Volunteer with Down syndrome inspires parish with reverence, faith, warm smile

NOVI — Around the Novi area, many are already familiar with Robby Heil.

With his contagious smile and warm personality, people might recognize 26-year-old Robby from his famous touchdown for the Novi Wildcats during a 2016 football game. Or, maybe they know Robby from his appearance in Keith Famie's PBS documentary, "Chromosomally Enhanced: What's Your Superpower?" Soon, others will recognize Robby's Rudy-like story in a fictional film that is in production, inspired by his life.

However, where Robby, who has Down Syndrome, is perhaps most known and has the biggest impact is at St. James Parish, where he serves as an extraordinary minister of Holy Communion three times a week on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays.

"I'm working on Robby becoming a saint," said Charles Heil, Robby's dad and "Uber driver." "I am pretty sure there are people who come to Wednesday night Mass and want to receive Communion from Robby. They meet him, and he's in the news a lot, so many people know him. If you're around Robby, you become a happy person."

Heil stays busy as Robby's designated chauffeur — where Robby goes, Heil goes, and Robby's schedule is packed. In addition to serving as a Eucharistic minister and carrying the cross in procession before and after Mass, Robby recently joined a video team at the parish and fills his time with baseball, basketball and power lifting.

Robby and Heil also make time for trips to Disney World — Robby's favorite character is Mickey Mouse — and recently returned from Rome, where they walked through all of the Holy Doors for the Jubilee Year of Hope.



This is the first new assignment of a deacon to our parish in 17 years. It is our delight to welcome Deacon John and his gracious wife, Judy, into the vibrant work of God at Holy Family.

Throughout the ten months of his internship with us, John has shown his deep love for Christ and his heart for service. He has assisted and preached at Baptisms; he has prayed over people at Transformed evenings, Unbound Prayer sessions, and when needy families came to us before

Christmas. He experienced our great celebration of the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, and learned many of our bi-lingual songs. He assisted at every different kind of liturgical event, including the mountain-top Easter Vigil. Deacon John taught in the Becoming Catholic program and served with his wife as Table Hosts in the Winter Alpha course, this year. 
A Great Retiree Opportunity That Comes With Eternal Rewards

A good friend and wonderful addition to our St. Vincent de Paul Conference is Mr. Fred Postma. Although he is a member of Orchard Grove Community Church (our neighbor across the street), he is an invaluable member of our St. Vincent group. Oftentimes a St. Vincent Home Visit reveals a staggering lack of even the bare essentials of a home. No dining room table, no living room couch, no bed frames and sometimes even no bed is a common occurrence. In many cases this was due to a prior eviction where our neighbor in need has literally lost everything. Under these circumstances, we turn to Fred. He operates a non-profit furniture and appliance ministry that does amazing work!

Our limited funds prevent us from purchasing new items, but Fred always finds a way to take care of a need with his inventory of used items. If you ever wondered what is happening with our former convent, Fred is utilizing it as one of his warehouses. However, after many years of assisting countless neighbors, age and physical limitations are requiring that he find a replacement to carry on the torch.

This would be a wonderful opportunity for a person wanting to give back to the community for all the many blessings that he or she has received from our Lord! The amount of work involved in this ministry should not be understated but when you take into account that our Lord has promised us that even a cup of water to one of his little ones will not go unrewarded, just try to imagine the eternal benefits. Fred probably spends an average of 20 hours per week in this ministry so there is a lot of opportunity for the receipt of many graces! He charges just enough to get by with the upkeep of his SUV and trailer which contributes greatly to the benefit of our St. Vincent neighbors as we can assist many of them with very little funds from our treasury.

If this piques any interest from one or more of our Parishioners, please take it to the Lord in prayer as our St. Vincent group would lose a critical component in our mission to serve the under-privileged if this ministry is not perpetuated! Fruits & Veggies - More Matters!

