

Congratulations on your decision to answer God's call to marriage. What God is preparing you for is very important to the Church. Since marriage is both a vocation and a sacrament, the Church takes it very seriously. Our goal is to help you prepare for the Sacrament of Matrimony in such a way that your love for God and each other will continue to grow strong.

GOSPEL VALUES

Your wedding day is an important day for you and your family. You certainly want your wedding to be celebrated in a memorable and dignified manner. Often couples begin their planning with the resolve to keep it simple, but the wedding list grows, the reception menu expands and there are numerous options for the little extras, etc. Pretty soon you can become overwhelmed.

Our Christian way of life places great value on simplicity, an honest and humble presentation of ourselves, a real concern for those who are less fortunate than we are.

It is our hope that you won't let commercialism and current fads pressure you or your families to lose sight of the spiritual dimension of what you are doing.

This is particularly true when it comes to what the bride, groom and attendants wear for the wedding. The church is a sacred space; your dress should be modest and should reflect the sacred nature of the wedding ceremony or Mass.

WHO MAY MARRY AT THE CATHEDRAL & ST. MARY STAR OF THE SEA?

The answer to this question is governed by the Code of Canon Law of the Roman Catholic Church and the policies of the Diocese of Duluth. As you come to the Church seeking to be married, we trust God has called you, as his children, to enter into the sacrament of marriage within the Church. We all live out our faith in community, specifically a parish community, through which our faith grows and is continually nourished, especially through our celebration of the Eucharist on Sundays.

Membership in a parish keeps us active in our faith and makes the vocation of marriage much easier to live out.

Members of our parish may celebrate their weddings at the Cathedral or Star of the Sea.

Former parish members, who now live in another place, must have the written permission of both their current pastor (from the community in which they reside) and the Rector of the Cathedral/Pastor of Star of the Sea, in order to celebrate a marriage here.

Other Catholics, not of this parish may celebrate their weddings here, if the church is available, they are free to marry, and they have the written permission of both their current pastor (from the community in which they reside) and the Rector of the Cathedral/Pastor of Star of the Sea. Wedding requests for other Catholics are considered on a case-by-case basis.

INITIAL MEETING

Contact the Cathedral parish office at least 9 to 12 months before your proposed wedding date to schedule an initial meeting with a priest or deacon. **This meeting is required before your wedding date and time can be finalized on the parish calendar.**

It is important to have this meeting before you arrange for caterers, hall rentals, etc. At this initial meeting, the priest or deacon will interview you to become acquainted with both of you and explain the marriage preparation process.

MARRIAGE PREPARATION PROCESS

The marriage preparation process is intended to help couples discern their readiness for marriage and to prepare them for the Sacrament of Matrimony. Following completion of the initial interview with the priest or deacon, the marriage preparation process begins at least 6 months prior to the planned date of the wedding.

1. Completion of a premarital inventory followed by feedback sessions by the priest or deacon.
2. Completion of the necessary diocesan pre-nuptial forms, including those for permissions and dispensations, if required
3. Instruction in the Catholic Faith
4. Liturgical preparation for the wedding
5. Participation by the couple in an approved engaged couples retreat is also required. You will receive information from the priest or deacon about possible retreat dates.
6. Couples registered at a different parish and/or who live outside of the Duluth area are normally prepared by the pastor of the parish where they currently reside.
7. Please be aware that a pre-nuptial agreement renders marriage invalid.

SCHEDULING YOUR WEDDING

A wedding date cannot be confirmed until the initial meeting with the priest or deacon has been completed and approval granted. Please be aware that Saturday is a busy day in the Church. Cathedral Weddings are scheduled for:

**Saturdays at 2:30 PM at the Cathedral and
1:00 PM at Star of the Sea.**

For Friday weddings, please contact the Cathedral parish office to determine a time. No more than one wedding may be scheduled on a Friday or Saturday. Weddings are generally not scheduled during the seasons of Advent or Lent. Weddings are also not scheduled during Holy Week, Sundays or Holy Days of Obligation. If you must schedule a wedding during these times of the liturgical year, the priest or deacon will inform you of restrictions that may apply.

