Fundraising for Life. I know that as a council you are constantly inundated to participate in this or that program, and that there are only so many hours in a day and dollars in your treasury. Fortunately, with the latter, you can always increase it with a fundraiser! Hopefully, you are planning a Rose Sale or Baby Bottle Drive for May, or have already held one recently.

These programs are proven to be highly successful and can provide you with the funds to provide a home for a mother, support a pregnant woman in crisis, or help your local pregnancy care center. You can also improve the quality of life for many of our citizens by donating some of the money to our Alzheimer's Awareness and Deborah Hospital programs. Remember, every little bit counts and is very effective, as a donation of \$150 to Deborah or \$250 to Alzheimer's Awareness from each of 200 of our councils would allow us to make our goals for those programs! **Special Olympics.** Our fundraising this year for this program was spectacular, due to the efforts of John Gazis and his team! Last year, our Polar Penguins, with 47 participants, raised \$22,369.22. This year, with 58 participants, they raised \$32,401! This ranked them as the third highest team in fundraising out of over 300! In addition, our own Gary Seals personally raised \$6,500, representing a full

#### **AED Defibrillator Donated**

Pittstown, NJ, March 10: Cardiac events, such as AMI (Acute Myocardial Infarction) are almost always unexpected. They could even happen suddenly during a church service or function. To that point & to provide confidence in this life threatening situation, the St. Catherine of Sienna Knights of Columbus have provided the parish with an Automatic External Defibrillation (AED) unit. Using an AED in conjunction with Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) increases the chances of survival for someone in cardiac arrest.

In order to ensure that a trained responder is available at church functions, the Knights and the Ushers of the church are being trained in CPR and AED with the help of Hunterdon Medical Center. The parish has two locations, the church in Pittstown, and the parish center in Union Township. Both of these locations now have AED units.

#### Trenton Knights send Heroes Home

For the second year in a row, the Knights within the Diocese of Trenton through their generosity pulled together to make the Christmas holidays brighter and warmer this past December for some of our dedicated men and women serving their country in the Armed Forces.

Begun as a simple idea at an annual meeting of District Deputies in August 2013 pitched by State Warden, Jim Stoever, operation "Send a Hero Home for the Holidays" took wing and has surpassed the expectations of him and those men discussing it. Stoever explained that as a young boy growing up he recalled that on more than one occasion his family would bring an enlisted Navy Sailor home with them after attending Midnight Mass on Christmas Eve. His mom always made sure she had a small gift that they would receive as well as a place at the dinner table. He continued that the Trenton Diocese is home to 5 military installa-

tions and he is sure that there are many stationed at them who although had the "leave" time did not have the financial means to get home for Christmas. Knowing the Knights are masters of fundraising he pitched his plan.

An appeal was made to each Grand Knight and Faithful Navigator within the diocese asking each to contribute whatever amount they could afford and the monies would be pooled into a fund. Then, working with the Chaplain's Office of the bases enlisted candidates would be identified and round-trip fare would be provided to them to be home for Christmas. While donations were coming in legal issues were cleared working with the Judge Advocate General's office. In a month's time nearly \$9,000.00 was donated, Stoever said. "Through the generosity of the Knights we were able to reunite 11 'Heroes' with their families."

2013 was only the beginning though. The 2014 appeal saw over \$13,000.00 donated. Sixteen service men and women awoke Christmas morning in the peaceful surroundings of their homes and families. Equally important was the fact that their proud parents had their children home again. "That last point, about the parents, is what I first thought of when I awoke Christmas morning and that's what makes what we've been able to do so special and why I am so proud to be associated with not only the Knights of Columbus but with them in my diocese, the Diocese of Trenton." Asked what he thinks will happen in 2015 Stoever said "Who knows? For two years we haven't been able to penetrate the two Weapons Station Earle facilities although we've tried. Maybe this year they'll see our record and open the doors for us."

## **Polar Penguins**

On Saturday, February 21, 2015 the State Council team of Polar Bear Penguins converged on Seaside Heights to take part in the annual Polar Bear Plunge for the benefit of the New Jersey Special Olympics. While the weather was a balmy 28 degrees and the water temperature was a bit warmer at 34 degrees, over 6,000 dedicated individuals from all over the State plunged into the ocean to raise money for Special Olympics. The NJ State Council sponsored a team of individuals and raised over \$31,000 for Special Olympics. The team sent out the following note for all:

"On behalf of the NJ Knights of Columbus Polar Penguins, we would like to thank you for your support and the generous donations made to Special Olympics New Jersey on behalf of our team. Thanks to your generosity, our team donation ranks in third place in the State. As of January 21, 2015 the team raised \$31,401 with more to be added. Donations turned in on the day of the plunge could take 4 - 8 weeks to appear on our team ledger page, so a final report of donations will be forthcoming. A special "THANK YOU" to the Officers and brother knights from Council 8415 for showing true Fraternity by providing a light breakfast and wonderful lunch for those who took the plunge and those who were there to support the team! #### Polar Plunge

Once again this year, as they have for the past several, St. Philip the Apostle Council 11671 braved this frigid winter to take a dip in the Atlantic Ocean at Seaside Heights for the Special Olympics. As part of the Polar Penguins Team, Saturday, February 21<sup>st</sup> was a day to prove their true commitment to this worthy charity. Thankfully, the weather was not the single digits we've been experiencing so much lately but it still was only in the upper 20's; not exactly "beach" weather. With a team consisting of 58 members, the Penguins came in a respectable third raising in excess of \$31,000. Overall the Polar Plunge this year collected about \$1.6 million for the Special Olympics.

Special Olympics New Jersey is a not-for-profit organization that provides sports training and athletic competition to children and adults with intellectual disabilities. The organization is primarily funded through individual, corporate, civic and foundation dollars that make up more than 98% of its annual operating budget. All programs are free to registered athletes including insurance, facilities, equipment, uniforms, housing & meals for events, awards, sports, education and more. The annual Polar Plunge is one of their main fundraising efforts.

Several years ago, St. Joseph's Council **4969**, Toms River, decided to re-name the People with Intellectual Disabilities program to "God's Special People", not only because it is more "politically correct", but because not all of the children who benefit from the program are "intellectually disabled". The groups serviced by the God's Special People program all have special needs of one type or another, and Council **4969** takes pride in being able to support children and adults with a variety of special needs.

Traditionally, Council **4969** has been among the top councils in the State of New Jersey in collecting funds for the People with Intellectual Disabilities program. A "Breakfast at the Knights" was held at the Council home last October, where over one hundred guests enjoyed breakfast together, and a profit of \$720 was made for the program. More recently, in February, a "Blast from the Past" was held at the Council, resulting in a profit of over \$1,100. Throughout the year, collection containers have been placed at local diners and restaurants, giving the public an opportunity to contribute to the God's Special People program.

Groups receiving funds from Council 4969's collection efforts include Our Special Kids of Toms River, Team Randy, 21 Plus, Easter Seals, the Holy Innocents Society at St. Justin's Church, and the New Lisbon Developmental Center. In addition, social events are held at the Council for group home residents serviced by Easter Seals, including the annual picnic and Christmas party. After all, one of our most basic principles of the Knights of Columbus is Charity, and our membership goes a long way in support of the many projects and activities that are conducted on behalf of the program. A great deal of time and effort is devoted to the God's Special People program, not only by our Brother Knights, but from our Squires and members of our Ladies Auxiliary. In addition, two groups that we traditionally support each year are there along with us collecting at various locations, making this truly a "team effort".
