## REFLECTION

### *Go and Give Thanks: Your Faith Has Saved You*

Since the Thirteenth Sunday, we have followed Jesus and his disciples on the “journey to Jerusalem.” In last week’s gospel, the disciples realizing the difficulty involved in being a disciple of Jesus, requested an increase of faith. In reply Jesus offered them the imagery of a mustard seed, teaching them it is the quality of one’s faith and not the quantity that is important. Today, in the gospel, Jesus tests the quality of his follower’s faith through the cleansing of the ten lepers.

Not only has God sent Jesus to call the Jews to salvation, but Samaritans as well. Following his heart rather than Jesus’ orders, the tenth leper was so driven by the experience of being made whole, he returned with gratitude to the *One* who had made it so. This same gratitude should drive us to return to the great feast of thanksgiving that we call the Eucharist. Gathered together each week, we hear the words of Jesus that challenge us to be healed of our pride, selfishness, anger and apathy. We eat the Bread of Life that nourishes us and heals our brokenness. Then we are sent out into the rest of the week to witness to all that we have known in Jesus. Why do we keep coming back week after week to celebrate the Sacred Mysteries? How could we stay away? Like Naaman and the tenth grateful leper, we have the opportunity at every Eucharistic celebration to be transformed by God. Jesus assures us each time we come back, “Stand up and go; your faith has saved you.”

## ORDINARY TIME

### 28<sup>th</sup> Sunday – 34<sup>th</sup> Sunday (Christ The King)

**Introduction:** During this period of Ordinary Time the Lectionary readings begin with a continuation of our reflection on discipleship and community and then abruptly change. In the last weeks we see that the mysterious workings of God find their culmination in the establishment of the reign of God and our invitation to enter into the reign.

**First Readings:** We are told at the onset that faith is the foundation stone of our lives. Later the readings move away from what is expected of us to the unexpected that God accomplishes. The role of prayer is next considered. The final passage that highlights the life of the disciple reminds us of the attitudes that should be ours when we come before God in prayer. We must identify ourselves with the lowly and the needy and humbly bring our petitions before God confident God will hear our prayers.

**Psalms:** The Responsorial Psalms create an assortment of prayerful responses to God and can be viewed as responding to some theme found in the First Reading.

**Second Readings:** With the exception of the reading for the Feast of Christ the King, the passages are continuous readings from 2 Timothy and 2 Thessalonians.

**Gospels:** The Gospel readings are a collection of the teachings of Jesus. Today’s account of the healing of ten lepers ends with an instructive saying, and the report of Jesus’ visit to Zacchaeus is a lesson in action. The teaching itself focuses on four major themes: the question of faith, aspect of prayer, the universality of salvation, and the aspects of the end-time.
