Our Lady of the Lake is committed to helping those in our community who find themselves in difficult situations. This includes our own parishioners and those in our surrounding community through the helping agencies in our area. Outreach ministries that are active in our parish include Our Lady Cares, Give Five and "Father's Left Pocket".

Our Lady Cares

was initially established on Ash Wednesday 2010 in an effort to help organizations that 'help the least of these.' We currently support several area agencies on a regular basis: Christian Action Ministries, Elevate Branson, Free Medical Clinic of the Ozarks, House of Hope and Salvation Army with a monthly gift and Options Pregnancy Center with a gift semi-annually. We also support a number of other area helping agencies with financial support and offering use of our facilities for special events at not cost. Funds for Our Lady Cares primarily come from the special collection for outreach on the third Sunday of each month.



Give Five

is a program seeking to connect retired individuals with volunteer possibilities in the various helping agencies in our area. Education is provided to assist in choosing a volunteer position as well as understanding the needs in our area and how each agency helps the community. Give Five is supported by a grant from the Senior Age Area Agency on Aging. Expenses incurred to provide Give Five educational experiences are offset by the grant. Parish Outreach ministry members (including parish staff) assist in providing the training for Give Five. The compensation that these individuals receive is redirected to Our Lady Cares to go back into the community outreach programs.

"Father's Left Pocket"

Many of you may have heard of "Father's Left Pocket". Last summer, our pastor, Father J, began a special appeal to help the working poor in Branson, specifically to assist with housing projects through Elevate Branson. Nearly every week a request is made to our congregation, both parishioners and parishioners-for-a-day, to help with the needs of the working poor in our area. "Father's Left Pocket" is for this purpose. Elevate Branson has two projects that Our Lady of the Lake has committed to helping fund.

- 1. The purchase and renovation of the hotel adjacent to Elevate Branson's property into suitable housing for families who are currently living in the "weekly rentals" in Branson.
- 2. Cost of one Tiny House to provide housing for one couple currently living in "weekly rentals" in Branson.

Both of these projects are a helping hand and a step-up to a better living situation. It is especially important to Our Lady of the Lake to assist in these projects to help provide a safer living environment (especially for the children) and to alleviate some of the housing shortages in our area.

This is a recap of our Outreach endeavors for the most recent fiscal year, July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2025.

The Dormition of the Virgin Mary: Did she die or was she merely asleep?

During that same trip to the Holy Land in June 2023, I visited the Basilica of the Dormition, where we were told the Blessed Virgin Mary died. There is also a Catholic theory that she didn't die but was only asleep. Whether she died or simply fell asleep prior to being assumed into Heaven is an open question. In the Latin Catholic Church tradition says Mary did die; in the Eastern Catholic Churches tradition has said she fell asleep and did not die. Either way, we have no solid historical evidence to prove a position.

In 1950 Pope Pius XII solemnly defined the dogma of the Assumption. He said, "the Immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory." That seems to leave open the question of whether Mary died first. Some theologians feel that since death is a consequence of sin, Mary would not have had to die. But others say that, since Jesus himself chose to die, wouldn't it be fitting for his mother to have shared the same fate?

The first full stories of Mary's end-of-life narrative appear not in the canonical Bible but in apocryphal texts from the 4th to 6th centuries, often called Transitus Mariae --"Passing of Mary". These include Greek, Syriac, Coptic, and Latin versions, each with variations. The common storyline is that Mary is told by an angel that her time has come, the apostles are gathered to her bedside (often miraculously transported), she "falls asleep," Christ receives her soul, and her body is placed in a tomb which is later found empty. Some versions are explicit about her death before assumption; others are vague. In other words, we really have no factual evidence.

Why "Dormition" Instead of "Death"?

In the ancient Christian world, "sleep" (koimēsis in Greek) was a common euphemism for the death of the righteous. For example, Jesus says of Jairus's daughter, "She is not dead but sleeping" (Mark 5:39); Paul writes of those who "have fallen asleep in Christ" (1 Thess. 4:14). The term softened the idea of death and emphasized hope in resurrection. For Mary, "sleep" also underscored that she died without corruption, in peace, and was taken to heaven.

It was around the 6th century that the Dormition feast was widely celebrated in Jerusalem and spread to the Byzantine Empire. And by the 8th century, St. John of Damascus preached on the Dormition. It was his theological explanation that became the standard within the Church: 'Mary died like her Son, but her body did not see decay; soon after, she was bodily assumed.'

Over time Western devotion shifted away from the Dormition toward the Assumption - emphasizing the glorification of Mary's body and soul in heaven. When Pope Pius XII defined the Assumption in 1950 (Munificentissimus Deus), he purposely left open the question of whether Mary died first.

Official Catholic teaching doesn't define it, but the vast majority of saints, theologians, and liturgy writers assumed she did die and was assumed into heaven. No matter what actually transpired so long ago, we know that Our Blessed Mother was taken into heaven body and soul after passing from this life.

