Wednesday Youth/Family Bible Study Group



From the Desk of Father Steve: Frequently Asked Questions on Faith: Types of Sin



During Mass, we sometimes pray that God may forgive us for "what we have done and what we have failed to do." Can you explain what this means? How do we sin by not doing something?

I was recently asked this question, and it gives a good opportunity to talk about what are traditionally called "sins of commission" versus "sins of omission." The line referred to above is a part of what is called the "Confiteor," which is one of the ways that the congregation acknowledges its sins and asks for God's mercy at the beginning of each Mass. This part of Mass begins with the priest saying, "Let us acknowledge our sins and so prepare ourselves to celebrate the sacred mysteries." The priest then has a couple of options of how to lead the people in this public confession of sins. One of the options is the Confiteor,

which begins, "I confess to Almighty God, and to you my brothers and sisters, that I have greatly sinned, in my thoughts and in my words, in what I have done and in what I have failed to do..."

This phrase covers the two ways in which we sometimes sin- by actively doing something, or by failing to do something that we should. First, actively doing something that is sinful is called a sin of commission. The formal definition of "commission" is the committing of a crime. So, for example, a prosecutor during a criminal trial may state that the defendant, "Used a knife as a weapon in the commission of this crime." Sins of commission are sins in which the person actively does something that they know is wrong- murder, gossip, adultery, physical violence, disrespectful language toward one's parents, taking God's name in vain, etc. The common link that makes these sins of commission is that I used my free will to actively do something, or even think something (for example, intentionally engaging in sexual fantasy or intentionally daydreaming about harming someone) that is wrong.

On the other hand, a sin of omission is when I fail to do something that I should- I do nothing when God's law required that I must do something. Obviously, this is where we get the word, "omit", which means to leave something out. Sins of omission might seem, at first glance, to be less prevalent and less frequently committed, but that is not the case. For example, one would sin by omission if he did not attend Sunday Mass, did not honor his father and mother, did not put God first in his life, did not pray, did not help the poor as he was able, did not defend the innocent, did not speak up to defend the faith, did not observe days of fasting, etc. There are actually a lot of ways that a person could commit sin by not doing something that they know that they are supposed to do.

However, I do wonder how often people consider or examine their consciences for sins of omission. I think all of us know when we actively do something that we know is wrong. But how often do we consider or honestly examine ourselves as to whether or not we have neglected or refused to do something that we knew we should? In fact, sins of omission can potentially be very serious- Our Lord cites sins of omission as the reason why people will ultimately lose their salvation and end up going to hell at the end of time, during the final judgment. Observe these words of warning from the Lord from Matthew 25: 41-46:

"Then the Lord will say to those on his left, 'Depart from me, you accursed, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels. For I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me no drink, a stranger and you gave me no welcome, naked and you gave me no clothing, ill and in prison, and you did not care for me.' Then they will answer and say, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or ill or in prison, and not minister to your needs?' He will answer them, 'Amen, I say to you, what you did not do for one of these least ones, you did not do for me.' And these will go off to eternal punishment, but the righteous to eternal life."

Thus, in examining our consciences before the Lord, it is important for us to ask ourselves not only what we have done that we know that we should not have, but also, what have we neglected to do that we should have. And then, of course, we humbly yet confidently seek the Lord's kind mercy and forgiveness, which is always available to us in the sacrament of confession.


