Sinners yet Loved

Suppose you and I are walking along in the countryside, and a stranger starts to stroll along with us.

"What are you discussing as you walk along?" he asks. We stop, dejected. One of us says to him in reply, "Are you the only person in the world who does not know of the things that have taken place during these years and these centuries?"

He replies, "What sort of things?" You say, "We had promised to continue Christ's works, to revere His presence, to preserve His love and to let it overflow through us to everyone." You stare at the ground. "But now the Church is falling apart. So much is happening, including betrayal of the Church's mission."

"Betrayal?" the stranger asks. "Yes, we found out that some of our own priests and even some Bishops have gone against the very mission they were sent to preach. And churches are closing in all the cities, and dioceses are going bankrupt! And hardly anyone is entering the priesthood now, so how are we going to have the sacraments?"

I gesture to you with a "calm down" motion, but you go right on talking. "We have crucified Christ all over again! Oh, we were hoping that He would make the whole world come right!"

"How slow of heart you are to believe all that prophets spoke," he says quietly. "Is it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things even today and so enter into His glory?"

What do you mean? Why should He suffer? And worse, why would He let all these horrors happen, in Ukraine and the South..."

He raises His hand, begins to tell us everything that refers to Himself in the scriptures, beginning with Moses and all the prophets. His voice is very kind. He shows how God had endlessly sought a loving relationship with His people, and how these would agree for a while but then turn their backs and run away. Battles and wars, belief and unbelief, rich versus poor and sick, the very ones who are aching for love. He tells us that there is only one way the human heart could say Yes to God and mean it. One human being had to do it on behalf of us all, one who was human to the core and who could not refuse to remember God's love, even in the midst of mindless suffering and death. This one would be with the troubled people of the world, be with them in every pain and also every joy of their lives. God's love, He said, is stronger than death.

The stranger goes on with us and stays with us. He walks with human beings now, with a love so deep that we can always count on it, even if we are sinners. It is a love which strengthens us and sends us out. It is God's love.

You are now calm as we walk, and I am too. Maybe the resurrection did happen, you whisper to me so that the stranger cannot hear it. We both nod. We have recognized Him. We see Him in the breaking of the bread, but also and astoundingly in the breaking bones of the world.

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Restoring the Cup During Holy Communion

Bishop Larry Silva has decided to allow parishes to restore Holy Communion under both kinds (bread and wine), starting Holy Thursday, April 6, 2023. The Church has always taught the doctrine of concomitance, by which we know that under each species alone, the whole Christ is sacramentally present and we receive all the fruit of Eucharistic grace. The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* (1390) states: "Since Christ is sacramentally present under each of the species, communion under the species of bread alone makes it possible to receive all the fruit of Eucharistic grace. For pastoral reasons this manner of receiving communion has been legitimately established as the most common form in the Latin rite."

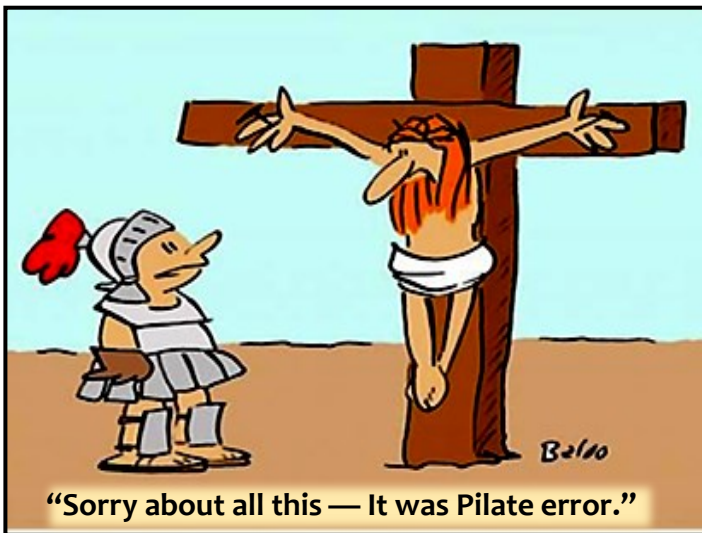

Do you know of anyone who suffers mental illness or an obsession? Mental illness can be displayed in many forms, such as depression, bipolar disorder, anxiety, schizophrenia, or obsessive compulsion. Those who suffer from such states sometimes fail to ask for help, or simply refuse to seek treatment. Recovery is then delayed or never achieved. Perhaps a more difficult situation is refusing to accept you have the illness when all symptoms and actions point to the collapse of normal behavior. Even more heartbreaking is when the person who manifests these flaws is independent and occupies an integral part of the community. Such a tormented individual may refuse to seek treatment and instead, wallow in isolation and constant denial. When mental affliction interferes with your ability to function properly, obtaining professional help and/or intervention is best advised. *"And when all else fails, pray!"* We can always pray for the afflicted. One thing we do know is that God is good and whatever God allows to happen in response to prayer has got to be good. We are all children of God and our life is of immense value to Him. We all matter to Him. If we can't lead the anguished for treatment, we can only hope our prayers jump starts the heart to admit the irrational addiction, consent to restorative advice and embark on healing! *"Is anyone among you suffering? Let him pray. Is anyone among you sick?...The prayer of faith will save the sick, and the Lord will rise him up. And if he has committed sins, he will be forgiven."* James 5:13-15.

