WHO WE ARE

Whether you're from down the street or from out of town, we're glad you're here. We consider St. Eloi to be a home: a home for saints and for sinners, a home for those who have questions about the Faith and for those searching for more, a home for seasoned Catholics as well as those entering a Catholic Church for the very first time. Regardless of where you are on the journey of what brought you here, we have a place for you. *Welcome Home.*

Speak to me Lord...

FOCUS: What do we do with the leftovers?

Time and again, Jesus made clear that his mission on earth was to do his Father's will. In his public ministry, he expressed the Father's love in various ways—he healed the sick, fed the hungry, and even raised people from the dead. He showed great affinity for the lowly and the outcast; he fought injustice with compassion and strength. He was not sent to be a political leader; he was the promised Messiah who came to save us from our sins.

The miracle in today's Gospel is well known. (Mark and Matthew have two accounts of a multiplication of loaves and fishes; John and Luke have one.) Large crowds were following Jesus because he had been curing the sick. Jesus saw that they were hungry. After asking his disciples where they could *buy enough food for them to eat*, Andrew told him about a boy who had *five barley loaves and two fish*. Jesus took the food, gave thanks, and distributed it. Amazingly, Jesus fed about five thousand men (and uncounted women and children).

After satisfying the human needs of his hungry followers, Jesus instructs his disciples to *gather the fragments left over, so that nothing will be wasted*, and they collect *twelve wicker baskets* full. As with Elisha in today's Old Testament reading, *there was some left over*. Jesus' miracle prefigured the superabundance of the Eucharist (CCC 1335). For from the shores of the Sea of Galilee, Jesus would travel to Jerusalem, and there, he would institute the Eucharist the night before he died—a perpetual memorial of his sacrifice.

Two thousand years later, we, too, gather to listen to Jesus and to implore him with our needs. We, too, watch as the priest takes the bread, gives thanks, and distributes it to us—another unworthy and hungry crowd. We feast at the Lord's table. We encounter Jesus—the bread of life—under simple forms of bread and wine.

We are thus nourished by Word and sacrament. He freely gives us all we need. And yet, there is some left over—more grace, more gifts, more wisdom. What do we do with the leftovers? Perhaps the answer lies in today's second reading. Saint Paul tells the Ephesians to *live in a manner worthy of the call you have received, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another through love, striving to preserve the unity of the spirit through the bond of peace*. This is a job description for Christians! We have the obligation to use the gift of the Eucharist in the service of others. We must join with other Christians, with people of all faiths or no faith, to make the world better, to strive for unity and peace. Jesus knew his mission—to share the Father's love.

That's our mission too.

Jesus said, "Have the people recline." Now there was a great deal of grass in that place. So the men reclined, about five thousand in number. Then Jesus took the loaves, gave thanks, and distributed them to those who were reclining, and also as much of the fish as they wanted. When they had had their fill, he said to his disciples, "Gather the fragments left over, so that nothing will be wasted." So they collected them, and filled twelve wicker baskets with fragments from the five barley loaves that had been more than they could eat. When the people saw the sign he had done, they said, "This is truly the Prophet, the one who is to come into the world." Since Jesus knew that they were going to come and carry him off to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain alone.

FAMILY HOME PRAYER ALTAR

A home altar should be considered a staple feature in every Catholic home. The home altar is meant to serve as a central place for prayer and religious practice in a Catholic home. Most of us have designated places to eat, sleep, work, exercise, and play at home—why not have a designated, special place to pray, both individually and together as a family in the comfort of our own homes.

Here's an easy how-to for helping you set up your own home altar or prayer space:

Find a spot in the home for your prayer space or altar, easily accessible to everyone. Ours is in the hall, in between our bedrooms. We have our family bible, Crucifix, holy water, blessed oil, and a rosary on it. As far as surfaces go, you can use a shelf, desk, end table, mantle, nook... pretty much anything. You can also use a tablecloth, or linens on the altar to dress it up.

Collect religious items from around your home to put on the altar. You may also want to consider investing in some of these items if you don't already have them; they make great family gifts on special feast days! You can make the altar as simple or elaborate as you want it to be.