REQUIRED FORMS

Baptismal Certificates –For Catholics, the baptism certificate must be issued within the past 6 months. You can obtain a baptism certificate by calling or writing the church in which you were baptized and have it sent directly to the parish office. Those baptized at the Cathedral or Star of the Sea can simply ask the parish office to verify their baptism. For a non-Catholic, a copy of a baptismal certificate is acceptable. It need not be recent.

Marriage License – Please apply as soon as possible for the license. The marriage license is valid for a six-month period and will take some time for processing. Bring the marriage license to the parish office at least two weeks prior to the wedding. You can obtain a notarized form from the parish office (or from the pastor of your parish) to receive a discount off your marriage license once you have completed pre-marital education classes. **A wedding cannot be celebrated without a valid Minnesota marriage license.**

THE WEDDING LITURGY

First Option: The Nuptial Mass

When both the Bride and the Groom are Catholic they may celebrate the Nuptial Mass consisting of readings from Scripture, a homily, the exchange of vows, the Eucharistic prayers, the reception of communion, and selected prayers and blessings. Only a priest can celebrate a Nuptial Mass.

Second Option: Wedding without Mass

A couple (Catholic and non-Catholic) will be married in a Wedding Ceremony. The Wedding Ceremony consists of readings from Scripture, a homily, the exchange of vows, and selected prayers and blessings. It may be officiated by a priest or deacon.

THE WEDDING PARTY

General Guidelines

All members of the wedding party are expected to be prompt so the rehearsal and wedding can start on time. All members of the wedding party need to pay attention to directions given at the rehearsal. If members of the wedding party are not at the rehearsal, the best man and maid/matron of honor will be expected to inform them of any instructions prior to the wedding. The best man is responsible for having both wedding rings in his pocket. The maid/matron of honor is expected to assist the bride with her train. The maid/matron of honor and best man must sign the marriage license immediately following the ceremony in the sacristy. Wedding participants are expected to conduct themselves with respectful behavior in the church and on parish grounds.

Best Man's Duties

1. Deliver the envelopes with the offering for the presiding clergy before the wedding begins.
2. Have both wedding rings in your pocket. Make sure to double check.
3. Make sure the groom and all groomsmen are in their respective places no later than 10 minutes before the start of the wedding.
4. If needed, assist the ushers in seating guests.
5. Sign the wedding license immediately after the ceremony in the sacristy.

6. After the wedding, make sure the church is as clean as you found it.

Maid/Matron of Honor's Duties

1. Assist the bride with her train. During the ceremony, receive the bouquet from the bride and then pass to next bridesmaid, so you are available to assist the bride with her train.
2. Make sure the bride and bridesmaids are in their respective places no later than 10 minutes before the start of the wedding.
3. Sign the wedding license immediately after the ceremony in the sacristy.
4. After the wedding, make sure the bridal dressing area is clean.
5. After the wedding, make sure the church is as clean as you found it.

Groomsmen/Bridesmaids Duties

1. Follow the general guidelines.
2. Be in your place no later than 10 minutes before the wedding begins.
3. Assist with seating guests, if needed. (Groomsmen)
4. Assist in additional ways if needed.
5. After the wedding, make sure the church is as clean as you found it.

Ring Bearer/Flower Girl Duties

1. Children under the age of 7 will sit in the pews with a family member during the wedding, after they come down the aisle in the procession.
2. Children over the age of 7 can join the wedding party in the sanctuary.
3. An adult who is familiar with the child should be ready in case there is a problem or emergency.
4. *The pillow that the ring bearer carries cannot have the actual rings tied to it.* The actual rings are the responsibility of the best man.

OTHER WEDDING PARTICIPANTS

Reader - a person or people of your choice who are Catholic and have had reader training can proclaim The Old Testament and New Testament readings. The reader(s) should be provided with an approved copy of the readings at least one week before the weekend so he/she may practice them.

