



From the Desk of Father Steve: Learning from the Great Saints of the Church



As we return to the public celebration of the Mass this weekend, and as we return to having the parish bulletin published once again after a two-week hiatus, I would like to begin something of a new series of bulletin articles. This one will be different in that I would like to allow some of the great spiritual masters in our Church's tradition to speak for themselves. I am convinced that one of the great needs in our modern Catholic life is a greater understanding of and appreciation for our own Church history. There are so many spiritual riches awaiting those who take the time and opportunity to seek them in the writings of the saints of the Church. And so I would like to share some of that richness with you, hoping that doing so will not only enrich your own faith, but will also impress

upon you the fact that as Catholics of today, we stand on the shoulders of giants, brothers and sisters of ours from previous decades and centuries who have left us such a rich patrimony of spiritual writings and teachings.

Today's reading is from one of the great saints from the 4th century: St. Cyril of Jerusalem. St. Cyril is a doctor of the Church, which means that he has been recognized by Church authority and tradition as having had a substantial impact on the intellectual and doctrinal heritage of the Church. Below is a snippet from an instruction that he gave on the workings of the Holy Spirit, a perfect meditation piece for today's great feast of Pentecost!

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From a catechetical instruction by Saint Cyril of Jerusalem, Bishop and Doctor of the Church (died 386 AD)

The water that I shall give him will become in him a fountain of living water, welling up into eternal life. This is a new kind of water, a living, leaping water, welling up for those who are worthy. But why did Christ call the grace of the Spirit water? Because all things are dependent on water; plants and animals have their origin in water. Water comes down from heaven as rain, and although it is always the same in itself, it produces many different effects, one in the palm tree, another in the vine, and so on throughout the whole of creation. It does not come down, now as one thing, now as another, but while remaining essentially the same, it adapts itself to the needs of every creature that receives it.

In the same way the Holy Spirit, whose nature is always the same, simple and indivisible, apportions grace to each man as he wills. Like a dry tree which puts forth shoots when watered, the soul bears the fruit of holiness when repentance has made it worthy of receiving the Holy Spirit. Although the Spirit never changes, the effects of this action, by the will of God and in the name of Christ, are both many and marvelous.

The Spirit makes one man a teacher of divine truth, inspires another to prophesy, gives another the power of casting out devils, enables another to interpret holy Scripture. The Spirit strengthens one man's self-control, shows another how to help the poor, teaches another to fast and lead a life of asceticism, makes another oblivious to the needs of the body, trains another for martyrdom. His action is different in different people, but the Spirit himself is always the same. In each person, Scripture says, the Spirit reveals his presence in a particular way for the common good.

The Spirit comes gently and makes himself known by his fragrance. He is not felt as a burden, for he is light, very light. Rays of light and knowledge stream before him as he approaches. The Spirit comes with the tenderness of a true friend and protector to save, to heal, to teach, to counsel, to strengthen, to console. The Spirit comes to enlighten the mind first of the one who receives him, and then, through him, the minds of others as well.

As light strikes the eyes of a man who comes out of darkness into the sunshine and enables him to see clearly things he could not discern before, so light floods the soul of the man counted worthy of receiving the Holy Spirit and enables him to see things beyond the range of human vision, things hitherto undreamed of.

Please Note: Due to the need to thoroughly sanitize our Churches after each Mass during this time of the pandemic, when a funeral Mass is scheduled, the daily Mass that would normally have taken place on that day is automatically canceled and the Mass intention moved to another date. Thank you for your understanding.

Cassi's Corner

As I was thinking about the amount of changes we're going through as a society, I began to reflect on how our family worked together to help our daughter adjust when we adopted her. The changes in her life were substantial.

At five years old, Kseniya had never seen past the outer perimeter of her Soviet-style orphanage, never ridden in a car, never used a toilet (the children used chamber pots), and never experienced family life. Imagine what it was like for her when strangers showed up and took her across the world where the food was unfamiliar, noises were strange, words were unknown, and animals were pets (kids were taught to fear dogs and cats). Her world had not only changed, it was completely new! How does one adapt to such an extreme change, and come out of it with such joy? My reflection broke it down into two factors: empathy and trust. She chose to trust us, and we empathized with the changes she experienced. Along with praying for grace, these got us through the turbulent, first few weeks.

Empathy and trust are what can get us through this time of uncertainty, too. If we try to empathize with each other NOT convince each other of anything – but empathize with how each is feeling and treat each other accordingly, will we not all be better for it? Likewise, we have to choose to trust that God's got our best in mind. This might mean we need to behave certain ways even when our emotions don't line up – an act of the will. In this way, the ideas that separate us become a channel of God's grace which will unite us. Practically, that might look like wearing a mask and keeping physical distance in public spaces if for no other reason than to alleviate another's concern. It also looks like surrendering to God, trusting that He already knew about this, has allowed it, and that a greater good will come from it whether you are affected directly or not. In both empathizing and trusting, God's grace will abound and we can find joy in the uncertainty.

Hybrid education. Catholic formation.

We've hired qualified instructors to teach each course on-site at our education center in West Duluth. Beginning next year we will have our classrooms set up with the technology to be "virtual" classrooms using a high tech audio and video conferencing system in order to create the best possible hybrid learning environment for both instructors and students whether on-site or remote. This new option will allow families to have the flexibility to participate remotely according to their own needs, abilities and desires.
