Dear Friends,

Even while our parish office is closed, the staff has been busy reaching out to our community. Thank you for everyone who has shared updated contact information. Because of this activity we were able to identify parishioners who might not have access to technology. Between the parish staff and students in Amy Hall's Missionary Discipleship class, we made phone calls to many parishioners. We were able to confirm that they were okay and that they had support during these times and offer the support of our community. Most of them are living in a senior residence, had family nearby, or had neighbors checking in on them. They were so thankful for the phone call.

We were able to let them know how our community was staying connected. We are livestreaming Mass via Facebook on Sundays. We are praying the Angelus and the Rosary at 12:00noon. Between 8:00pm and 9:00pm we are lighting a candle, placing it in our window, and praying for our community. They were thankful to have this information. They were happy to have a way to join in prayer.

EllenAnn is mailing bulletins to these parishioners. We will call them when we are able to gather as community once again. During this process I was overwhelmed by the resilience and the fortitude of this sector of our population. A good majority of them were born in the 1930's and late 1920's. They have witnessed our world, our country and our Church through many challenging and difficult times. When I asked them if they needed anything, I was awed and inspired by their response. Most said, "I am truly blessed". Many listed their children as their main source of joy and comfort. Many had great things to say about the community at Christ the King. Not one of them had a complaint.

I came away from these conversations with a sense of hope. A sense that our community is strong. Even though we cannot gather in public, our faith will survive any distancing. I look forward to the day when we can nourish our faith once again through the sacraments. I look forward to the day when we can be together. In the meantime, we will continue to be in community through the power of prayer.

MESSAGE FROM FATHER CHRIS

Greetings brothers and sisters in Christ,
I wanted to take this moment to address you at least one more time before Holy Week. I know that this year's Holy Week will not look like any of us had anticipated. It will indeed look very different, but it is important to remember that our Lord has given us this time. And we need to use it well. While we will not be able to gather as a physical community, the meaning and significance of this celebration have not changed.

It is important to note that this Sunday is not just Palm Sunday. The full name for this feast is "Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion". During Mass on Sunday we will read the passion narrative, the account of Jesus' trial and crucifixion. On this feast we not only celebrate our king's entry into Jerusalem, but we also celebrate the reason that our King came to Jerusalem. He came to die for His people and to rise from the dead. So that if we believe in Him, we can share in His resurrection.

This Sunday we commemorate Jesus' triumphant entrance into Jerusalem. Jesus enters Jerusalem and the people greet Him with palm branches. This was a gesture of high respect and honor in ancient Israel. Jesus enters as a triumphant king. And less than a week later, those same people who gave Him honor and adulation will turn on Him and shout, "Crucify Him! Crucify Him!"

The beautiful thing about the feast of Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion is that it shows how loving and merciful our God is. As He enters Jerusalem among honor and adulation, He knows that in less than a week these same people will be calling for His death. And, of course we know the end of the story. He conquers even death and rises from the dead so that if we believe in Him, we can share in the same resurrection.

I hope and pray that this Holy Week will indeed be a holy week for all of you. Although, it will look very different than in previous years, the meaning has not changed. Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ loves us so much that He chooses to come to us and to die for us. He chooses to save us from our sins if we believe in Him and seek redemption. This is the most sacred week in the Church's calendar. My hope and prayer for all of you is that it will be a truly blessed and sacred week.

May the presence of the Lord and many blessings be with all of you.

MESSAGE FROM DEACON JOE

On Palm Sunday, April 9, 1865, Confederate General Robert E. Lee surrendered to Ulysses S. Grant, General of the Union Army, at the Appomattox Court House, Appomattox, Virginia. This surrender ended the bloodiest war ever fought on American soil. State against state, brother against brother, it was a conflict that literally tore the nation apart.

Five days later, on Good Friday, April 14, 1865, America's most revered president, Abraham Lincoln, was shot and mortally wounded by John Wilkes Booth in Ford's Theatre. It was Lincoln who wrote the 1863 Emancipation Proclamation that ended slavery in the United States forever. It was Lincoln who wrote and gave The Gettysburg Address. Lincoln hated war, but he was drawn into this war because he believed it was the only way to save the nation.

On Palm Sunday, the war ended. Triumph. On Good Friday, Abraham Lincoln became the first U.S. president to be assassinated. Tragedy. Welcome to Holy Week. Welcome to the triumph and the tragedy of the six days preceding Easter. God bless you,
