New Parishioners and Hospitality

Between July 2023 and June 2024, Nativity of Our Lord welcomed more than 80 new households into the parish, including 30 with schoolaged children. Nativity is a warm and supportive community, but some say



it can be hard for outsiders to break in. To combat this, the Discipleship team held open working group sessions to identify ways we can better meet the needs of both new families and longtime members.

Three primary opportunities were identified: 1) People need to feel welcomed and accepted; 2) They desire community support for the challenges of life, and 3) want more ways to serve others in the parish and the broader community. A newly formed Hospitality Committee is taking the first steps to address these needs, guided by the story of Christ seeing Zacchaeus in the tree. Like Christ, we should look up, notice the other, and with great love be present to them.



My Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I am pleased to share with all of you our 2024 Annual Report, detailing my first fiscal year as pastor of Nativity of Our Lord.

It has been my honor and a great joy to serve all of you, to carry on the great work already underway,



The fiscal year ending June 30, 2024 saw our church renovation project largely completed and the School mortgage paid off, as well as a reorganization of our parish staff, including the establishment of the Office of Discipleship.

Entering this new fiscal year 2025, I announced my vision for a new mission for the parish, as a response to the suggestions of One Nativity 2035, parish staff, the pastoral council, and other valued lay leaders. The new mission is three-fold, aligning with the liturgical seasons of Advent and Christmas and centering upon, fittingly, the celebration of the Nativity of Our Lord itself:

- 1.) Prepare the Way of Our Lord,
- 2.) Celebrate "God With Us," and
- 3.) Shine with the Light of Christ.

I've said it before: this parish knows how to celebrate — perhaps thanks to a special charism given by God to a parish named after his son's birthday! It's also clear to me that there's more to be uncovered in that gift, and in particular for us to better receive the gift of Our Lord himself he wants to give to each of us — on Christmas Day, yes, but also each and every moment of our lives.

I wish to personally thank all of our parishioners, School families, and event sponsors for your continued investment in Nativity of Our Lord. It is my goal to continue to earn your trust, confidence, and support — both now and into the future.

ANNUAL REPORT and MISSION UPDATE 2024

Parish Finances in Brief

Tom Margarit, Finance Council Chair

The accompanying Parish and School Financial Reports reflect the actual day-to-day revenues and expenses for the twelve months ended June 30, 2024 compared to the budget, as well



as presents the current fiscal year (ending 6/30/2025) budget, for both operations.

The Net Change on the financial report represents the day-to-day operations for the entire parish including the school. This amount includes all operating cash items — including operating revenue such as stewardship and plate; operating expenses such as staffing, benefits, and utilities; and capital repair and maintenance — incurred during the fiscal year 2024. We ended the fiscal year with a Net Operating deficit of \$242,347.

The envelope and plate collections have been relatively flat for the past several years, while inflation has steadily increased the costs of our ministries and administration. (See table at right.)

Additionally, to the build up of reserves over the years to ensure the sustainability of the parish, there are funds earmarked for the continuing repair and replacement of the equipment and facilities of the church and School, including a roof replacement on the School building, the upgrade and remodeling of Steiner Hall, the lower stained glass windows in the worship space and planned substantial repairs and improvements to the east parking lot.

Note: Due to the large financial operation, Nativity, by the request of the Pastor, Trustees, and Finance Council undertakes a fully-accredited audit each year. This report is based on this year's audit. The financial statement included revenues and expenses as it relates to parish operations. Nativity reports on a full accrual basis; therefore, we recognize revenues and expenses at the time they were earned and incurred.

Advancement Update

Beth Giese, Director of Advancement

The past year was an exciting and eventful one, including major renovations to the church, paying off the School mortgage, and celebrating the 50th anniversary of the Nativity County Fair. Below are some highlights of the year from the Advancement perspective. We wish to thank all of our parishioners, School families, and event sponsors for your continued investment in Nativity of Our Lord. Please know that we will work diligently to merit your ongoing confidence and support into the future!