Please Note: ONLY the "New American Bible" can be used in Catholic liturgies.

Greeters - Members of the bride's and groom's family or close friends of the bride and groom should be asked to serve in the role of greeter. The greeters simply stand by the doorway and greet the wedding guests, on your behalf, and may give the guests a wedding program.

Ushers - The ushers are responsible for seating guests in the pews and making sure that the wedding begins on time. Make sure you inform the ushers how you want guests to be seated (bride side, groom side, doesn't matter). The traditional seating of guests involves seating the groom's family and friends on the right side of the church as you face the altar and seating the bride's family and friends on the left side of the church. However, it is advisable to not seat the guests in the traditional manner,

but rather with attention that the two sides of the church have an equal number of people. Make sure to have the ushers move people to the front of the church when they seat them. The wedding couple needs to inform the ushers of the final seating details. The ushers must also be informed if they will be involved with dismissing guests at the end of the wedding.

The ushers need to be aware of the location of restrooms, telephones, and emergency items. The ushers are also responsible for cleaning up the church after the wedding.

PROGRAM

Printed wedding programs that reflect the order of the service are helpful for your guests. They allow full participation of the assembly. Please check with the priest or deacon officiating at the wedding before finalizing the program. Please print the following notice in your program:

We respectfully ask that NO flash pictures be taken during the ceremony while the couple is in the sanctuary.

Please bring at least two copies of the program to the rehearsal.

THE WEDDING REHEARSAL

Rehearsals are usually scheduled for the day prior to the wedding (generally Thursdays at 4:00 PM for Friday weddings and Fridays at 6:00 PM for Saturday weddings.) The date and time will be set during your meeting with the priest or deacon.

All members of the wedding party and wedding participants, including the reader, are required to attend the rehearsal. If a person cannot attend, another person stands in his or her place and instructs the person prior to the wedding on his/her responsibilities. Other friends should meet at the rehearsal dinner. Remind everyone to be punctual.

The reader will practice the Scripture readings at the ambo with the microphone.

Musicians are generally not present at the rehearsal.

The wedding rehearsal usually lasts about an hour.

BRIDE'S ROOM & SOCIAL HALL

At the Cathedral, the bride and her party generally use the multipurpose room directly off the Tower entrance. The groom and his party can use the far end of the Social Hall. At Star of the Sea, the bride and her party use the lower level conference room and the groom and his party may use the Social Hall. Rooms must be cleared before the wedding. Food and beverages are allowed in both rooms

(excluding alcoholic beverages). There are trash receptacles available and supplies for wiping down tables can be found in the social hall kitchen. You should appoint someone who will be in charge of assuring the Bride's room and Social Hall are left clean prior to the wedding.

RECEIVING LINE

On Saturday afternoons there is a 4 PM Mass at Star of the Sea and a 5 PM Mass at the Cathedral, therefore **it is policy that the receiving line take place at the reception not at the Church after the wedding.**

LITURGY & ENVIRONMENT

The environment in the church reflects the liturgical season of the year. Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter and Ordinary Time. Occasional liturgies such as weddings can influence the environment, but they should not dominate nor replace the seasonal décor.

Flowers

Flowers enhance the liturgical service but must be placed so they do not disrupt movements or the focal points of the ceremony. Floral arrangements may be placed next to the altar, but not in front of or on top of the altar. Flowers may also be placed in front of the ambo and around the tabernacle area. All flowers/greenery must be fresh and not artificial.

Candles & Candelabras

Only church owned candles are to be used and the placement of the candles is at the discretion of the rector/pastor. Candles are not allowed to be placed on the ends of the pews or in the aisles. The Cathedral and Star of the Sea do not have candelabras for use.

Unity Candle

Unity candles are not permitted per Diocesan policy.

Aisle Runners

Aisle runners are not permitted due to safety reasons.

