Gospel

Mark 5:21-43

At that time: When Jesus had crossed again in the boat to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, a great crowd gathered about him: and he was beside the sea. Then came one of the rulers of the synagogue, Jairus by name; and seeing him, he fell at his feet, and begged him, saying, "My little daughter is at the point of death. Come and lay your hands on her, so that she may be made well, and live." And he went with him. And a great crowd followed him and thronged about him. And there was a woman who had had a flow of blood for twelve years, and who had suffered much under many physicians, and had spent all that she had, and was no better but rather grew worse. She had heard the reports about Jesus, and came up behind him in the crowd and touched his garment. For she said, "If I touch even his garments, I shall be made well." And immediately the hemorrhage ceased; and she felt in her body that she was healed of her disease. And Jesus. perceiving in himself that power had gone forth from him, immediately turned about in the crowd, and said, "Who touched my garments?" And his disciples said to him, "You see the crowd pressing around you, and yet you say, 'Who touched me?'" And he looked around to see who had done it. But the woman, knowing what had been done to her, came in fear and trembling and fell down before him, and told him the whole truth. And he said to her, "Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace, and be healed of your disease." While he was still speaking, there came from the ruler's house some who said, "Your daughter is dead. Why trouble the Teacher any further?" But ignoring what they said, Jesus said to the ruler of the synagogue, "Do not fear, only believe." And he allowed no one to follow him except Peter and James and John the brother of James. When they came to the house of the ruler of the synagogue, he saw a tumult, and people weeping and wailing loudly. And when he had entered, he said to them, "Why do you make a tumult and weep? The child is not dead but sleeping." And they laughed at him. But he put them all outside, and took the child's father and mother and those who were with him, and went in where the child was. Taking her by the hand he said to her, "Talitha cumi"; which means, "Little girl, I say to you, arise." And immediately the girl got up and walked; for she was twelve years old. And immediately they were overcome with amazement. And he strictly charged them that no one should know this, and told them to give her something to eat.

To the Parishioners of St. Mary the Virgin,

"Do not be afraid, just have faith," are the words Jesus spoke to Jairus, a father pleading for the life of his young daughter who had been told she was already dead. "Do not be afraid," "just have faith" are words that we should remember more in the circumstances of our lives, especially when we get news that makes us aware of our mortality. God can grant miracles that restore us to health, walk with us in our valley of suffering or, give us a time of final preparation for an eternity with him. But whatever happens to us, the message is the same, do not be afraid, have faith, and trust God. Sounds simple, but our independent, stubborn, fearful and sometimes prideful nature constantly gets in the way and that is one of the reasons why God supernaturally breaks into our world and grants miracles.

Recently, the Marian shrine in Lourdes officially declared a 70th miracle since the Holy Mother appeared to St. Bernadette Soubirous in 1858 at the grotto. More than 7,000 miracles have been proclaimed by pilgrims to Lourdes, but only 70 have successfully undergone the rigorous process required by the church before a miracle is declared.

The 69th miracle occurred on May 4, 1989, but was not approved until 2013. According to the Catholic News Service, Mrs. Danila Castelli started suffering from dangers spikes in her blood pressure at age 34 due to secretions from tumors. Multiple surgeries were performed without success. Castelli was about to embark on a trip to Mayo clinic with her husband, who is a doctor, when she instead decided to fulfill her longstanding desire to make a pilgrimage to Lourdes.

Castelli said she emerged from a bath at Lourdes with an extraordinary feeling of wellbeing, and her husband immediately knew she had been cured when he saw her. From that day she has never again experienced an episode of high blood pressure. Shortly after the pilgrimage, Castelli reported her cure to the Lourdes officials, which started the 23-year process of scrutiny.

Reported cures at Lourdes are examined by a Medical Bureau made up of about 40 people from around the world who come from different medical specialties and backgrounds. The Medical Bureau met five separate times between 1989 and 2010 to examine Castelli's cure, which also had to be approved by the bishop of her local diocese in Italy.

Every pilgrim to Lourdes has one thing in common, faith that God can grant miracles. If they didn't have that hope, they would never begin the journey. I hope ever person who enters into our parishes also has the faith that God grants miracles. Because each and every Mass is a miracle of transubstantiation and an outpouring of God's love and grace. Like Danila Castelli we should leave each Mass with an extraordinary feeling of wellbeing.

If that is not your experience of Mass, begin the pilgrimage of faith so that with God's help you will find the spiritual healing your soul needs. At every Mass, I pray that God will grant us peace, which is not based on our health or circumstance, but on God's mercy. Be not afraid, begin the pilgrimage of faith.
