

Welcome to First Grade Summer Reading is Reading for Fun! Reading Tips:

- If the text of the book is too difficult for your child to read independently, a great idea is to read to your child repeatedly. This will build confidence enough for the child to begin to read it with you or to join in on a repetitive part. After your child has learned or maybe even memorized the text, he/she could enjoy reading it to you and many others (praise this as reading). What fun this can be!
- Choose a specific time of day for you and your child, cuddle up in a special place and enjoy the book together. You as a reader are an excellent model as your child then sees reading as a part of everyday life. It will teach them to love reading and understand its importance.

Those Shoes by Maribeth Boelts All Jeremy wants is a pair of those shoes, the ones everyone at school seems to be wearing.
