ORIENTATION

Corpus Christi

The feast of Corpus Christi originated during a time when reception of the sacrament of the Eucharist was practiced infrequently among the people. This gave rise to an already growing sense of devotion to the Eucharist, as the host was viewed by the faithful during the elevation at Mass. Over time, this came to be regarded as a principal means of obtaining grace – i.e. seeing (adoring) the Eucharist rather than receiving Holy Communion. Today's solemnity combines this medieval feast of the Most Holy Body of Christ with the nineteenth-century feast of the Most Precious Blood of Christ. In doing this, the Church holds up for us the ideal regard that we should have for both species of the sacrament in Holy Communion.

REFLECTION



The Sign of Bread And Wine In Memory of The Lord

On first reading, today's Gospel appears to be a miracle story: There is not enough food for everyone. Jesus takes action. Everyone is fed and there is food left over. When we however reread the beginning of the passage, we see that it is a prefiguration of the Mass. Jesus began by teaching the crowds about the Kingdom of God before giving them bread in abundance in this desert transformed into a banquet hall. In the Mass also the Word is proclaimed before the bread that has become the Body of Christ is distributed. The ritual gestures, "Then taking the five loaves and the two fish, and looking up to heaven, he said the Blessing over them, Broke them, and Gave them to the disciples to set before the crowd," correspond exactly to the attitude and actions of the Lord at the Last Supper. The passage alludes to the account of the institution of the Eucharist. We are reminded like St. Luke's audience that we are not alone. Christ is present in us through the Eucharist. This Jesus did with the gift of himself, broken and bleeding on the cross. This he continues to do with the gift of himself in bread and wine at every Mass. All we need to do is come, eat and be satisfied by the bread of the Word and the bread of the Body of Christ and go forth with Christ's help to respond to the hunger of the members of the body of Christ and not send them away.

THOUGHT FOR THE DAY

"Then Abram gave him (Melchizedek, the King of Salem and a priest of God most high) a tenth of everything" - Genesis 14:18-20, a quote from today's first reading. This statement has become the seminal text upon which is based the custom of offering one-tenth of one's income for sacred purposes. Many denominations of Christians continue this custom today. Given the character of today's feast and the fact that Jesus offered his Body and Blood completely and without measure for the sustenance and salvation of all, a grateful acknowledgment of only 10 percent seems little enough to offer.

Reasons To Tithe

Everything we have comes as a gift from God. To show our faith and thanksgiving, we can return a part of God's gifts to the Church to help the Church carry on the mission of Christ.

1. Plan ahead to make tithing a regular part of your budget. Be prompt and do not try to miss dates.