To date, \$2.9 million (66%) of the \$4.4 million in Centennial Campaign commitments have been paid. Thanks to our many generous donors, this means we have been able to retire the School debt and complete the vast majority of renovations to our beloved church on time and under budget. The church renovation was originally budgeted at just over \$1.9 million and came in at \$1.455 million because we did not have to use \$460,000 included in the original budget for contingency costs and cost escalation.

The last piece of the church renovations are the 38 lower windows in the church. Design and fabrication of these stained glass windows will be completed under the direction of Fr. Rolf Tollefson, parishioner Joshua Cunningham, and a small committee. The savings realized on the main church renovations from contingency and escalation will cover these costs. Then, our next priority will be the renovations to Steiner Hall, which is a vital gathering space serving our community's many needs including funeral lunches, the Men's Club Donut Sundays, NCCW's Irish Tea, teacher trainings, NCF and Night to Shine Gala steering meetings, and so much more.

2024 Stewardship and Catholic Services Appeal

Nativity's 2024 calendar year Stewardship drive finished the year at \$1,682,571, largely on par with our \$1,655,323 total in 2023. For the 2024 Catholic Services Appeal, Nativity raised a total of \$166,314 versus \$123,907 in 2023. Our goal in 2024 was \$82,766, which resulted in a total rebate to Nativity of \$52,375.94 from the Archdiocese.



Night to Shine Gala

The 2024 Night to Shine Gala took place on April 6, 2024 and celebrated the School's 100th anniversary. By all accounts it was a tremendous success. The Minnesota Twins Big League Experience at Target Field was once again the top seller in the Live Auction. Fund A Need brought in \$166,500 as a one-and-done designation for teacher compensation, which allowed us to bridge the gap created by School debt service payments. Now that the debt has been paid off — thanks to our generous Centennial Campaign donors — the funds previously allocated to debt service may now be used to support our amazing teachers.

Thanks to all of our generous guests and sponsors, the event raised \$400,000 in gross proceeds. After subtracting the Fund A Need and event expenses, the Night to Shine Gala netted an impressive \$116,350 in support for School operations. Please mark your calendars for April 5 for the 2025 Night to Shine Gala!

Nativity County Fair

Last September 13-15 marked the 50th anniversary of the Nativity County Fair. It was a magical community-building weekend despite a few short bouts of rain on Saturday. Fair attendees enjoyed carnival rides, games, amazing food, and fantastic entertainment, as well as the ever-popular outdoor Mass on Sunday, when we formally announced the retirement of the School debt. While first and foremost the Fair is an event focused on fellowship and community, it is also a vital fundraiser benefiting Nativity School. This year \$430,290 was raised and, after subtracting out expenses of \$256,965, the event netted \$173,325 for School operations.

Youth Ministry Emily Meyer, *Youth Ministry*

Youth Ministry at Nativity of Our Lord continues to grow in faith and community. Youth Ministry Nights occur every Wednesday night and are open to 7-12 graders. Topics such as



how to listen to God's voice, prayer, and how to live out the Catholic faith are discussed each week. We also play an active game and end each night with night prayer in the church. Attendees are enrolled in schools all over the Twin Cities, so attending Youth Ministry Nights gives them an opportunity to see old and new friends whom they don't get to see every day.

This past summer, several teens wanted to continue our weekly meetings, which we did on Wednesday mornings for Breakfast and Book Club. We attended 8:15am daily Mass, then met downstairs for breakfast and a book discussion of *The Great Divorce* by C. S. Lewis. This summer also saw 22 high schoolers attend the Steubenville St. Paul conference on the St. Thomas campus. We also had 30 students attend our annual Grill the Priest event with our new parochial vicar, Fr. John Paul Erickson.

