their war cry, "¡Viva Cristo Rey!" which translates to, "Long live Christ the King!" The fighting was most concentrated in the region of West Central Mexico where José and his family lived.

While still a child, José's two older brothers joined the war effort as Mexican Cisteros, or "Soldiers for Christ," fighting against the government. As he became a teenager, José greatly desired to follow in their footsteps and, when his mother refused, he refuted by begging her, "do not let me lose the opportunity to gain heaven so easily and so soon." During his short time in the militia, the other Cristeros nicknamed him Tarcisius, the name of an early Catholic saint who was put to death for protecting the Eucharist.

During a battle in 1928 he was captured by enemy forces. The general who was leading him and the other Cisteros into battle had fallen off his horse when the animal was killed by opposing forces. José gave his personal horse to the general so the general could continue leading the troops and eventually escape capture.

Shortly after his capture, the government soldiers jailed him and their other prisoners in a church they had confiscated — this make-shift prison happened to be the church of José's baptism. While imprisoned, he prayed the rosary daily and refused to renounce his faith, even though he was told he would be released if he simply repeated the phrase, "Death to Jesus Christ." Despite having to watch others tortured and killed in an attempt by his captors to break his resolve, José chose to yell encouraging words to those being put to death in front of him instead of choosing to fall into despair. He refused to back down under the severe pressure and remained resolute in his faith in and love of Jesus.

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When nothing else worked to get him to renounce his faith, his captors tortured him. They sliced off the soles of his feet then made him walk on his mutilated bare feet to the cemetery where they planned to kill him. The entire time José sang hymns and refused to despair. They stabbed and cut him many times along the way with a machete, when he finally made it to the cemetery, he was drenched in his own blood. Before he was shot in the head by the military leaders holding him captive, he was heard yelling "Long live Christ the King! Long live Holy Mary of Guadalupe!" He was a month short of his 15th birthday when he was martyred.

José Luis Sánchez del Río was canonized by Pope Francis on October 16, 2016. He is remembered with love by Mexican Catholics sometimes as San Joselito.


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MEDITACIÓN EVANGÉLICO



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GOSPEL MEDITATION

It's not uncommon to hear people complain that we Catholics often fail in communicating our faith. Fair enough. We can and should improve there. But it's interesting to notice that Jesus himself was implicitly accused by his disciples of a similar failure. This week in Matthew's gospel they are perplexed that he speaks to the crowds in ambiguous parables. The Lord's riddles leave many people more confused than before. He responds by pointing out that his parables have an intentional dual purpose: to hide (for some) and to reveal (for others) his Gospel: "Because knowledge of the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven has been granted to you, but to them it has not been granted" (Matthew 13:11). Is Jesus being unnecessarily difficult, obscurantist, or, worse, elitist?

No. We have to remember that all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge lie hidden in him (c.f., Col. 2:3). He is the word of God from heaven to be planted in the earth of our humanity to bear great fruit. However, like a lover delicately pursuing his beloved, we're dealing with a *relationship*, not new data. When we aren't willing to personally accept Jesus into our lives, the "info" of the Gospel will simply not make sense to us. It'll seem bizarre, esoteric, or like incoherent religious-speak. But when we are willing to accept Jesus into our lives, everything else starts to make sense. When others don't understand the Church or the Lord, let's be patient. Love is patient. Sometimes it has to hide before it is revealed.


On that day, Jesus went out of the house and sat down by the sea.

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
