



From the Desk of Father Steve: Learning from the Wisdom of the Saints

There has been a lot of opportunities in recent months for us to carry crosses. I've spoken about them frequently-the death of the Bishop in December, the bankruptcy of the diocese, the pandemic, the resignation of our bishop-elect. And those are the larger scale crosses. We all also have our own individual crosses that we bear- perhaps it is chronic pain or suffering, physical disease, psychological difficulty, economic hardship, strained family relationships, guilt over past sins and failings ... the list can certainly go on.

But, I think that it is important to remember, friends, that as Christians, we refer to our sufferings, difficulties and hardships as "crosses" for a very important reason: because each difficulty we face is not just a hardship, but an opportunity; an opportunity for us to recognize that our suffering is not meaningless. For it was on the cross that Jesus suffered the most agonizing and painful death imaginable, and He took what would have been viewed by the average observer as a failure, and made it into the greatest victory in the history of the world. By His death, He has destroyed the power of death, and by His rising to new life, He has given us the opportunity to enjoy eternal life. Because of the suffering and death of the Divine Son of God, suffering and death itself are no longer meaningless- they can be united with Jesus on the cross and offered to God as a prayer. It is what the elders among us remember as being told to "offer it up." When I am suffering, especially when I have taken common sense measures to relieve it and they have not been effective, then I can offer my suffering to Jesus as a sacrifice of love for Him and His Church, praying that as Jesus' suffering and death for us on the cross brought about our salvation and reconciliation with God, so my little sacrifice of suffering, when united with His divine act of suffering, can have the power to do good in this world for myself and others.

St. Andrew of Crete was a bishop in the 8th century in Greece, and he wrote a discourse on the Holy Cross of Jesus. This past Monday, September 14, the Church celebrated the feast of the Exultation of the Holy Cross. I'd like to share a portion of his discourse with you.

We are celebrating the feast of the cross which drove away darkness and brought in the light. As we keep this feast, we are lifted up with the crucified Christ, leaving behind us earth and sin so that we may gain the things above. So great and outstanding a possession is the cross that he who wins it has won a treasure. Rightly could I call this treasure the fairest of all fair things and the costliest, in fact as well as in name, for on it and through it and for its sake the riches of salvation that had been lost were restored to us.

Had there been no cross, Christ could not have been crucified. Had there been no cross, life itself could not have been nailed to the tree. And if life had not been nailed to it, there would be no streams of immortality pouring from Christ's side, blood and water for the world's cleansing. The legal bond of our sin would not be canceled, we should not have attained our freedom, we should not have enjoyed the fruit of the tree of life and the gates of paradise would not stand open. Had there been no cross, death would not have been trodden underfoot, nor hell despoiled.

Therefore, the cross is something wonderfully great and honorable. It is great because through the cross the many noble acts of Christ found their consummation—very many indeed, for both his miracles and his sufferings were fully rewarded with victory. The cross is honorable because it is both the sign of God's suffering and the trophy of his victory. It stands for his suffering because on it he freely suffered unto death. But it is also his trophy because it was the means by which the devil was wounded and death conquered; the barred gates of hell were smashed, and the cross became the one common salvation of the whole world.

The cross is called Christ's glory; it is saluted as his triumph. We recognize it as the cup he longed to drink and the climax of the sufferings he endured for our sake. As to the cross being Christ's glory, listen to his words: *Now is the Son of Man glorified, and in him God is glorified, and God will glorify him at once.* And again: *Father, glorify me with the glory I had with you before the world came to be.* And once more: *Father, glorify your name. Then a voice came from heaven: I have glorified it and I will glorify it again.* Here he speaks of the glory that would accrue to him through the cross. And if you would understand that the cross is Christ's triumph, hear what he himself also said: *When I am lifted up, then I will draw all men to myself.* Now you can see that the cross is Christ's glory and triumph.

40 Days for Life

In 2019, 450 (79 more than 2018) precious babies were aborted at the WE Health Clinic abortion facility in Duluth. From **Sept. 23 thru Nov. 1**, you're invited to join other Christians for 40 days of prayer and fasting for an end to abortion and to give public witness by peacefully praying at the 40 Days for Life Duluth Prayer Vigil with daily hours, **8 am - 8 pm**, in the public right-of-way outside the abortion facility located in the Building for Women at **32 E. 1**st **St., Duluth**. Holy Spirit Parish tries to fill the hours on Mondays starting September 28th, but you are welcome to sign up for any hours that fit your schedule. 40 Days for Life is now a global campaign in 64 countries. Since 2007, 17,226 babies have been saved that we know of; 206 abortion workers quit their job; and 107 abortion facilities closed.