Here are some things you can put in your prayer space or on your altar:

Crucifix

Bible (with or without a stand)

Prayer books, prayer cards, a Missal, or a Catholic book of blessings and prayers

Catholic icons, Statues of your favorite Saints

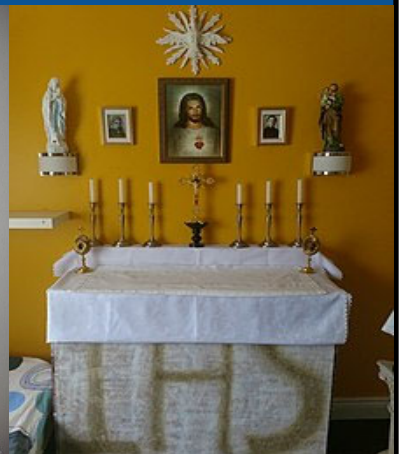
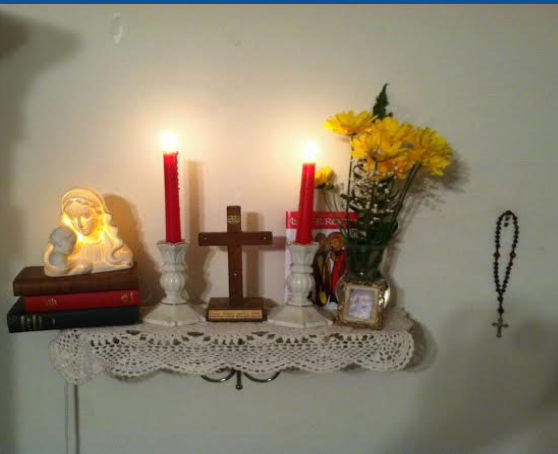
Art work of Jesus, Mary, Joseph and the saints; to hang on the wall above the altar

Rosary, Blessed Candles, Holy Water, Blessed salt, Blessed oil

Seasonal items like pictures of the Stations of the Cross during Lent, Advent wreath or Advent candles, a manger scene during Christmas, a Paschal candle or lamb during Easter, Baptismal candles, palm branches from Palm Sunday, pictures of saints on their feast days, etc...

It is very important to have your home and altar or prayer space blessed. If you haven't had your house blessed, have a deacon or priest come bless your whole home, including the altar or prayer space.

Pray around your home altar! Take time during the day to pray around the home altar. Every day, try to find time to light candles, read from the bible, offer prayers of thanksgiving and intercession, pray a decade of the Rosary or a chaplet, learn about a saint or a feast day. Grow in your Faith! Try to take little moments throughout the day to look at the altar or prayer space and offer a quick prayer and turn your mind and heart to Jesus.

ALL CERTIFICATES EXPIRED ON JUNE 30, 2021 so it is now time to renew your training for another 3 years. Everything will be done online. **ALL MINISTERS ARE REQUIRED TO TAKE THE TRAINING—LECTORS, COMMENTATORS, MUSICIANS, ETC...**

- 1) Go to <https://safeandsacred-htdiocese.org>
- 2) Use your existing account—Do not create a new one. If needed, click on “Forgotten User Name or Password”.
- 3) Click on new account only if you are new to volunteering and have never had the training.
- 4) You will be prompted to begin the Background Check when logged in. (The screen will say, “Welcome! Are you ready to begin the background check process?” Choose Continue)

- 6) Training Course Steps:
 - A) Update account profile, B) Nationwide Background Check, C) References, D) Self-reporting questionnaire, E) Safe Environment Training Course, F) Code of Professional Conduct, G) Certificate issued after ALL steps are completed.

CHANGE IN CEMETERY BURIAL POLICY

The following is from a letter from the Office of Cemeteries: "Effective immediately, **a title must be presented, in person, to your cemetery office before a burial can take place. If the family cannot access the title, they must sign an affidavit declaring the deceased's right to be buried (heirship) or the guarantee that all living heirs agree to the burial of the non-heir. The affidavit will have to be notarized.** We understand that this may be an inconvenience to some families, but we must adhere to the Louisiana Laws."

We see many families who do not know where their titles is or have lost it. Please make sure your loved ones have access to your title to alleviate any problems at burial time.
