

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


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Hello CRHP/Welcome Sisters/ and all Women of the Parish

Bishop Johnson originally brought the 33 days to Morning Glory, by Fr Michael Gaitley to our diocese.

Now Bishop Rice has invited all women of the diocese to make a total consecration to Jesus through Mary. If you have never done this before, it is a beautiful faith journey! Using the book, 33 Days to Morning Glory, by Fr. Michael Gaitley, we will read daily reflections and prayers from saints for 33 days, in preparation for making the prayer of consecration.



The reflections are short and can be done at home whenever it is convenient for you. We would begin reading the book on November 6 and make the final prayer of consecration on Monday, December 9 which is the designated day for the Feast of the Immaculate Conception this year (moved because Dec. 8 is a Sunday). Those who would like to gather to share about their journey each week (optional), may join us at Our Lady of the Lake on Saturday mornings from 9:00-10:30am.

The meeting dates are: **November 9, 16, 23 (no mtg. Nov. 30 due to Thanksgiving Holiday), and Dec. 7**. *If you have already made a Marian consecration, you can join this journey to renew your consecration - we gain new insights each time! The diocese has purchased, at a bulk rate discount, the newly revised book which includes a study and retreat guide. The cost is \$13.95 each.

For now, I need to know:

- 1. Who will join the preparation for consecration?
- 2. Who would like to meet on Saturdays (even if you have to miss a meeting, you can join the group)?
- 3. Who would like to purchase a book? I will reserve them at the diocese and bring some to our parish.

The Importance of Eucharistic Adoration



The importance of Eucharistic Adoration is shown in the fact that the Church has a ritual that regulates it: the Rite of Eucharistic Exposition and Benediction. This is an extension of the adoration of the Blessed Sacrament which occurs in every Mass:

"Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb."

Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament flows from the sacrifice of the Mass and serves to deepen our hunger for Communion with Christ and the rest of the Church. The Rite concludes with the ordained minister blessing the faithful with the Blessed Sacrament.(USCCB)



Our Missionary Call to be Faithful and Vigilant Stewards

The month of October is a special time of remembrance for me. Our daughter celebrates a birthday as well as our youngest grandson. October 22 is my deceased father's birthday and the day my mother passed on to eternal life, and Pope St. John Paul II's feast day. This past week, my spiritual reading referenced St. John Paul's Apostolic letters, "Christifdeles Laici – The Vocation and the Mission of the Lay Faithful in the Church and in the World." This letter, written in December 1988 to all Catholics, is a compilation of the numerous topics covered by the Synod of Bishops meeting in 1987.

In this letter, St. John Paul writes...

That the universal call to holiness is closely linked to the universal call to mission. Every member of the faithful is called to holiness and to mission. This was the earnest desire of the Second Vatican Council, which hoped to be able "to enlighten all people with the brightness of Christ, which gleams over the face of the Church, by preaching the Gospel to every creature." The Church's missionary spirituality is a journey toward holiness...

Dear brothers and sisters: let us remember the missionary enthusiasm of the first Christian communities. Despite the limited means of travel and communication in those times, the proclamation of the Gospel quickly reached the ends of the earth. And this was the religion of a man who had died on a cross... Underlying this missionary dynamism was the holiness of the first Christians and the first communities.... You must be like the first Christians and radiate enthusiasm and courage, in generous devotion to God and neighbor. In a word, you must set yourselves on the path of holiness. Only thus can you be a sign of God in the world....

Today, as never before, the Church has the opportunity of bringing the Gospel, by witness and word, to all people and nations. I see the dawning of a new missionary age, which will become a radiant day bearing an abundant harvest, if all Christians…respond with generosity and holiness to the calls and challenges of our time.

Like the apostles after Christ's Ascension, the Church must gather in the Upper Room together with Mary, the Mother of Jesus (Acts 1:14), in order to pray for the Spirit and to gain strength and courage to carry out the missionary mandate. We too, like the apostles, need to be transformed and guided by the Spirit.... Mary is the model of that maternal love that should inspire all who cooperate in the Church's apostolic mission for the rebirth of humanity. Therefore, strengthened by the presence of Christ, the Church journeys through time toward the consummation of the ages and goes to meet the Lord who comes.

When I reflect on the emphasis of this section of St. John Paul's letter, it not only provides me a "mission" but it also provides me a clearer purpose to our universal call to bring others to Christ.

Next week, after our national election, Wednesday morning, November 5, half of Americans will be happy, and half will be disappointed. I recall Bishop Rice's comments from the recent clergy gathering – "The next day we begin our day with prayer and Holy Mass. The world goes on. Our mission continues to serve the people of God."

Let us all continue to give tangible witness of the Gospel of Jesus Christ to our neighbors and to all nations - to strengthen the presence of Christ in our world.

Liking Versus Loving

never met a man I didn't like." Will Rogers said that. I can believe he said it, but I have a more difficult time believing he meant it. I don't think he lied. I just find it hard to believe there could be a person who never disliked anyone.

Loving is something different, although there are many people who talk as if liking and loving are interchangeable. They love ice cream or country music, and they like their friends. One can love, that is, behave in a loving manner, without positive feelings. You couldn't say that about liking, but about loving you can. Some folks say one of the reasons you should love others and do good for people is because of the good feeling you get when you help someone. The problem

with this is that when you no longer get a good feeling, you stop doing the good things. But as disciples of Jesus, love we must. It's different than liking.

It seems to me the most difficult people to love today are the anonymous souls, the people we don't know—the immigrant coming to our land, the person of another religion who prays differently, or those living a lifestyle foreign to us. Jesus didn't have a problem with loving people like them. •

Who has loved you and who do you find most difficult to love?

Dear Padre,

Do saints ever smile? That question comes to me every year on the feast of All Saints (November 1) as I look at the pictures and statues in church. The faces are so somber and serious. What are the saints really like?

Artists through the centuries may have portrayed sanctity in very subdued tones. The saints, however, and their biographers tell a different story. The holy men and women who make up the communion of saints are an incredibly fascinating array of diverse personalities. The feast of All Saints celebrates our universal call to holiness. Our

challenge is to imitate the characteristics these unique individuals have in common.

Saint Irenaeus (125–202) said that the glory of God is the human fully alive which reflects Jesus' own words, "I came so that they may have life; and have it more abundantly" (John 10:10). Saints enjoy life! The nearsighted St. Alphonsus Liguori (1696–1787), founder of the Redemptorists, sat in the back row of the Naples theater with his glasses off so he could enjoy the music he loved without the distraction of the half-naked chorus line. Saint Teresa of Ávila (1515–1582), caught devouring partridge in the convent kitchen, said, "When I pray, I pray; when I eat partridge, I eat partridge!" Saint Joan of Arc (1412–1431) loved horses, and St. Charles Borromeo (1538–1584) loved chess. Indeed, saints do smile. They even laugh.

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