Entering the 2024-25 school year, we welcomed Corey Soper (pictured) to the Discipleship Team. Corey is a teacher and campus minister at Nativity School, but also helped lead



events this past summer, and he is the new middle school faith formation catechist on Wednesday nights, preparing our students for Confirmation. He is also co-leading a new program at the School called Middle School Ministry. This group is open to 6-8 graders, meets Tuesdays after school until 3:30pm in his classroom, and explores practical ways to apply the monthly virtue to their lives.

The Nativity Youth Ministry Program appreciates all of your prayers. We are growing at a steady pace and hope to continue being a place where teens can be seen, known, and loved while growing in their Catholic faith within a community of other teens.

Synod Small Groups

The first year of the Archdiocesan Synod Implementation (2023-24) focused on creating small groups. The current year (2024-25) focuses on the Mass, including reverent liturgies, active participation, and a greater overall understanding of the liturgy.



There are now 15 active small groups that meet at various times during the year. All groups follow the Parish Evangelization Cells System (PECS) focused on prayer, faith sharing, and learning about the Mass. Two are couples groups, three are men's groups, seven are women's groups, and the rest are mixed.

Three groups are School moms who meet after student drop off, one is a young adult group (mixed gender), one is for first responders, and another is an extended family group focused on bringing non-practicing family members back to the Church. Both our grief support group and St. Vincent de Paul Society have also adopted the PECS model.

A new group starts in Lent focused on returning Nativity to Perpetual Adoration. Additionally, we are actively looking for more parents to start small groups within the School ahead of year three (2025-26), which will focus on parents as the primary educators of their children.

Liturgy

Nativity of Our Lord has always been home to particularly beautiful liturgies, and our reputation has only been strengthened since Fr. John Paul Erickson (pictured) joined the parish as Parochial Vicar in June of 2024. As the former Director of the Office of Worship for the Archdiocese, he



is a perfect fit for supporting Fr. Tollefson in planning beautiful and profound liturgies, and considering important liturgical questions facing our community.

Towards that end, the parish held Liturgical Listening Sessions near the end of 2024 as a candid forum for discussing the past, present, and future direction of liturgical celebrations at Nativity of Our Lord. These meetings, and the other liturgical projects undertaken in the past year, have complemented the Archdiocesan Synod Year 2 program renewing our zeal for the Mass.

School Update Kate Wollan, *Principal*

Nativity School is Shining Brightly with the Light of Christ!



Each morning the quiet halls of the School quickly fill with the sounds of footsteps, giggling, and excited chatter as we prepare for a new day of learning, praying, and growing! Nativity School remains committed to our three pillars: Faith, Academics, and Character Formation which are the cornerstones of our daily life.

Faith

The Handmaids of the Heart of Jesus have been an incredible gift to Nativity this year. Sr. Angelica leads our preschool children with the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd and Sr. Teresa Rose supports our students in K-8 as they grow in their faith experience.

Nativity School has adopted a new curriculum on the virtues, designed by the Dominican Sisters of Michigan. Sr. Teresa Rose has been instrumental in bringing that program to life for our students in K-5. Our Middle School House System also helps our students better understand the virtues as they become the person God has called them to be.

After the successful completion of the Catholic School Study and Lumen Accreditation last spring, Nativity now has a clear road map for strengthening our Catholic Identity over the next five years.

Academics

Nativity students continue to excel as they wonder, explore, and discover new things about our world and their place in it. They learn to collaborate, think critically and creatively, and build resiliency and stamina in the classroom and beyond.

We use data to drive instruction and learning goals based on student performance on the NWEA MAP test, which is administered two or three times a year to measure student growth in learning in our second through seventh grades. We measure learning growth in reading for our students in grades K-3 on the AIMSWEB assessment.

Our students continue to shine in larger interdisciplinary learning experiences at each grade level to help them see the interconnectedness of content across all curricular areas.

Congratulations to our 8th graders who advanced to the regional Science Fair and our 7th graders who will advance to the regional competition for their History Day projects. Both of these learning opportunities span several months and provide our students, through extensive research, an in-depth look at a specific topic of their choosing.

