Faith's Darkness

Why does God stay hidden? Why doesn't God reveal Himself so concretely and physically that no one could doubt His existence? God isn't hidden. We just don't have the eyes to see God because our eyes aren't attuned to that kind of reality. We are just discovering today that one cannot picture God to oneself in an image that has been carved out of the wood of the world.

We struggle with doubt because we can't picture God's existence, imagine God's reality, or feel God's presence in our normal ways. At a certain point, our minds, imaginations and hearts simply run out of gas, out of room, out of feeling, and leave us dry, unable to nail down the reality of God in the way we're used to nailing down most everything else. The reality of God is elusive to our conscious minds and hearts because we can't picture, imagine, or feel God in the usual way we do these things.

Why is that? We struggle with faith because the world is not God and we can't walk around the landscape of spirit in the same way we stroll around in this world. Why not? Precisely because God and the other world are spirit and we are being invited into a reality whose hugeness is beyond conception, whose silence is beyond language, and whose

reality is beyond the physical and all that we can see, touch, taste, smell, and feel in the normal way. God is life, light, love, energy, vastness, and simplicity, beyond our categories.

God has a different metaphysics. Thus, it's easy to have doubts about God's existence, and not just if we are young and still over-enthralled by the reality of this world, its stunning beauty, the promises it dangles before us, and its

overpowering physical character. In a world where the physical defines everything, it can be difficult to believe in anything else.

Such are the dynamics of faith. Sometimes what feels like doubt and atheism (disbelief in existence of gods) is the beginning of real belief. God's person and being are of a different order, beyond the wood of this world, and that over-powering light can feel like darkness.

Restoring the Cup During Holy Communion

Bishop Larry Silva has decided to allow parishes to restore Holy Communion under both kinds (bread and wine), starting Holy Thursday, April 6, 2023. The Church has always taught the doctrine of concomitance, by which we know that under each species alone, the whole Christ is sacramentally present and we receive all the fruit of Eucharistic grace. The Catechism of the Catholic Church (1390) states: "Since Christ is sacramentally present under each of the species, communion under the species of bread alone makes it possible to receive all the fruit of Eucharistic grace. For pastoral reasons this manner of receiving communion has been legitimately established as the most common form in the -Office of Worship/Diocese of Honolulu Latin rite."





The Gift of Doubts

When people tell me they have doubts about their faith, I usually tell them that doubts can be a good thing. "Reflect on your doubts," I say. So very often the doubts bring someone to deeper faith and understanding. When people say they're not sure they believe in God anymore, often what they mean is that they don't believe in



a particular idea of God, like the bearded old man in the sky or a God who "allows" children to die of cancer and "permits" wars that slaughter people.

What such doubts ask us to do is to rethink our understanding of who God is. Tossing out our old idea of God does not mean there is no God. It simply means we had a faulty or immature notion of God. It may take some time to rethink who God is, but if we stay with it, do some reading, ask some questions, and pray over it, we may come to a deeper and richer understanding of God. In short, because I don't understand how something can be does not mean something—or someone—is not true or real.

In this week's Gospel, Thomas, who was not with the community when Jesus appeared, later could not believe that the Jesus he had known was alive. He doubted. Yet when he was with the community the following week, he discovered that the risen Lord was indeed real but in an entirely new reality. It takes a community of faith to become a believer.

I am very curious why after His resurrection, Jesus told Mary Magdalene not to touch Him, but in the upper room, Thomas was encouraged to touch Him.



Saint John tells us of this incident between Mary and the risen Jesus. There are scholars who say that immediately after Jesus spoke to Mary He ascended to heaven. His encounter with Thomas, then, would be after the ascension, and the feast of the Ascension we celebrate forty days after Easter is simply a termination of Jesus' earthly appearances.

There is another explanation to consider, offered by other Scripture scholars. The word Jesus uses to tell Mary Magdalene not to touch Him is more like "cling" to Him. She cannot *cling* to her old relationship with Jesus. Since His resurrection, a new relationship is necessary. Mary was looking for the Jesus she knew before the passion, not the Jesus of the resurrection. She must now come to know the risen Jesus.

Mary could not cling to Jesus because she had to see Him in a new way. For Thomas, the situation is different. Jesus invites Thomas to place his hand on the wounds to prove that He is "real"—that He is really a new kind of being, a resurrected being. Thomas, in his way, also wants to cling to what he thought he knew about Jesus. Both he and Mary Magdalene were close to Jesus, but even so, there were things they still did not understand. Jesus always has the ability to surprise us.