Pews

Bows can only be fastened to the pews with ribbon, elastic or string. No tape, tacks, brackets or glue may be used.

Miscellaneous

Rice, birdseed, confetti, rose petals, or any other items may not be thrown inside or outside the church or on parish grounds. Balloons may not be released at church.

PHOTOGRAPHY & VIDEOTAPING

The recording of any wedding ceremony through photography or videotaping must respect the sacred nature of the liturgy and must not be a distraction to the clergy, the bridal party, or the guests. The photographer may take pictures during the wedding ceremony, however, without flash or other extra lighting, and with minimum movement. **Photographers and videographers are not allowed in the sanctuary area or the choir loft during the celebration of the liturgy of your wedding.** Video cameras are allowed on tripods and only in a stationary position in the church during the ceremony.

Please plan to take all wedding pictures prior to the wedding and stop 30 minutes before the wedding.

Pictures may be taken in the church after the ceremony **only** if there is sufficient time to do so before the next function. No sanctuary furniture may be moved for taking pictures. Please provide the name and phone number of your photographer to the priest/ deacon.

LIVESTREAM

The Cathedral livestream (for Cathedral weddings only) is available for use free of charge. The livestream of the wedding will broadcast directly on the Cathedral's YouTube channel.

ETIQUETTE

Food and drink are permitted in the Bride's Room and the Social Hall, but not in the church itself. Alcohol use is not permitted in any area of the parish facilities and grounds. Please dispose of any trash and leave the church facilities in the same condition that you found them.

DONATIONS & FEES

Members of the parish are asked to pay \$250 to help defray the costs of operating this beautiful facility. Non-members are asked to pay \$500 to help defray these costs. A \$100 non-refundable deposit should be paid at the time that the wedding is booked. The remaining portion should be paid two weeks prior to the wedding.

The couple should also offer the priest or deacon an honorarium.

There is an additional charge for musicians. See below.

GUIDELINES FOR WEDDING MUSIC AT THE CATHEDRAL

Congratulations on your upcoming wedding at the Cathedral! Here are some helpful things for you to know in preparation for the music for your ceremony.

Musicians - The Cathedral of Our Lady of the Rosary employs exceptional musicians who will ensure that your wedding music is both beautiful and appropriate for a sacred celebration at the Cathedral. Because the wedding is an extension of worship at the Cathedral, not an isolated event, Cathedral staff musicians must be used for all weddings. If unavailable, they will work with you to find an appropriate substitute. For your service, you will need at minimum a keyboardist and a cantor.

- **Richard Carrick, Director of Music - cantor/vocalist (Ceremony - \$200, Nuptial Mass - \$250)**
- **Brian Kapp, Cathedral Organist/Pianist (\$250 Ceremony/Nuptial Mass)**

Use of outside musicians is only allowed with the approval of the music director. All music they perform must follow Cathedral guidelines and be approved by the music director. Cathedral musicians have the right of first refusal, and a bench fee may apply.

Suggested Music List - All music at Cathedral weddings must be either sacred or classical in nature, both vocal and instrumental. Popular songs are not allowed, even if only instrumental versions without lyrics. Any music found on the attached is pre-approved for weddings at the Cathedral. Psalms and hymns found in the *Ritual Song* hymnal used at the Cathedral are also approved. If you wish to have any alternate music, please communicate with the Director of Music for approval. Please email richard.carrick@duluthcatholic.org or submit your completed Liturgy Planning Sheet to the Cathedral office to solidify your music plan no later than a month before your wedding date.

but none proved to be the suitable partner for the man.
So the Lord God cast a deep sleep on the man,
and while he was asleep,
he took out one of his ribs and closed up its place with flesh.
The Lord God then built up into a woman the rib
that he had taken from the man.

