TO THE PARISHIONERS OF SMV

We are continuing to look at Archbishop Chaput's book, *Strangers in a Strange Land*. I find it helpful to have other eyes look upon the various indicators, trends and scenarios of today's social and cultural landscape and make sure that what I see happening is indeed so. It is in that way we may better understand how to propose ways to offer a response to this rapidly changing landscape.

One of the things he notes is the idea of the pendulum of politics swinging back and forth, and waiting until "things will return to normal" is misleading, because loyalties change, and who we thought would stand a particular way is no longer doing so. "Traditionally, nations depend on the continuity of generations to transmit memories and belief across time and thus sustain their identity. At least for the United States, that pattern is now smashed. Discontinuity, more and more, drives today's American life."

"Little things, too, can have big consequences. The transistor, perfected in 1947...transformed the field of electronics" and "the advent of the birth control pill for public use in 1960." "Half a century after the sixties, many American young people are more committedly pro-life than their parents and even their grandparents. This seems ironic, but it shouldn't surprise. They've seen what abortion does. They lived with the fact that they could have been aborted. The humanity of the unborn child is obvious on any ultrasound machine. The bad news is that many of these same young adults are less interested in marrying than their parents were...they're also much more casual in pursuing active sexual lives, with or without the baggage of long-term commitment." "All of this underscores a simple fact: the surest way to transform a culture is from the inside out. And the surest path to doing it isn't through reasoned debate (too tedious) or violence (too costly) but by colonizing and reshaping the culture's appetites and behaviors."

One of the appetites that is killing (my word) civilization from the inside out is pornography. It changes brain chemistry, destroys marriages, breaks families and exploits people as objects in so many ways. Ask any priest, he will tell you the same. Why the people you would think would be so opposed to the exploitation of females are almost silent on this issue is chilling and a major indicator that everything is upside down.

The Archbishop quotes a Notre Dame study from 2011. "Emerging adults are oblivious to spiritual truth, service to the well-being of others...focusing almost exclusively on materialistic consumption and financial security...and where addictions and intoxications of all sorts are a central part of emerging adult culture...They do not know the moral landscape of the real world...they've had withheld from them something that every person deserves to have a chance to learn: how to think, speak, act well on matters of good and bad, right and wrong." And who did the withholding? "Adults and the adult world are almost always complicit in the troubles..."

"But the example of parents remains a key factor – often the key factor – in shaping young adult lives. The family is the main transmitter of religious convictions. Disrupting the family disrupts an entire cultural ecology."

And I would add, as we know the family is the first building block of society; and the first cell of the Church; all of which is under assault and well on the way to being destroyed. All of which was foretold by Our Lady of Fatima. Which makes what we see going on around and within us a spiritual battle; a battle with the prince of lies: the devil.