Faith Formation

Taylor Croissant, Faith Formation

Faith Formation completed another year of faith development for our children and adults here at Nativity of Our Lord. We celebrated First Eucharist for eight children in



May followed by a May Crowning Mass and Ice Cream social for all of the children to celebrate the conclusion of their year of formation. In November, six children received The Sacrament of Confirmation at the Cathedral of St. Paul. Six more children had their Covenant Mass with the School as they started their formation journey towards Confirmation this coming fall. We also had one adult received into Full Communion with the Catholic Church at the Easter Vigil.

For the 2024-25 year, we chose a new curriculum to dive deeper into Sacred Scripture for our youth. We also modified our Confirmation curriculum to be more focused on learning the truths of the faith through the lens of Sacred Scripture, led by Corey Soper. For our adults entering the Church through Adult Initiation (OCIA), we moved to speaker-based sessions each week and opened these sessions to the wider community for those interested in learning more about their Catholic faith.

We also added Family Nights to our formation curriculum, typically designed around forming the family together as a unit and fostering the role of parents as primary educators. We have had several of these nights in the past few months, including a teaching Mass and a family rosary night. All members of the parish are welcome to attend these sessions. The teaching Mass was recorded and can be accessed through the website.

Lastly, in October and November, we offered a new Faith and Science series, including speakers from the University of St. Thomas discussing the intersection of our Catholic faith with controversial topics like evolution and Galileo. We finished the series with a Gold Mass for scientists on the Feast of St. Albert the Great at the Cathedral of St. Paul.

Pastoral Care

Pastoral Care is about love for one another, and we are grateful for another year to pray together, celebrate, learn from one another, mourn together, and serve each other. Pastoral Care encompasses a multitude of support



areas for our parishioners: Homebound and Elderly visits, Respect Life (pictured below), Marriage Enrichment, Grief Group, End of Life/Funerals, and Dorothy Day/Loaves & Fishes at St. Matthew's Parish.

A few highlights of the past year include the launch of a new Marriage Enrichment event called "Wisdom on Wednesday," which was held in the fall and spring. We shared over a dozen handmade Prayer Shawls made by loving parishioners with families. At Christmas time we gave out Gift Baskets for the first time to families in need of extra help during the holidays. The Pastoral Care committee will continue to meet every few months to discuss ongoing activities and ideas on how to improve our reach and care. All members are committed to our community and find it a blessing to serve.



Volunteering

During the 2023-24 year, the role of Volunteer Coordinator was established and staffed in a part-time capacity by Allison Tengblad. This role includes scheduling liturgical volunteers such as ushers, lectors, and Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion, as well as supporting the effort to resume Perpetual Adoration, and assisting the Discipleship team with special events such as our lovely Volunteer Appreciation Event in the fall. This dinner, featuring first-time volunteers serving the meal and a wonderful presentation from Pamela Patnode, was important for recognizing those lay people in the parish who have held the community together as we continue to recover from the disruptions of the pandemic.





Catechesis of the Good Shepherd Teresa Naughton, CGS Coordinator

In the 2023-24 school year, CGS offered two parish-wide Level I experiences and partnered with St. Peter's of Mendota Heights to offer a Level II experience for interested families because Nativity does not



have a Level II atrium or materials. During the school year, conversations were renewed with both the Parish (NELC) and School preschools for new CGS offerings within their curricular day.

With the program set to expand, an inquiry was made to the Handmaids of the Heart of Jesus to enlist their help. By June, a new relationship with the Handmaids and the parish at large had developed, and the 2024–25 school year began with Handmaid Sr. Angelica working with both preschools two mornings per week.

In addition, two more volunteers received CGS Level I training, and our offerings doubled. We currently serve 33 children, with capacity for 42 in our 6 CGS sessions. We now have a team of six women serving CGS as catechists or assistants: Sr. Angelica, Samantha Carroll, Anne Rumpza, Jean Bannick, Jessica Backman, and Teresa Naughton.