***A reading from the Book of Genesis 24:48-51, 58-67**

The servant of Abraham said to Laban:
“I bowed down in worship to the Lord,
blessing the Lord, the God of my master Abraham,
who had led me on the right road
to obtain the daughter of my master’s kinsman for his son.
If, therefore, you have in mind to show true loyalty to my master,
let me know;
but if not, let me know that, too.
I can then proceed accordingly.”
Laban and his household said in reply:
“This thing comes from the Lord;
we can say nothing to you either for or against it.
Here is Rebekah, ready for you;
take her with you,
that she may become the wife of your master’s son,
as the Lord has said.”
So they called Rebekah and asked her,
“Do you wish to go with this man?”
She answered, “I do.”
At this they allowed their sister Rebekah and her nurse to take leave,

along with Abraham's servant and his men.
Invoking a blessing on Rebekah, they said:
"Sister, may you grow
into thousands of myriads;
And may your descendants gain possession
of the gates of their enemies!"
Then Rebekah and her maids started out;
they mounted their camels and followed the man.
so the servant took Rebekah and went on his way.

4. May the Lord of heaven prosper you both. May he grant you mercy and peace.

***A reading from the Book of Tobit 7:6-14**

Raphael and Tobiah entered the house of Raguel and greeted him.
Raguel sprang up and kissed Tobiah, shedding tears of joy.
But when he heard that Tobit had lost his eyesight,
he was grieved and wept aloud.
He said to Tobiah:
"My child, God bless you!
You are the son of a noble and good father.
But what a terrible misfortune
that such a righteous and charitable man
should be afflicted with blindness!"
He continued to weep in the arms of his kinsman Tobiah.
His wife Edna also wept for Tobit;
and even their daughter Sarah began to weep.

Afterward, Raguel slaughtered a ram from the flock
and gave them a cordial reception.
When they had bathed and reclined to eat,
Tobiah said to Raphael, "Brother Azariah,
ask Raguel to let me marry my kinswoman Sarah."

Sarah got up, and they started to pray
and beg that deliverance might be theirs.
They began with these words:
“Blessed are you, O God of our fathers;
praised be your name forever and ever.
Let the heavens and all your creation
praise you forever.
You made Adam and you gave him his wife Eve
to be his help and support;
and from these two the human race descended.
You said, ‘It is not good for the man to be alone;
let us make him a partner like himself.’
Now, Lord, you know that I take this wife of mine
not because of lust,
but for a noble purpose.
Call down your mercy on me and on her,
and allow us to live together to a happy old age.”
They said together, “Amen, amen.”
The word of the Lord.

6. The woman who fears the Lord is to be praised.

***A reading from the Book of Proverbs 31:10-13, 19-20, 30-31**

When one finds a worthy wife,
her value is far beyond pearls.
Her husband, entrusting his heart to her,
has an unfailing prize.
She brings him good, and not evil,
all the days of her life.

She obtains wool and flax
and makes cloth with skillful hands.
She puts her hands to the distaff,
and her fingers ply the spindle.
She reaches out her hands to the poor,
and extends her arms to the needy.
Charm is deceptive and beauty fleeting;
the woman who fears the Lord is to be praised.
Give her a reward of her labors,
and let her works praise her at the city gates.
The word of the Lord.

7. Stern as death is love.

A reading from the Song of Songs 2:8-10, 14, 16a; 8:6-7a

Hark! my lover—here he comes
springing across the mountains,
leaping across the hills.
My lover is like a gazelle
or a young stag.
Here he stands behind our wall,
gazing through the windows,
peering through the lattices.
My lover speaks; he says to me,
“Arise, my beloved, my dove, my beautiful one, and come!
“O my dove in the clefts of the rock,
in the secret recesses of the cliff,
Let me see you,
let me hear your voice,
for your voice is sweet,
and you are lovely.”
My lover belongs to me and I to him.

glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.
Welcome one another, then, as Christ welcomed you,
for the glory of God.
May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing,
so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit.
The word of the Lord.