The USDA recommends eating 5 – 9 servings of fruits and veggies per day. That might sound like a lot, but it's easy if you follow MyPlate's tips:

- Eat the rainbow! Make sure at least half of your plate is full of fruits and veggies.
- Choose fruits and veggies as quick snacks.
- Try something new. You can find fresh choices at a farm stand or farmers market.
- Vary your veggies. Fresh or frozen? Cooked or raw? Red, orange, or green? Picking different options will keep meals interesting!
- You can cook frozen or fresh vegetables in the microwave for a quick side dish.
- Opt for whole fruits more than fruit juice. Fresh, frozen, canned, dried, and pureed all count!
- Add fruit to your cereal or yogurt at breakfast.

Why are fruits and veggies important to eat?

- Low in calories—naturally!
- May reduce disease risk, including heart disease, high blood pressure, and some cancers.

 Rich in vitamins and minerals that help you feel healthy and energized.

Click on each nutrient to see a list of fruits & veggies that are "high" and "good" sources. Remember beans and peas count as a vegetable, too!

- Calcium: Calcium is essential for healthy bones and teeth.
 It is also needed for normal functioning of muscles, nerves, and some glands.
- Fiber: Diets rich in dietary fiber have been shown to have a number of beneficial effects, including decreased risk of coronary heart disease.
- Folate: Healthful diets with adequate folate may reduce a woman's risk of having a child with a brain or spinal cord defect
- Iron: Needed for healthy blood and normal functioning of all
- Magnesium: Magnesium is necessary for healthy bones and is involved with more than 300 enzymes in your body! Low levels may result in muscle cramps and high blood pressure.
- Potassium: Diets rich in potassium may help to maintain a healthy blood pressure.
- Vitamin A: Keeps eyes and skin healthy and helps protect

against infections.

 Vitamin C: Helps heal cuts and wounds and keeps teeth and gums healthy.





Almost every day, the pair visit the gravesite where Robby's mom, Debbie, is buried, followed by a trip to Starbucks.

Heil attributes all of Robby's experiences and involvement with the church to his late wife, who passed away nearly five years ago after a battle with breast cancer, but not before she saw Robby score that famous touchdown.

"We are here because my wife talked to our pastor, Fr. Ed Zaorski, and she's why Robby scored the touchdown — she spoke with the coach," Heil told Detroit Catholic.

Debbie was also instrumental in ensuring Robby received his first Communion 20 years ago, when, Heil explained, it was a challenge for churches to accommodate children with Down syndrome.

In recent years, the Church has become better at accommodating people with special needs, Fr. Zaorski said.

Before he was a priest, Fr. Zaorski said he worked as the director of the Archdiocese of Detroit's office ministering to those with disabilities, and he's seen the changes over the years.

"This was way back when folks were still institutionalized. People didn't fully understand persons with challenges, and we knew we had to do more," Fr. Zaorski said. "I think if anything, (Robby) is a real example not only for people with Down syndrome, but for all young people. If Robby could do it, everyone should do it."

Robby and Fr. Zaorski have developed a friendship and mutual respect over the years.

"I love him; he's doing well every day," Robby said.

Robby once dressed up as Fr. Zaorski for Halloween — complete with a bald cap.

"Robby spars with me on occasion, but it's with love," Fr. Zaorski laughed. "Most people in the parish know Robby probably more than they know me," he added, jokingly.

Fr. Zaorski admires Robby's reverence for the Eucharist and says it sets an example for the rest of his parishioners at St. James.

"Every time he receives or distributes the Eucharist, there's such reverence — it is a wonderful sign and symbol of how we should all truly appreciate the Eucharist," Fr. Zaorski said. "When Robby's giving out Communion, people really approach with reverence. You can tell with his reverence and the way he distributes, he knows what the Eucharist is, and I think that's a testimony to his mom and even his dad really forming him in the faith.

"He's been an inspiration for people with Down Syndrome and all the young folks," Fr. Zaorski added.
