The Holy Gospel

Matthew 2: 1-12

Now when Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the king, behold, Wise Men from the East came to Jerusalem, saying, "Where is he who has been born king of the Jews? For we have seen his star in the East, and have come to worship him."

When Herod the king heard this, he was troubled, and all Jerusalem, with him; and assembling all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it is written by the prophet: 'And you, O Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who will govern my people Israel.' "

Then Herod summoned the Wise Men secretly and ascertained from them what time the star appeared; and he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child, and when you have found him bring me word, that I too may come and worship him." When they had heard the king they went their way; and behold, the star which they had seen in the East went before them, till it came to rest over the place where the child was. When they saw the star, they rejoiced exceedingly with great joy; and going into the house they saw the child with Mary his mother, and they fell down and worshiped him. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts, gold and frankincense and myrrh. And being warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they departed to their own country by another way.

Epiphany Chalk Blessing

Today we celebrate the Feast for the Epiphany (which means "manifestation" or "revealing") and commemorates the Magi who came from the four corners of the world bearing gifts and following a star to meet the child who would become king. We celebrate Epiphany to remember that we too are invited to come and witness the life of Jesus and be blessed as we begin a new year. "Chalking the door" is a centuries-old way to celebrate and to (literally) mark the occasion of the Epiphany with God's blessing of our lives and homes. We again invite God's presence into our homes and His blessing upon all those who live, work, or visit throughout the coming year. Each year, using blessed chalk, people mark the doorpost of their home with an inscription of the new year separated by C+M+B. It stands for the Latin words Christus Mansionem Benedictat. Which means "May Christ bless this house." The letters can also stand for the traditional names of the Magi who visited Christ: Caspar, Melchior, and **Balthazar.** So for instance, in 2024, the inscription is 20+C+M+B+24. Blessed chalk will be available today in the Narthex of the church, and for a couple of Sundays following.

More and More Beautiful

Every few years, the Bishop makes a visit to our parish and asks to meet with the Parish Council and the Finance Council members. It is a way for him to tell us personally what he wants the Parish to focus on going forward; what his hopes and expectations are for our community. The last time we met with the Bishop in this way, Bishop Lopes commended us on our beautiful work in the Sanctuary: the rood beam and its statues and decorations, the reredos and altar, the side shrines and all the other beautiful things we had done. His final comment was, "Keep making things more and more beautiful."

We as a staff, with the wonderful cooperation of the Parish Council, have taken his words to heart. We have painted, inside and out. We have stained floors. We have rehabbed bathrooms.

But the phrase "more and more beautiful" kept creeping into our discussions. The obvious thing left in the Church itself were the pews. The pews we currently have were purchased used and have seen their share of hard use. Much of the upholstery was damaged or loose and the fabric difficult to replicate and replace. Covid cleaning with harsh chemicals and water leaks had done our finishes no favors. The kneelers have some serious problems.

We started out thinking we would just reupholster and repair the pews. But bids for that were more expensive than anticipated. It led us to think, "What if we just purchased NEW?"

We contacted several pew manufacturers to obtain estimates and time frames and were pleased by the numbers. It made sense. We have the money on hand to pay for the work. It was time to bring the beauty in the Sanctuary out into the Nave.

We selected Imperial Woodworks out of Waco, Texas to do the work for us. They are relatively local and were highly responsive to our needs and wants. We signed a contract with them to replace our pews and they have been building them at their shop.

The installation of those new pews will begin on Monday, January 15 at 8:00 a.m. By the end of Wednesday, the 17th, the process will be finished, and we will have beautiful new pews that should last for many, many years.

But what this means is we will need a crew of people to remove the old pews on the afternoon of Sunday, January 14th. They must be out of the building that afternoon. We have done this once before, so it should only take a few hours to remove them. Please come and help!

What will happen to the old pews? Unfortunately, no one wants our old ones. They are not antiques or expensive enough for a church restoration company to want them. They are too bulky for storage "just in case someone needs them" at some unknown future date. So, if you want one (or 2 or 28!) you may have them free of charge. **BUT** you must be willing to move them yourselves on that Sunday afternoon. We do not have the space or place to store them for you.

We are excited about this next step in the "more and more beautiful" campaign. Come help us make that a reality!
