Special Collection for the People of Gaza

Bishop Rice has sent a request to all of the parishes in the Diocese of Springfield-Cape Girardeau seeking financial aid and prayer for the people of Gaza. The following is an excerpt from Bishop Rice's letter.

"Pope Leo XIV and Catholic ambassadors around the world have highlighted with great concern the unfolding humanitarian crisis and mass starvation in Gaza, with the pope calling the situation "dire".

At the request of Archbishop Timothy P. Broglio, president of the USCCB, I am joining bishops across the United States in asking parishioners to participate in a second collection for emergency humanitarian aid for the starving people of Gaza, a crisis that has reached catastrophic levels. There is terrible suffering of Christians and other innocent victims of violence in Gaza who are struggling to survive, to protect their children, and to live humanely in tragic circumstances.

All funds from the special collection will be used by Catholic Relief Services, which is on site in Gaza and partnering with local Church entities to provide food, shelter, financial assistance, hygiene supplies and trauma assistance; and the Catholic Near East Welfare Association, which is providing "vital emergency humanitarian relief and medical care for the sick, malnourished, and wounded."

A special collection will be taken in support of this request at all Masses Saturday, August 30 and Sunday, August 31.

If you will not be at the Masses next weekend, donations for Gaza can be dropped off at or mailed to the parish office. Simply mark your donation "Gaza" so that we can apply your gift properly. All forms of electronic giving are also available for this purpose. Again, indicate that your gift is for Gaza.

Thank you for your generosity and your prayers for the people of Gaza.



Hey Deacon!

What is "Catholic Guilt" and is it good or bad?

Have you ever felt bad for falling short in doing the "right thing"? Have you shared this concern with a friend only to tell you that you have "Catholic Guilt"? What is Catholic Guilt? Why is it labeled Catholic?

The phrase Catholic Guilt was coined in reference to the understanding that Catholics are held to follow a lot of rules. Consequently, when a person breaks one of those rules they commit "sin" which separates us from God. This "sin" is strongly emphasized regarding morality in the Catholic Church, which seems to be emphasized more than all the good we do.

While all of this is true about the Catholic faith, there is more to the complete context of Catholic Guilt. I think that if properly understood, people will find that Catholic Guilt is a necessity not only in our faith life but in our everyday actions as well.

The root of Catholic Guilt is linked to moral development, or how we train ourselves to make either good or bad decisions. As we grew up our parents taught us the difference between right and wrong, and through our faith we have guiding principles like the 10 Commandments and the Beatitudes which help us to make right decisions as well. But God also gave us the gift of free will and conscience. Guilt is a feeling that flows from our conscience. Guilt is that feeling of heaviness in the pit of our stomach that lets us know there is something wrong.

There is a tendency to view guilt as a negative feeling. But I argue that guilt can also be a gift. If our conscience is properly formed, meaning that we have trained our conscience to know the difference between right and wrong, then our conscience will inherently know when we have committed a wrong action. Nobody is perfect, so being in touch with your conscience and understanding why you are feeling guilty for a decision becomes important.

The beauty of Catholic guilt lies in its role as a spiritual tool that guides individuals towards introspection, repentance, and a closer relationship with God. It is a universal human experience that reflects our awareness of sin and encourages us to correct our actions. In the Catholic context, guilt is not merely a negative feeling but a gift that prompts us to seek forgiveness and healing through the sacrament of Reconciliation. This sacrament offers both healing and peace from God, allowing us to be forgiven no matter what we have done.

This scripture verse from Philippians reminds us that our God is a compassionate and understanding God and we should turn to Him when faced with anxiety.

"Have no anxiety at all, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God. Then the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus." -- Phil 4:6-7

The stereotype of Catholic Guilt needs to be understood in the context of our conscience in our moral development and understanding of why we are feeling guilty in the first place. When I am confronted with a moral decision, I asked myself will my choice bring me closer to God or further away from God. This helps me in making the right choice.

The next time you feel that Catholic Guilt, pray for clarity and thank God for the gentle reminder. And if it is of grave matter, seek out the sacrament of Reconciliation and receive God's healing forgiveness.

- The training, which includes "Protecting God's Children" and "Mandated and Ethical Reporting", are accessible through their VIRTUS account and are also completed online.



What is Spiritual Direction?