4. Your body is a temple of the Spirit.

A reading from the first Letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians 6:13c-15a, 17-20

Brothers and sisters:
The body is not for immorality, but for the Lord,
And the Lord is for the body;
God raised the Lord and will also raise us by his power.
Do you not know that your bodies are members of Christ?
Whoever is joined to the Lord becomes one spirit with him.
Avoid immorality.
Every other sin a person commits is outside the body,
but the immoral person sins against his own body.
Do you not know that your body
is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you,
whom you have from God, and that you are not your own?
For you have been purchased at a price.

5. If I do not have love, I gain nothing.

A reading from the first Letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians 12:31–13:8a

Brothers and sisters:

Strive eagerly for the greatest spiritual gifts.

But I shall show you a still more excellent way.

If I speak in human and angelic tongues

but do not have love,

I am a resounding gong or a clashing cymbal.

And if I have the gift of prophecy

and comprehend all mysteries and all knowledge;

if I have all faith so as to move mountains,

but do not have love, I am nothing.

If I give away everything I own,

and if I hand my body over so that I may boast

but do not have love, I gain nothing.

Love is patient, love is kind.

It is not jealous, is not pompous,

it is not inflated, it is not rude,

it does not seek its own interests,

it is not quick-tempered, it does not brood over injury, it does not rejoice over wrongdoing

but rejoices with the truth.

It bears all things, believes all things,

hopes all things, endures all things.

Love never fails.

The word of the Lord.

6. One Body and one Spirit.

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Ephesians 4:1-6

Brothers and sisters:

I, a prisoner for the Lord,

urge you to live in a manner worthy of the call you have received,

with all humility and gentleness, with patience,

bearing with one another through love,

striving to preserve the unity of the Spirit

through the bond of peace: one Body and one Spirit,

as you were also called to the one hope of your call;

one Lord, one faith, one baptism;

one God and Father of all,

who is over all and through all and in all.
The word of the Lord.

7. This is a great mystery, but I speak in reference to Christ and the Church.

***Long Form: A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Ephesians 5:2a, 21-33**

Brothers and sisters:

Live in love, as Christ loved us
and handed himself over for us.

Be subordinate to one another out of reverence for Christ.

Wives should be subordinate to their husbands as to the Lord.

For the husband is head of his wife
just as Christ is head of the Church,
he himself the savior of the body.

As the Church is subordinate to Christ,
so wives should be subordinate to their husbands in everything.

Husbands, love your wives,
even as Christ loved the Church
and handed himself over for her to sanctify her,
cleansing her by the bath of water with the word,
that he might present to himself the Church in splendor,
without spot or wrinkle or any such thing,
that she might be holy and without blemish.

So also husbands should love their wives as their own bodies.

bearing with one another and forgiving one another,
if one has a grievance against another;
as the Lord has forgiven you, so must you also do.
And over all these put on love,
that is, the bond of perfection.
And let the peace of Christ control your hearts,
the peace into which you were also called in one Body.
And be thankful.
Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly,
as in all wisdom you teach and admonish one another,

and of the ill-treated as of yourselves,
for you also are in the body.
Let marriage be honored among all
and the marriage bed be kept undefiled.

Let your life be free from love of money
but be content with what you have,
for he has said, I will never forsake you or abandon you.
Thus we may say with confidence:
The Lord is my helper,
and I will not be afraid.
The word of the Lord.

11. Be of one mind, sympathetic, loving toward one another.

***A reading from the first Letter of Saint Peter 3:1-9**

Beloved:

You wives should be subordinate to your husbands so that,
even if some disobey the word,
they may be won over without a word by their wives' conduct
when they observe your reverent and chaste behavior.
Your adornment should not be an external one:
braiding the hair, wearing gold jewelry, or dressing in fine clothes,
but rather the hidden character of the heart,
expressed in the imperishable beauty
of a gentle and calm disposition,
which is precious in the sight of God.
For this is also how the holy women who hoped in God
once used to adorn themselves
and were subordinate to their husbands;
thus Sarah obeyed Abraham, calling him "lord."
You are her children when you do what is good
and fear no intimidation.

