GOSPEL MEDITATION - Luke 12:13-21


Recent studies suggest that millennials will be the first generation in America to be worse off than their parents in terms of financial earnings and job status. Many lament this. I propose that this week's Gospel provides a hopeful way to see the trend as good news.

The Lord Jesus says, "Take care to guard against greed, for though one may be rich, one's life does not consist in possessions" (Luke 12:15). Greed damages us with the deception that we are what we possess. But to Jesus, this is simply not true. What makes us happy is who we are, who we become.

Does not the expectation that every generation should do better than their parents subtly mask the poison of greed? A similar attitude is mirrored in the man who demands that Jesus justly arrange his share of the family inheritance. Despite the injustice, Jesus will not play that game. In fact, he seems to prefer that the man have less than his parents. What good would having more be to this man if he becomes enslaved and miserable by greed? What good would it be for us to have more if it means we become much less?

In allowing the man to have less, Jesus opens a space for him to become more: a man free to love. In that much more meaningful sense, perhaps he was better off than his parents. Maybe the millennials will be, too.

ART COMES TO ST. BART'S

If you've ventured up toward our upper parking lot lately, you may have noticed a new piece of art along Alameda. Created in collaboration with our neighbor, the Zoetic Tapestry Project, this Living Art piece highlights the virtue of HOPE as part of this Jubilee Year, which celebrates Catholics around the world as "Pilgrims of Hope."

Crafted from galvanized metal and wood, the piece was designed to be displayed outside. All materials have been treated and are suitable for year-round outdoor display. The Zoetic Tapestry Project will maintain the structure as needed. The artwork has two sides, each painted a little differently. Both sides display the word HOPE, added to the piece by the artists at the request of St. Bartholomew Parish. The colors are bright and fit in with the beauty of the church and its surroundings. The plants in the piece give it life and vibrancy. In the coming months, we anticipate welcoming additional installations representing the virtues of FAITH and LOVE.

The Zoetic Tapestry Project is a non-profit foundation located down the street from the church on Fairfax Avenue. The Project works with local artists and encourages them to develop creative works of art that promote environmental awareness and wellness. Their initiatives steward connections between the arts, our community, and a healthy environment. In that effort, the Zoetic Tapestry Project donates public art to further its mission.

In addition to creating public art, they also create meaningful programs and projects to enhance and support community art spaces. By partnering with schools, organizations, and individuals, their programs inspire environmental action by empowering engagement and education. For example, this past school year the Project sponsored two high school art shows and provided a college scholarship to a high school senior majoring in art.
