NOTE ON ASH WEDNESDAY

Distribution of Ashes in Time of a Pandemic

The Priest says the prayer for blessing the ashes. He sprinkles the ashes with holy water, without saying anything. Then he addresses all those present and only once says the formula as it appears in the Roman Missal, applying it to all in general: *“Repent, and believe in the Gospel,”* or *“Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.”*

The Priest then cleanses his hands, puts on a face mask and distributes the ashes to those who come to him or, if appropriate, he goes to those who are standing in their places. The Priest takes the ashes and sprinkles them on the head of each one without saying anything.

LENT APPROACHES

During the days of Lent we silence the "Alleluia" so that we may take it up anew on Easter.

Should our prayers be the same during Lent as they are in the rest of the year?

When we retire something familiar for a season, recovering its use has a way of making it "new" for us. Just as after Christmas, we put away the lights, creche and other decorations, so taking a rest from singing the ALLELUIA gives shape and rhythm to life, to prayer, to worship, to relationships – even to our relationship with God.

"Alleluia," the exclamation from Hebrew Scripture, translates as "Praise Yahweh." It is used by the Church as a great expression of joy; hence it is discontinued during the somber penitential season of Lent. We let our "Alleluia" lie dormant for six weeks before we again burst out in joyful affirmation of the Resurrection.

Loving God, as Lent nears we bury the Alleluia, our song of joy. In the forty days of Lent to come, we will sing quieter songs and think about what we can do to follow you more closely. Bless our Lenten days and, when they are done, bring us here again to sing our song of Easter joy. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

A MESSAGE FROM FATHER KEVIN

My brothers and sisters in Christ,

I want to thank everyone who took our parish survey over the last two weeks. There were 166 responses. I will keep the survey open if anyone did not get a chance to take it (you can find the link on our parish homepage), but I want to share with you some observations from the data I've already received.

144 out of 166 respondents rate their experience of Mass at Saint Pius X as 7 or higher. I'm delighted to know people are generally satisfied. We will continually strive to make this a place where souls are nourished, and God is praised.

7 out of 10 respondents were either "somewhat likely" or "very likely" to attend a liturgy directed towards families and young children. Given the strong demand, I will make this a priority in the coming months. I envision part of the liturgy including a children's choir.

7 out of 10 respondents prefer a combination of different music types at Mass. Given that we are in a pandemic, we've been unable to assemble our parish choir. I know Sara Armstrong, our Director of Music, has been in touch with our choir members and is seeking new members. If you are interested in joining, please contact her. We will also look into the use of various instruments.

An interesting observation regarding age: the older a parishioner is, the more likely he/she filled out the survey. 6 out of 10 respondents reported being 55 years old or older. Conversely, only 3 out of 10 respondents reported being 34 or younger. While still ministering to seniors, we also need to increase our outreach to younger generations. They are the future of our parish.

Nearly 1 out of 3 respondents reported watching Mass online. We will continue to offer the livestreaming service for the foreseeable future.

Half of the respondents said that, on a scale of 1 to 10 (highest), adult faith formation was at least a 7. For that reason, Deacon John McKenna and I are offering a six-week bible study on the Gospel of Mark via ZOOM, starting on Ash Wednesday, from 7:00 – 8:30 p.m.

8 out of 10 respondents reported at least some interest in Eucharistic Adoration. I will do more follow up on this, seeking the most preferred dates and times. Stay tuned.

9 out of 10 respondents reported being willing to update their information online. I want to make sure that our parish team is able to communicate with each of you quickly and effectively. We also need to know how many families and parishioners still belong to St. Pius X. We will be conducting a parish census shortly, asking you to update your information. This is a top priority. Please stay tuned for more details.

So, what's the bottom line?


I have begun to assemble a parish pastoral council, which will be charged with implementing our parish vision and mission. At this point, there will be three main pillars: building community (organizing parish gatherings; fundraisers; welcoming new parishioners; and so on); worshipping God (liturgy and music); and making disciples (service opportunities; faith formation; and evangelization). All parish activities should fit into one or more of these categories.

The information received from this survey, and other surveys in the future, will continue to help shape what we prioritize and how we move forward. This is only the beginning. Everyone is invited to participate in some way. I thank you for your input thus far and remain open to suggestions.

Dear Parishioners,

The Finance Council of St. Pius X Church is required by the Archdiocese to provide this Annual Financial Report to all parishioners.

Results of Fiscal Year 2020 The last four months of the fiscal year were exceptionally challenging. With the reassignment of our Pastor Fr. Marek, the transition of several staff members, as well as the uncertainties of the COVID-19 pandemic, our current operating deficit continued. In fact, St. Pius X has operated at a deficit for the last seven years, which greatly threatens our future. The good news is we successfully applied for PPP funding and are working to earn forgiveness.

Our greatest challenge is the decreasing Sunday, Christmas, and Easter collections.

We've had four consecutive years of decline; although last year's drop was only 2.4% (\$7,530), the prior year's decline was \$37,000. We must reverse this trend.

Despite aggressively managing expenses, we were not able to eliminate a deficit for seven consecutive years. The reductions of expenses of \$48,000 resulted from reduced salaries, as well as lower operating costs due to COVID-19 closures. The hiring of new parish staff and the reopening of the church will inhibit our reduction of expenses.

In November 2020, we welcomed Fr. Kevin Kilgore as our Parish Administrator. Fr. Kevin has made an immediate, positive impression and is actively gathering input from all parishioners regarding our spiritual desires and goals for St. Pius X. Together we must all focus on getting every parishioner to "Reconnect and Commit".

