The new Directory for Catechesis By Bryan Reising

This will be a series to look at the new Directory for Catechesis. We will read, discover, and learn about the directives the Church gives us regarding evangelization and catechesis within our parishes and diocese.

Part Three – Catechesis in Particular Churches, Chapter Ten Catechesis in the Face of Contemporary Cultural Scenarios. In the first section, Catechesis in Situations of Pluralism and Complexity, it mentions several possible situations within our culture. Before we get into those situations, this chapter lays the groundwork. It recognizes the complexities of society, which includes a blending of various realities: progress of understanding and cultural tendencies, the globalization of models of life and influences of economic-political systems, ethnic and religious identities, old and new social questions, and so on. It also mentions the

importance of synodality, of journeying together as a Church and having more participation in its evangelizing mission.

The Urban Context

It describes that other institutions within an urban population, that are other than Christian, often generate cultural models with new language, symbols, messages, and paradigms, much of which is in contrast to the Gospel. However, the church is not absent from urban life and still can be important in its impact and influence. Interaction with urban cultures requires an understanding of these cultures so that the kerygmatic proclamation can be effective and so that catechetical formation and creating a community of communities can reach out to all circles of influence.

The Rural Context

It recognizes the land, the care of animals and crops, and the change of seasons that can remind us of the divine providence of our God. They all influence how we approach faith, the Liturgical year, and the care for God's creation.

Traditional Local Cultures

The Church understands that the downfall of globalization is the loss of local cultural traditions. "The Church has always reiterated the need to pay special attention to local specificity and cultural diversity." Regarding catechesis and indigenous people, special care is to be taken, such as to strive to get to know the language, ceremonies, stories, customs, and showing great respect.

Popular Piety

It describes popular piety as "a spirituality incarnated in the culture of the lowly." It is unique, but does not compromise the Catholic faith, but enhances it for a local situation. It celebrates the central mysteries of our faith, namely the life of Jesus, but also venerates Mary, the Mother of God, local saints, and it focuses on sacramentals like the rosary, the Divine Mercy chaplet, novenas, processions, visit to shrines, and pilgrimages. Regarding catechesis, it recommends that it stay away from being a superstition and focus as a prayer experience and to keep a Christocentric instrument of faith.

In the second section, Catechesis in the Context of Ecumenism and Religious Pluralism, it looks at the reality of many places in the world where there are many faith traditions living side by side.

Catechesis in the Ecumenical Context

Here it talks about how the Church by its very nature is dialogical - meaning, the very word, catholic, means universal, and we must engage in dialogue with other Christians, other faith traditions, other new movements and philosophies. Regarding ecumenism, this means we are relationship with other Christians. We must dialogue to understand the things we have in common, understand the differences, pray together, and help to build a more just and peaceful society. Regarding catechesis, we realize that some of the families in our parishes are made up of a Catholic and another Christian tradition. With this in mind, we must hold fast to the areas mentioned above without watering down the essentials of our doctrine.

Catechesis in Relation to Judaism

Special attention is given to Judaism, since this is our roots. Catechesis must take into account this reality, that Jesus himself was Jewish and immersed himself in that faith tradition and culture. It must take into account that the Old Testament is important because it unfolds the story of salvation, and that story anchors Christianity. Regarding the New Testament and Judaism, catechesis helps us to understand that revealed Word and Jesus are the fulfillment of the Law and the Prophets, not a replacement of them.

Catechesis in the Context of Other Religions

Regarding catechesis and other faith traditions, Catholics must receive a strong formation in the Catholic faith plus a better understanding of the other faiths, which exist within their communities. This also leads to discernment of "recognizing and appreciating the seeds of the Word that are present" in other faiths, such as the Golden Rule can be found in many faith traditions. Dialogue is necessary, and at times, there may be opportunities to proclaim the faith and invite them to our faith, yet still respecting religious liberty.

Catechesis in the Context of New Religious Movements Regarding evangelization and catechesis with those involved with these new movements, we need to come to an understanding of their beliefs and background. Then, we as a Church must also stand out as a community of love, witnessing our faith through our attitudes and actions. With these, the kerygma of Jesus can be presented in a bold, yet respectful way. When people of these new movements ask further questions, we can be ready to answer them with Sacred Scripture and Sacred Tradition plus faith and reason. We can then invite them to encounter the rituals, symbols, gestures,

and ceremonies of our liturgical tradition and other prayer experiences. Here they can encounter the living God as these experiences do touch the human heart.

We will continue our journey into this directory in the months to come. In February, we will continue this series by looking at chapter ten, "Catechesis in the Face of Contemporary Cultural Scenarios," section three. 
COVID-19



Safe Environment

In the near future, we will be moving our background check process fully online with Virtus, our Safe Environment vendor. In the meantime, in-person PGC training sessions remain suspended, and the current levels of training are detailed below.

There are currently three levels of training for adults.

- 1. Initial Online Training (5-year expiration)
- 2. Initial Online Recertification (5-year expiration)
- 3. Keeping the Promise Alive (second recertification)

For people who need to complete the initial training or the initial recertification, direct them to

and make sure they choose the correct menu button; either "Protecting God's Children Initial Training" or "Virtus Recertification." The button for "Virtus Recertification" only applies to the initial online recertification training. It <u>does not</u> apply to Keeping the Promise Alive (KPA) training. For those who need to complete KPA, they should receive an email sent to the email address used to create their Virtus Account once KPA recertification is necessary.

Please note: the procedure described above only applies to those who do not currently have a Virtus account. If you need the initial recertification and you already have a Virtus account, the link to recertify will be sent directly to your email.
