FROM THE PASTOR'S DESKTOP

Next Saturday, July 16th, is the feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, commemorating the giving of the Brown Scapular to St. Simon Stock and the extending of all of its privileges to all the faithful who have the Scapular imposed upon them and who wear it devoutly.

St. Simon, an Englishman, was one of several who lived as hermits on Mount Carmel, the mountain on which the prophet Elijah had shown that the God of Israel and not Baal was the true God when fire came down from heaven and consumed the sacrifice that he had prepared. (cf. 1 Kings 18) The slaying of the prophets of Baal was followed by the end of a long-continued drought when Elijah saw a cloud descending. This cloud is representative of Our Lady. As it dropped down its dew to the earth, so Mary rained down the Son of God to bring life and grace and fruitfulness to an earth scorched by sin and faithlessness. (cf. Is 45:8) The hermits became known as the Brothers of Blessed Mary of Mount Carmel.

In 1245, the majority of the brothers abandoned Mount Carmel in the face of the conquering Saracens. St. Simon Stock was elected General in the first Chapter of the West held at Aylesford in England. Their establishment in different countries of Europe was not without opposition from some quarters. In the midst of these trials, on the night of 15th/16th July, 1251, "the gracious Queen of Carmel confirmed to her sons by a mysterious sign the right of citizenship she had obtained for them in their newly adopted countries; as mistress and mother of the entire religious state she conferred upon them with her queenly hands the scapular... On giving St. Simon Stock this badge ... the Mother of God said to him: 'Whosoever shall die in this habit shall not suffer eternal flames." (Dom Prosper Gueranger, The Liturgical Year) In 1316, Our Lady appeared to the future Pope John XXII, recommending to him that, once elected as Supreme Pontiff, he should publish the so-called Sabbatine privilege she had obtained from her Divine Son: "I, their Mother, will graciously go down to them on the Saturday after their death, and all whom I find in purgatory I will deliver and will bring to the mountain of life eternal."

Successive popes have earnestly commended the Brown Scapular to the faithful. I will be happy to impose the scapular upon any parishioner who desires it after any of next weekend's Masses. If you already wear the scapular but did not have it imposed, come along. If you do not already have a scapular, I have a number that I can distribute. Our Lady of Mount Carmel, pray for us.

SOMEONE IS SICK: SHOULD THEY REQUEST AN ANOINTING OR A BLESSING?

One of the major changes in emphases over recent decades has concerned the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, previously/traditionally known as Extreme Unction. There was a sense that the priest should not be called until death is near. Even today, a priest often gets called to administer "last rites," more often by those who are not regularly practicing catholics or otherwise not well catechized.

St. James teaches: "Is anyone among you sick? Let him call for the elders (priests) of the church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord. And the prayer of faith will save the one who is sick, and the Lord will raise him up. And if he has committed sins, he will be forgiven." The tradition of having a priest pray over a sick person and anointing him is therefore clearly taught in Sacred Scripture, as is this prayer and anointing's intimate connection with the forgiveness of sins, which is why the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick/Extreme Unction may only be administered by a priest.

But how sick does one need to be to request the Sacrament of Anointing? The Second Vatican Council teaches that the Anointing of the Sick "is not a sacrament for those only who are at the point of death. Hence, as soon as anyone of the faithful begins to be in danger of death from sickness or old age, the fitting time for him to receive this sacrament has certainly already arrived." (see CCC 1514). The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) further explains: "If a sick person who received this anointing recovers his health, he can in the case of another grave illness receive this sacrament again. If during the same illness the person's condition becomes more serious, the sacrament may be repeated. It is fitting to receive the Anointing of the Sick just prior to a serious operation. The same holds for the elderly whose frailty becomes more pronounced." (CCC 1515)

So the illness should be grave, or the operation serious. Theologians suggest that, if a condition would, left to its natural course, lead to death, one should receive the Sacrament. Minor illnesses from which everyone normally recovers, or routine surgery, would not necessarily be the occasion for the reception of this Sacrament.

But how about a blessing? Yes, definitely. A sick person should certainly request and accept a blessing from a priest, and there are special very comforting prayers and blessings for the sick that do not involve the administration of the Sacrament of Anointing. However, there is also the possibility of asking a priest to bless olive oil so that a sick person may anoint him/herself with the blessed oil, or have another family member or friend anoint him/her, so that "those who use this oil ... in your name, may be delivered from all suffering, all infirmity, and all wiles of the enemy." (Roman Ritual, Blessing of Oil). The use of sacramentals such as blessed oil, holy water, scapulars, etc. has always been recommended by the Church. I would be happy to bless oil for anyone who wishes to bring some along. You could then use the blessed oil for minor or chronic illnesses, headaches, stiff joints or muscles, or other pains, reserving the administration of the Sacrament of the Sick for the more serious illnesses. ~~Fr.