For 2021, we are asking for the following actions:

- **Continue to increase donations.** This past Christmas, many of you increased giving by 25%. If most parishioners contribute at this level, we'll immediately correct our deficit.
- **Participate in "We Share: Donations Made Easy"**, enabling a steady stream of monthly income, while providing hassle-free electronic donations. Please enroll in our secure on-line giving platform: <https://stpiusxoldtappan.churchgiving.com>
- **Earmark your special gifts to the St. Pius X Heritage Fund** which go directly to specific needs of our parish, without being subjected to a 14% Archdiocese assessment. This fund enables projects for our Church/property/ministry programs and more.
- **Consider gifts of appreciated stock.** These gifts have a big impact for our Church, and offer significant tax savings for you.
- **Invite your family and friends to get involved.** We are working to expand our parish database to regularly communicate with all parishioners, as we continue our fundraising activities, including Pocket Book Bingo, the Golf Outing, 50/50 Raffles (and perhaps another dinner/dance), while we improve our digital streaming capabilities and social media presence.

Lastly, we invite you to provide your ideas and volunteer. Please call, write or email stpiusot@optonline.net with any/all suggestions. We are truly thankful to all the wonderful families that are part of our parish and look forward to serving our community, together.

ST PIUS X MUSIC MINISTRY

SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Love is in the air, love is in the Scriptures, and love is in our music this week.

St. Valentine's Day can be a polarizing holiday, much like Christmas, because of its commercialism. It's also problematic because, everyone knows, love is complicated. Romantic love is certainly complicated, familial love can be even more complicated. Your love for yourself, for your church, even for God - all complicated. But God's love for us - not complicated. I have personally known God's love for me all my life through music, specifically sacred music. I hear His voice, His strength, His challenges for me, and His mercy all through music.

As you listen to Craig's prelude this week - Liszt's Liebestraum (Love's Dream) - I pray you'll find the time to meditate on the love that is most meaningful to you right now. Perhaps love you are celebrating now, or a love you have lost - for a spouse or family member, or for God.

To honor Jesus' tender mercy and compassion toward the leper in Mark's Gospel today, we sing "Love Divine, All Love's Excelling." Jesus exemplified a new kind of love, boundless and forgiving. I think you'll agree this exciting revelation is captured in the joyful ¾ meter and text of this hymn.

To honor all those in our St. Pius X family who are married, whether your spouse is here on Earth or with our Lord in heaven, I offer a popular wedding hymn, "When Love is Found." The verses capture the complexity of married life. I love how the last verse invites married couples to turn to the Eucharist to find God together - in times of joy or difficulty.

**Praise God for love,
praise God for life,
In age or youth,
in husband, wife.
Lift up your hearts,
Let love be fed
Through death and life
In broken bread.**

Families with young children can enjoy singing along to our Communion hymn, the timeless Gospel refrain, "Let Us Break Bread Together."

Finally, sing your "Alleluias" loud and proud this week; with Lent beginning next week, it's our last chance until Holy Week.

ARCHDIOCESE OF NEWARK **2021 LENTEN REGULATIONS**

**The Season of Lent begins on
Ash Wednesday, February 17, 2021**

- **The days of both FAST & ABSTINENCE during Lent are Ash Wednesday & Good Friday.**
- **The other Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence.**
- **The obligation to observe the laws of Fast & Abstinence is a serious obligation.**

On a FAST DAY, only one full meal is permitted. The two smaller meals, if added together, should not equal the main meal on quantity.

All those between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast.

On a DAY of ABSTINENCE, no meat may be eaten. Those who have reached the age of 14 are obliged by the law of abstinence.

The Fridays of the year outside of Lent are designated as days of penance but individuals may substitute other practices of penance for the traditional abstinence from meat.

The time for fulfilling the Paschal Precept (Easter Duty)
(the obligation of receiving Communion at least once a year)
extends from the 1st Sunday of Lent to Trinity Sunday
(February 21 through May 30, 2021)

Gospel: Mark 1:40-45

Jesus takes pity on a leper and cures him of his disease with a warning not to say but to show himself to the priest and make an offering. Instead of remaining silent, the leper greatly publicized the healing, making it impossible for Jesus to enter the town openly.

Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time ~ February 14, 2021

"A leper came to Jesus and kneeling down begged him and said: 'If you wish you can make me clean.' Moved with pity he stretched out his hand, touched him and said to him, 'I do will it. Be made clean...' The leprosy left him immediately, and he was made clean... The man went away and began to publicize the whole matter. He spread the report abroad so that it was impossible for Jesus to enter a town openly."

This week we will begin the Season of Lent. To prepare myself well, may I find that I too am a leper, needing cleansing, healing, and new spiritual strength.

Consider for a moment the pandemic, now one year old, affecting millions, taking countless lives. The search for a cure, vaccines, the use of masks, distancing and hand washing became a new practice for all. Yet the scars remain.

Our spiritual lives are suffering too. Have I looked at the health of my soul and see the need for cleansing and renewal? Am I ready to tell the Lord today: 'Here I am, how do you find me?' This is my opportunity to be honest with myself and the Lord, to act, ask for forgiveness, to begin a time of prayer, to say thanks to the Lord for a good confession, to admit to my need to learn the mercy of Jesus.

The miracle for the leper, 'If you wish', is mine today, and Jesus, with the same pity as He looks at our corona virus affected world, wishes to help us.