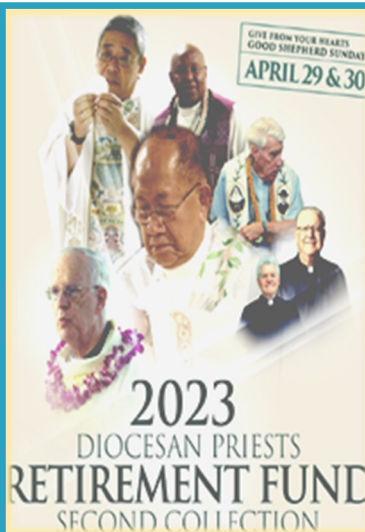

NOT JUST A WALK IN THE PARK

A multiple-choice question: Life is (a) purgatory, (b) a party, (c) a drudgery, (d) a maze, or (e) a trial. Many of us might be inclined to answer, "All of the above." Life takes us along many paths, through many fields, and down many blind alleys.

The *Camino de Santiago* is a hiking trail of about 500 miles that begins in France, makes its way through Spain, and ends at the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela, where tradition has it that the remains of St. James are buried. Many walk the journey to discover who they are and what their lives are about. Walking ten to fifteen miles a day with little to think about other than one's life tends to turn the hike into a pilgrimage that thousands have made over the centuries for just that purpose. The pilgrimage is arduous, often plagued, with rain, blisters, shin splints, and a discovery of how to travel light. But then, such is all of life.

This week's Emmaus Gospel recounts a similar journey compressed into one day. Like life, it begins in confusion, is scattered with insights and revelations about what has just taken place and ends with the discovery that the Lord has been the one walking with them. Faith does not solve one's problems nor eliminate one's difficulties. It does help us understand life and find meaning in the midst of it all, and somehow it brings us to realize that we do not travel alone, making the journey worthwhile and blessed.

Dear Padre

Our planet's condition is now a serious problem. Why is climate change hardly mentioned in homilies?

Many people view climate change as a political issue more than a religious one. As such, some homilists avoid controversial, politicized topics altogether; others are selective in preaching about them; still others tend to use the pulpit as a soapbox for a single political issue or a variety of them. Moreover, preachers themselves are not apolitical, nor are they all extreme in their ideologies. Like those in the pews, homilists have biases, too.

So how did climate change become so politicized? Despite decades of substantial evidence from many respected scientific experts, confusion exists about climate change because the issue's scope is massive and hard to digest, international cooperation is mandatory, and polar-opposite opinions of politicians and their followers are often intransigent. Nevertheless, Pope Francis convened an international conference in 2019 to look at how religions can help the world reach sustainable ecological goals by 2030 to, he said, repair "the damage we have done. No branch of science or form of wisdom should be overlooked, and this includes religions and the languages particular to them."

Thus, according to the Pope, "religious voices" play a crucial role in addressing the serious condition of our planet. Inasmuch as religion has a fundamental responsibility to offer people faith and hope in a better world—and homilies help believers find meaning and purpose—taking action and speaking out about humanity's well-being are becoming less optional.

Return love for Love:
The Eucharist is not a symbol; it is Jesus Christ. He loves us beyond imagining — personally, closely, sacrificially, and tenderly. In adoring, receiving, and loving the Blessed Sacrament, we're returning love for Love.

Fuel for the fight: The Eucharist nourishes and strengthens our souls. "How can we last...without hearing Jesus say, 'I love you' — impossible..." (Mother Teresa). The Eucharist strengthens against temptation and

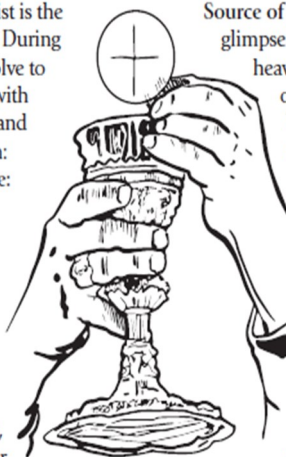
protects from mortal sins.

Source of joy: The Eucharist is a glimpse of Heaven, a foretaste of the heavenly banquet, and a pledge of future glory. St. John Vianney commented, "If we really understood the Mass, we would die of joy."

weighty decisions, questions, or doubts.

Communion empowers us to love: "Even as I have loved you...you also love one another" (John 13:34). Jesus specifically told his followers to love others as we've been loved. Receiving the Eucharist worthily empowers us to love like Him.
