CHAPLAIN'S COLUMN

This year on July 4th we began the count-down to our nation's 250th anniversary. As a second generation American of Irish ancestry, it is worth reflecting on the role immigration has played in creating, arguably, the greatest country in today's era. This includes the eleven American Catholic saints who served God and our country. This column describes the first four saints.

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton (1774-1821), New York City born, she converted to Catholicism and in 1821 founded the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph — the first order of religious women in the U.S. She is considered the founder of the U.S. Catholic School system. Her feast day is Jan. 4.



St. John Neumann (1811-1860) originally a missionary priest from Bohemia, he is the first male U.S. citizen to become a saint. Made bishop of Philadelphia, he founded the first diocesan Catholic school system in the U.S. His feast day is Jan. 5.

St. Marianne Cope (1838-1918) born in Germany, Cope joined the Sisters of the Third Order of Saint Francis, serving multiple times as the congregation's novice mistress and superior of St. Joseph's Hospital. She joined St. Damien in Molokai, Hawaii to serve those quarantined there with leprosy. Her feast day is Jan. 23.

St. Katharine Drexel (1858-1955), dedicated her wealth and life to serving Native Americans and African Americans. She founded the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament for Indians and Colored People, opening schools and mission centers. With her order, she founded New Orleans' Xavier University, the only historically black U.S. Catholic college. Her feast day is March 3.