Spiritual Direction provides special help in discerning our path of holiness. Our Christian life is a journey to become closer to God.

In other words, spiritual direction helps us discern and pursue our unique callings from the Holy Spirit at each stage of our life. It involves three parties: the one receiving spiritual direction, the one giving spiritual direction, and, of course, the Holy Spirit.

It usually entails meeting up with a spiritual director for an hour roughly once a month

In spiritual direction, we consider how the Lord is speaking to us and what He is saying. The role of the spiritual director isn't to tell us what to do or not do. Rather, through the spiritual director's expertise and training, they help us discern how the Lord is working in our lives.

Spiritual direction invites us to confront and respond to questions prompted by the Holy Spirit. What does God want me to do or not do?


For someone beginning the spiritual journey, spiritual direction can offer us insight into the fundamentals of prayer and what it means to live a sacramental and communal life of faith.

For those a little more advanced, spiritual direction can deepen our life of prayer and help us discern how we're being called to use our gifts to serve God and His Church.





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Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Once I was invited to a group meeting with Pope Francis. Entering the room, I paused, eyeing the seats next to the Pope's fancy chair. Someone saw my paralysis and invited me to sit in the seat farthest from what I wanted. Hiding my disappointment, I sat. We waited. To our surprise, an aid pointed out that those seats were still empty and invited me and another to have them. We calmly but gleefully strode across the room and sat. Pope Francis entered, and we enjoyed two hours of amazingly uplifting conversation.

Jesus says this week to us: "When you are invited, go and take the lowest place so that when the host comes to you he may say, 'My friend, move up to a higher position.' Then you will enjoy the esteem of your companions at the table" (Luke 14:10). This is not about how to score free seat upgrades. Rather, it is a wise pattern for the whole of life. It is how to live free from the anxiety of constantly grasping for status and recognition.

Jesus perfectly embodies his seat-taking advice. He eschews his glorious throne for the lowest: death on a cross, that lonely chair we all deserve. In his resurrection, he calls us up higher to his marvelous banquet seats. This week, perhaps we should look for opportunities to choose the lowest seat. We'll be pleasantly surprised when we do.

What Did You Expect?

Moms have a lot of jobs, and it's usually the case that none of them pay very well.

My work as a chef? Zero compensation, and my clientele are very rarely pleased with my efforts. My role as a teacher, a maid, a chauffeur, a therapist — same deal. Ironically, these jobs consume so much of my time that I am constricted in my work as a writer — the only sphere where I do actually garner any earnings.

It is so easy to grumble about all of this, and I do it all the time. Because despite the fact that I know better, I expect repayment for my good deeds. Deep in my soul, I expect it.

That's a huge problem.

In my defense, I don't think this is a very uncommon thing. I think, if we're being really honest, we all expect "payment" for being a good person. We want God to give us what we ask. We want people to treat us a certain way. We want our day to go smoothly. We expect these things as a matter of course; we feel entitled to them, and we become grumpy when we are denied them. I worked so hard. I gave so much. What was it all even for?

But what if we expected absolutely nothing?

When you hold a banquet, Jesus said, invite those who cannot return the favor. Give not just without the expectation of repayment, but without the possibility of it.

Think about that for a minute. What does that even *look* like — no possibility of payment?

I know what that looks like in my own life. It's giving more to the literal poor, yes, but it's also giving more — and more happily, more lovingly — when I cook and clean and drive and write and console. It's not lamenting that no one appreciates me — it's actually hoping no one does.

It's learning to love the lowest place at the table. Because in the lowest place, we are closest to God.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

Does chewing gum break the fast before Communion?

Answer:

If you look in Canon Law or in the Catechism, there is no mention of chewing gum. I guess it does not rate the attention of the universal church! The Church requires us to fast for one hour before we receive the Eucharist. Basically, we are to refrain from food and drink, not including water or medicine. There are also exceptions for people who are ill. Overall, the fast is intended for us to prepare ourselves to receive the Eucharist and in some small way to literally as well as spiritually hunger for what we are about to receive. Chewing gum, while not really food, does at least break the spirit of the fast. Besides that, it is a distraction and rude. What do you do with the gum when it is time to receive Communion? People have actually come to the altar chewing away, oblivious to what they were doing or Who they were receiving. At best, it is distracting and irreverent. At worst, it adds a barrier to giving our best to receiving God's best.
