The Holy Gospel

Matthew 13: 24-43

At that time: Jesus put another parable before the crowds, saying, "The kingdom of Heaven may be compared to a man who sowed good seed in his field; but while men were sleeping, his enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat and went away. So when the plant came up and bore grain, then the weeds appeared also.

"And the servants of the householder came and said to him, 'Sir, did you not sow good seed in your field? How then has it weeds?"

"He said to them, 'An enemy has done this.' "The servants said to him, "Then do you want us to go and gather them?'

"But he said, 'No: lest in gathering the weeds you root up the wheat along with them. Let both grow together until harvest; and at harvest time, I will tell the reapers, Gather the weeds first and bind them in bundles to be burned, but gather the wheat into my barn."

Another parable he put before them, saying, "The kingdom of heaven is like a grain of mustard seed which a man took and sowed in his field; it is the smallest of all seeds, but when it has grown it is the greatest of shrubs and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches."

He told them another parable. "The kingdom of heaven is like leaven which a woman took and hid in three measures of meal, till it was all leavened."

All these Jesus said to the crowds in parables; Indeed he said nothing to them without a parable. "I will open my mouth in parables, I will utter what has been hidden since the foundation of the world."

Then he left the crowd and went into the house. And his disciples came to him, saying, "Explain to us the parable of the weeds of the field.." He answered, "He who sowed the seed is the Son of man; the field is the world, and the good seed means the sons of the kingdom; the weeds are the sons of the evil one, and the enemy who sowed them is the devil; the harvest is the close of the age, and the reapers are the angels.

Just as the weeds are gathered and burned with fire, so will it be at the close of the age. The Son of man will send his angels, and they will gather out of his kingdom all causes of sin and all evil doers, and throw them into the furnace of fire, where there willd be weeping and gnashing of teeth. Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. He who has ears, let him hear."

Have you been attending St. Mary the Virgin and consider yourself a member of our parish? If so, have you filled out a parish registration form? The forms are located in the Narthex on the table and once filled out and entered into our database, you are an official member of the parish. This is important when it comes to receiving sacraments, receiving letters of good standing when asked to be a sponsor or godparent in another parish and for using the parish hall for your personal events.

Dear Friends in Christ:

Yesterday we celebrated the Festival of St. Mary Magdalene. She is one of the greatest saints of the Bible, and a legendary example of God's mercy and grace. St. Thomas Aguinas called her "The Apostle of the Apostles." The precise dates of her birth and death are unknown, but we do know she was present with Christ during his public ministry, death and resurrection. She is mentioned at least a dozen times in the Gospels. Her name comes from her hometown of Magdala, a fishing village on the western shore of Lake Tiberias. St Luke the Evangelist tells us, in Chapter 8 of his Gospel, how Jesus went from town to town announcing the Good News of the Kingdom of God, and how the Twelve Apostles were with Him, together with some women who had been healed of evil spirits or infirmities and were serving them. Among these was a certain "Mary, called the Magdalene, from whom seven demons came out."

Mary Magdalene has long been regarded as a prostitute or sexually immoral in Western Christianity, but this is not actually supported in the Scriptures. The Gospels agree that Mary was originally a great sinner since Jesus cast seven demons out of her when He met her. After this, she told several women she associated with, and these women also became followers. During Jesus' ministry, it is believed that Mary Magdalene followed him, part of a semi-permanent entourage who served Jesus and the Apostles. There is also some debate over if Mary Magdalene is the same unnamed women, a sinner, who weeps and washes Jesus' feet with her hair in the Gospel of John. Some scholars are skeptical that this is the same person.

Despite the scholarly dispute over her background, what she did in her subsequent life, after meeting Jesus, is much more significant. Mary Magdalene appears in the Gospels in the most dramatic moment of Jesus' life, when she accompanies Him to Calvary and, along with other women,

observes Him from afar. She is still there when Joseph of Arimathea places the body of Jesus in the sepulcher, which is closed with a stone. And on the morning of the first day of the week, it is she who returns to the tomb, finds the stone rolled away, and runs to warn Peter and John. They in turn hurry to the empty tomb and discover that the body of the Lord is missing.

Mary Magdalene is the first among the women following Jesus to proclaim Him as having overcome death. She is the first to announce the joyful message of Easter. But she also proved she was among those who loved Him most when she stood at the foot of the Cross on Mount Calvary together with Mary, His Mother, and the "Beloved Disciple", St. John. She did not deny him, or run away in fear, as the other disciples did, but remained close to Him every moment, up to and including, the tomb.

After the death of Christ, a legend states that she remained among the early Christians. After fourteen years, she was allegedly put into a boat by some Jews, along with several other saints of the early Church, and set adrift without sails or oars. The boat landed in southern France, where she spent the remaining years of her life living in solitude, in a cave.

St. Mary Magdalene's feast day is July 22. Pope Francis elevated the memory of Mary Magdalene to the status of Festivity on July 22nd, 2016, in order to stress the importance of this faithful disciple of Christ. She is the patroness of converts, repentant sinners, sexual temptation, pharmacists, tanners and women, and many other places and causes.

May she, the Apostle to the Apostles, intercede for us when we need a Heavenly Patroness.
