Today's Gospel Reflection

<u>First Reading</u>: Sirach 3:17-18, 20, 28-29 <u>Second Reading</u>: Hebrews 12:18-19, 22-24a Gospel: Luke 14:1, 7-14

TRUE HUMILITY

In the <u>Gospel</u> Reading, Jesus censures people who take the seats of honor at a feast. Take the least honorable places, He tells them, and then the host can invite you to a more honorable place.

Jesus is rebuking the pride of those people who go for the honorable seats. But what is the solution to the problem of pride? If you race your friends to the least honorable seat because the reward for doing so is that you get one of the best seats, isn't this pride too?

So what is true humility?

There is a childish kind of pride where you brag about your accomplishments while everybody else tries to be polite enough not to roll their eyes while you are talking. And then there is also the grown-up version of that childish pride, the pride of the self-made man. A multi-millionaire who explains that he has gotten where he is all by himself. He has failed to notice all

Humility is not thinking less of yourself, it's thinking of yourself less.

the gifts he has been given that have helped him get where he is. He thinks he is responsible for the good he has. A more complicated kind of pride can be found in a person who knows that all his good comes from the grace of God. But he is sure that God gave such grace to him and not to his neighbors, because God knew that he, unlike his stupid worldly neighbors, would make good use of God's gifts. This is the pride of a snob. Finally, the worst and most sophisticated kind of pride is found in the Pharisee who thanked God that he was not like other men, especially not like that sinner praying next to him in the Temple. The Pharisee knew that every good in him was a gift from God but he was glad that he had God's gifts and that the sinner didn't. The Pharisee liked looking down on the sinner.

Here is what humility is, then. It is recognizing that every good in yourself is a gift from God and is meant to be given back to the Lord by being shared with others. So you can't get true humility by racing for the least honorable seat. If the least honorable seat is the best place to be seated, then true humility requires your sharing it with others in gratitude to the Lord who gave it.

Luke 14:1, 7-14 UNRECIPROCATED KINDNESS

Jesus was under close and careful scrutiny by the Pharisees who were watching for a misstep in order to discredit Him. They were afraid that His "radical" ideas would undermine the religion and tradition they protected. Nonetheless, He never let this critical scrutiny by His opponents keep Him from saying and doing the right things. As Christians, we must never succumb to pressure to do what is politically or socially correct at the expense of our spiritual beliefs and obligations. For example, there is a cultural value to "networking" —entertaining people who can further our personal or professional goals. There is usually an exchange of favors implied in this kind of relationship, "you scratch my back and I'll scratch yours." In this parable; however, Jesus urged us to forget about obtaining benefit or admiration and instead serve people in need. He said that doing favors for and being kind to the disadvantaged can be very rewarding and will bring blessings to the host. The guests won't be able to reciprocate, but God will certainly repay the kindness. -Growing in Faith-



I'M NOBODY! WHO ARE YOU?

This is the title of one of Emily Dickenson's most beloved poems. Did she really think she was nobody? Did she really think she was nobody? Probably not. But neither was she eager to get bogged down by the approval of others. She seems to have been satisfied with who she was and how she lived her life.

Unlike Dickinson, many of us live for the approval of others. In fact, we almost glorify celebrities—and not simply for their accomplishments.



We all know people who, in the eyes of the broader society, might be considered "nobodies" but who really are the "somebodies." They are like Dickinson. They know who they are and do not pretend to be someone or something else. They do not put on airs; they do not expect to be treated better than others. They simply are who they are. These are the people described in today's readings. They have lived as Sirach counsels: "Humble yourself" (Sirach 3:18). This does not mean humiliate yourself or put yourself down. It means be who you are, the you that God made. Don't try to be someone else. The Gospel story shows what might happen if you think you are more than you really are. The proud man was literally put in his place.

So, who are you? Reflection:

⇒ What do you do to gain other's approval? Does that change who you are?

How often do you describe yourself as better than others? Is it true?

Isn't natural family planning (NFP) a form of birth control? The couple Dear Padre | a form of birth control? The couple still controls the potential of human life that God may have wanted to create at a particular moment.

Couples who use NFP aren't practicing contraception. By giving themselves completely to one another in body and soul, they're preserving the integrity of the marriage sacrament. In God's design, women are naturally infertile for

many days of the menstrual cycle. The marital act during these times promotes bonding and yet is open to new life. There is no sin in abstaining from the marital act. When a husband and wife use NFP appropriately, they share responsibility for living with their combined fertility. Neither spouse takes the other for granted. NFP is a healthy and holistic way to plan for children.

Many couples find that living an NFP lifestyle gives them a better understanding of their fertility, frees them from fear of medical side effects, increases their communication, encourages a greater sense of sharing and a generosity toward life, fosters sexual self-control, and gives them the peace of following their spiritual, religious, cultural, or ethical beliefs. Periodic abstinence encourages couples to focus on aspects of their relationship beyond the physical, resulting in a "honeymoon effect."

NFP's most important benefit is that it enables spouses to live the mutual gift of self that is an essential element of marriage. The Church values marital sexual love. NFP helps couples to be authentic in the expression of that love.