Likewise, you husbands should live with your wives in understanding,
showing honor to the weaker female sex,
since we are joint heirs of the gift of life,
so that your prayers may not be hindered.
Finally, all of you, be of one mind, sympathetic,
loving toward one another, compassionate, humble.
Do not return evil for evil, or insult for insult;
but, on the contrary, a blessing, because to this you were called,
that you might inherit a blessing.
The word of the Lord.

12. Love in deed and in truth

A reading from the first Letter of Saint John 3:18-24

Children, let us love not in word or speech
but in deed and truth.
Now this is how we shall know that we belong to the truth
and reassure our hearts before him
in whatever our hearts condemn,
for God is greater than our hearts and knows everything.
Beloved, if our hearts do not condemn us,
we have confidence in God
and receive from him whatever we ask,
because we keep his commandments and do what pleases him.
And his commandment is this:
we should believe in the name of his Son, Jesus Christ,
and love one another just as he commanded us.
Those who keep his commandments remain in him, and he in them,
and the way we know that he remains in us

13. God is love.

A reading from the first Letter of Saint John 4:7-12

Beloved, let us love one another,

so that we might have life through him.
In this is love:
not that we have loved God, but that he loved us
and sent his Son as expiation for our sins.
Beloved, if God so loved us,
we also must love one another.
No one has ever seen God.
Yet, if we love one another, God remains in us,
and his love is brought to perfection in us.
The word of the Lord.

14. Blessed are those who have been called to the wedding feast of the Lamb.

A reading from the Book of Revelation 19:1, 5-9a

I, John, heard what sounded like the loud voice
of a great multitude in heaven, saying:

“Alleluia!

Salvation, glory, and might belong to our God.”

A voice coming from the throne said:

“Praise our God, all you his servants,
and you who revere him, small and great.”

Then I heard something like the sound of a great multitude
or the sound of rushing water or mighty peals of thunder,
as they said:

“Alleluia!

The Lord has established his reign,
our God, the almighty.

Let us rejoice and be glad
and give him glory.

For the wedding day of the Lamb has come,
his bride has made herself ready.

She was allowed to wear
a bright, clean linen garment.”

(The linen represents the righteous deeds of the holy ones.)

Then the angel said to me,

“Write this:

8. Remain in my love.

Remain in my love.

Send down on them the grace of the Holy Spirit
and pour your love into their hearts,

that they may remain faithful in the Marriage covenant.

May the grace of love and peace
abide in your daughter N.,

and let her always follow the example of those holy women

whose praises are sung in the Scriptures.
May her husband entrust his heart to her,
so that, acknowledging her as his equal
and his joint heir to the life of grace,
he may show her due honor
and cherish her always
with the love that Christ has for his Church.
And now, Lord, we implore you:
may these your servants
hold fast to the faith and keep your commandments;

may they be blameless in all they do;

Graciously stretch out your right hand

that, as they enter upon this sacramental union,
they may share with one another the gifts of your love
and, by being for each other a sign of your presence,
become one heart and one mind.
May they also sustain, O Lord, by their deeds

Then the Priest, with hands extended over the bride and bridegroom, continues:

Holy Father, maker of the whole world,
who created man and woman in your own image
and willed that their union be crowned with your blessing,
we humbly beseech you for these your servants,
who are joined today in the Sacrament of Matrimony.
May your abundant blessing, Lord,
come down upon this bride, N.,
and upon N., her companion for life,
and may the power of your Holy Spirit
set their hearts aflame from on high,
so that, living out together the gift of Matrimony,
they may (adorn their family with children
and) enrich the Church.
In happiness may they praise you, O Lord,
in sorrow may they seek you out;
may they have the joy of your presence
to assist them in their toil,
and know that you are near
to comfort them in their need;
let them pray to you in the holy assembly
and bear witness to you in the world,
and after a happy old age,
together with the circle of friends that surrounds them,
may they come to the Kingdom of Heaven.
Through Christ our Lord.