"By her complete adherence to the Father's will, to his Son's redemptive work, and to every prompting of the Holy Spirit, the Virgin Mary is the Church's model of faith and charity." CCC 987



Since the first burial in March of 1873*, St. Mary's Cemetery and, later, Resurrection **Cemetery** have served the parishes of Springfield. Their message is that of hope in the sure knowledge of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection—and His promise to us of eternal life in Him.

The Springfield Catholic Cemeteries Board, which oversees both cemeteries, is composed of one pastor and a lay member from each parish. Their stewardship includes responsible care of the grounds and fixtures and maintaining a sacred space that fosters consolation, prayer, dignity, hope, and peace.

The board also works in concert with Church officials and others to ensure judicious application of the time, talents, and treasure of contributors. Financial support comes from parish assessments, private donations, sales from lots and niches, plus burial/ inurnment-related fees.

As before, the Catholic Cemeteries plans for future growth. A second columbarium is such a future addition to Resurrection Cemetery. Again, our Catholic community deserves the same level of care for those whom we honor and for those who need a prayerful space for God's hope, consolation, and peace.

Where I Stand


ne day, as I was walking in a local nature preserve, I came across what someone had written in the sand: "It's time to take a stand."

Though the person never suggested what we should take a stand on, all of us take stands in life. In many ways, those stands define our lives: Republican or Democrat, pro-life or pro-choice, NRA and guns, save the whales, vax or anti-vax, ecology. As we all know so well, where we stand on any given issue can become divisive among friends and even family.

The Scriptures this weekend tell of the prophet Jeremiah, who took a stand of faith against the king who trusted in military arms rather than in God. The Letter to the Hebrews mentions an Old Testament "cloud of witnesses" who placed faith in God without knowing where that would take them. And, Jesus himself recognizes that those who place their faith in him and the vision of life he proclaimed would find themselves in conflict with others. For every person who professes faith in Jesus Christ, the question becomes how this faith affects all the other stands we take. To "keep our eyes fixed on Jesus" influences the lifestyle we choose, how we spend our time and our money, who our friends are, and even who we vote for. At some point, faith insists we take a stand.



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Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

During my baseball career, my best coach often said, "You shouldn't be worried if I yell at you. Be worried if I don't. If I stop pushing you, it means I don't think you have any more potential." He demanded a lot, and I knew it meant he saw that I could be something special on the baseball field.

Jesus says some demanding words to us this week.

"Do you think I have come to establish peace on the earth?" he asks, "No, tell you, but rather division"

(Luke 12:51). He wants you and me-in fact, all the earth-to participate in the luminous glory of God. That's why he speaks of himself as a divine arsonist. Divine fire is like a good coach: it demands the removal of all that obstructs the achievement of the lofty goal.

How is your life demanding right now? That inconvenient family situation, the unfair boss at work, the kids who reject their parents' wishes, the nagging health issue? Maybe things would be more peaceful devoid of these seemingly arbitrary difficulties. Mini Reflection: If we let Christ set fire to our lives, what would that fire burn away? What dead and festering undergrowth in our souls would be consumed by the flames? What promise of future holiness would sprout from beneath the ashes?

The Fire

This past week I have been reading a biography of St. Francis of Assisi. I admit I didn't know much about Francis going into the book, but I always had this image of him as a hippie — an easygoing nature-lover who sang about peace and let animals climb on him.

I'm not sure where that caricature of Francis came from, but since I've been reading this book I've come to see that it's not true at all. He was a lover of nature, yes. A poet who sang of God's peace, yes. And I'm sure he let a few animals climb on him from time to time (he did live in a hut in the woods).

But St. Francis of Assisi wasn't the lost fourth member of Peter, Paul and Mary. He was a man on fire. He was a man burning.

Francis walked around barefoot and slept on the ground. He abandoned a life of wealth to embrace the material poverty that Christ experienced. He embarrassed his family and they disowned him. When his father would encounter Francis in the streets of Assisi, he would curse him.

Sometimes we get this idea that Christianity is a comfortable, cozy thing. We give our lives to Christ, and we expect to feel instantly satisfied, happy, safe and warm. But the saints knew better.

The saints knew that Christ had not come to wrap us in a warm blanket. Christ has come to set us on fire. And though fire is often seen as a sign of death and destruction, it is also the precursor of new life.

Think of a field of native plants and how it benefits so richly from a controlled burn — an action that clears away detritus and releases nutrients back into the soil.

Why do we have a feast for the Queenship of Mary?

Answer:

For many of us, the language of kings and queens may seem like they belong to history or a medieval movie. Royalty have absolute authority over a kingdom and their subjects, a concept that is foreign to many of us today. While Jesus doesn't rule a political kingdom, we honor and recognize him as the King of Kings, Lord of Heaven and Earth. To God alone belongs absolute authority over all of existence.

We may think of queens as the spouse of the king, but there is another key relationship: the king's mother. In Biblical history, we see instances where the mother of the king is given due as a queen herself, complete with a throne! Mary's guiding influence over her Son is seen most notably in the Wedding Feast at Cana. Mary is not Queen on her own merit. She is "full of grace" and "blessed" in "all ages" because of the reign of her Son.
