

It is not coincidental that the moment of Jesus' transfiguration and revelation through Moses and Elijah also becomes the occasion for our own call to obedient listening of Jesus.

ORIENTATION

Mountain Experiences: In today's First Reading and Gospel, we are privy to two mountain experiences, that of Abraham and the one Jesus shared with Peter, James and John. Abraham's story is shocking, to say the least. He and Sarah had long awaited the birth of Isaac and had all but given up when three mysterious visitors, to whom Abraham offered generous hospitality, told them to expect a son in a year's time (Gen. 18). Isaac's birth was a miracle; he was a beloved only son, and yet God was asking for his life? And Abraham was ready to obey? The hard lesson here is to open ourselves in faith and trust to a God who cannot be understood, who is beyond all our scheming. Abraham was totally dependent on this God. He did God's will.

Lent is a time to pray quietly, fervently, seeking God's will and then asking for the strength to make it our own. On our *mountain*, we can rethink priorities, set goals and evaluate our relationship with God and with others. It is also a time for realizing that God is God and we are not. When we come to grips with that, we can surrender ourselves to the mystery, and, trust even when reason and common sense warn otherwise.

**Departing In Silence After Mass
On Sundays of Lent**



This year, as in the past on Sundays of Lent we return to the ancient tradition of departing in silence after the Good Friday Service. After the *Dismissal by the Priest or Deacon* there will

be no Recessional Song. All will pause for silent prayer and then depart in silence to emphasize the penitential nature of the Season of Lent.

Genesis 22:1-2, 9a, 10-13, 15-18 Psalm 116
Romans 8:31b-34 Mark 9:2-10

Listening To Jesus

The three disciples' experience and their responds to Jesus' transfiguration could be compared to their experience of Jesus agonizing in the garden. In today's gospel Peter, James and John wanted to build three tents and enjoy Jesus' transfigured glory as long as possible. These same three fell asleep and were of little support to Jesus in his most desperate hour. In telling us of these two moments in Jesus' life and of his disciples' varying responses to them, the gospel of Mark challenges us to consider our own responses to Jesus. How do we respond to him when all is wonderful? How do we respond to him in difficult situations? Are we not tempted like the disciples to "fall asleep" or retreat when following Jesus brings with it a share in his suffering? With these thoughts in mind, we turn for strength and guidance to the voice from the cloud to clarify the significance of the moment and the proper response to it. Jesus is both the Son of God, the agent of healing and God's glory and is at the same time the Son who will be betrayed, tortured and crucified. It is this Jesus, acting in both these roles that God instructs us to listen. It was only later through the resurrection that the disciples truly listened and understood. We who stand on this side of the resurrection are graced to do likewise.
