The Holy Gospel

Matthew 13:24-43

At that time: Jesus put another parable before them, saying, "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a man who sowed good seed in his field; but while men were sleeping, his enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat, and went away. So when the plants came up and bore grain, then the weeds appeared also. And the servants of the householder came and said to him, 'Sir, did you not sow good seed in your field? How then has it weeds?' He said to them, 'An enemy has done this.' The servants said to him, 'Then do you want us to go and gather them?' But he said, 'No; lest in gathering the weeds you root up the wheat along with them. Let both grow together until the harvest; and at harvest time I will tell the reapers, Gather the weeds first and bind them in bundles to be burned, but gather the wheat into my barn." Another parable he put before them, saying, "The kingdom of heaven is like a grain of mustard seed which a man took and sowed in his field; it is the smallest of all seeds, but when it has grown it is the greatest of shrubs and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches." He told them another parable. "The kingdom of heaven is like leaven which a woman took and hid in three measures of flour, till it was all leavened." All this Jesus said to the crowds in parables; indeed he said nothing to them without a parable. This was to fulfil what was spoken by the prophet: "I will open my mouth in parables, I will utter what has been hidden since the foundation of the world." Then he left the crowds and went into the house. And his disciples came to him, saying, "Explain to us the parable of the weeds of the field." He answered, "He who sows the good seed is the Son of man; the field is the world, and the good seed means the sons of the kingdom; the weeds are the sons of the evil one, and the enemy who sowed them is the devil; the harvest is the close of the age, and the reapers are angels. Just as the weeds are gathered and burned with fire, so will it be at the close of the age. The Son of man will send his angels, and they will gather out of his kingdom all causes of sin and all evildoers, and throw them into the furnace of fire; where men will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. He who has ears, let him hear."

TO THE PARISHIONERS OF SMV

We reap what we sow. This is something we know in the physical world. When you plant a watermelon seed you expect to get a watermelon, not an apple. The amount of time and attention you put into a plant will largely determine the fruit you will harvest. The same is true of our bodies. A brisk daily walk of five miles will build up our leg and heart muscles and improve our lung capacity. But we rarely apply this same principle to our spiritual and moral lives. But as the late Archbishop Fulton Sheen (who wrote many books explaining the faith, was the first "televangelist" in the 1950's and 60's and is in the process for sainthood) points out: "The more one uses what is good, the more one develops and enriches it. The more the intellect is used for the high purposes to which it is destined, the more agile and profound it becomes." Turn off the television, shut down facebook and xbox, and open the Bible, pick up the Rosary beads. It's that simple, it's that hard.

The same is true for our conscience. When we listen to the voice of our conscience to choose the good for ourselves and for others, we become kinder and more sympathetic. We see that the faults we find with others are something we can so readily see because they are also within us. We gain an honest perspective of ourselves that fuels our prayers and use of the sacraments to seek heavenly help. If someone pushes your button, say a prayer instead of the sacrastic retort, or launching into the blame game. Then think back to when you have been the recipient of sarcastic retorts and you often find you were pushing their buttons.

And if we neglect the gift of conscience, it begins to dwindle and we can become like the mole who never uses his eyes and becomes blind. We become blind to what is best for ourselves and others. As Sheen points out, "Any truth that is meant to influence life, if held lightly or indifferently, generally evaporates. The moral truths that we already know, if not followed through with some discipline and effort, soon become unwelcome truths, because they are at variance with the way we live."

The sanctity and dignity of life, chastity and marriage are some of the truths that have become unpopular and scorned in the culture of death that surrounds us. The cost is broken and painful lives. Denying God's truth always carries a hefty penalty that is why the Lord puts out the stop commands to save us from self-destruction and offers us his Mercy to begin again. So if we are going to exercise, our minds, will and conscience to obtain or regain joyful and peaceful lives, we need the discipline of worship, prayer, examination of conscience, study and fasting. These elements are contained in all the lives of the saints. As Sheen says this "law is written in every heart. Whatever we cultivate, bestial or divine will grow, whatever we repress or neglect will die." What stops us from becoming a saint is the reflection that greets us every morning from the bathroom mirror. How will we choose to spend the next minute? Will it build up our spiritual and moral lives or diminish it? We make that choice a thousand times a day. Choose God, choose truth, choose love.
