## From the Desk of Father Steve: Burial and Cremation, Part III



In the last two bulletin articles, I have been discussing our faith's teaching regarding the proper care and final disposition of the bodies of the faithful who have passed away. I began by reiterating the Catholic Church's preference that the bodies of the Christian faithful who have died remain intact and be buried in sacred ground. I also discussed how the practice of cremation, while not the preferred choice of the Church, is permitted by the Church. However, such permission to cremate the bodies of the deceased members of the Christian faithful depend upon certain conditions being in place. Last week, I spoke about how in her official teaching, the Catholic Church has stated that the cremated remains of the Christian faithful are to be buried in

sacred ground which has been set aside for this purpose, i.e., a cemetery. Referring back to the Church's teaching on burial and cremation that we have recently received from the Congregation of the Doctrine of the Faith (CDF) in Rome, the reason for the necessity of burying cremated remains in a cemetery are to ensure that the faithfully departed "are not excluded from the prayers and remembrance of their family or the Christian community. It prevents the faithful departed from being forgotten, or their remains from being shown a lack of respect, which eventuality is possible, most especially once the immediately subsequent generation has too passed away. Also it prevents any unfitting or superstitious practices."

The CDF then addresses several practices that have become popular in secular society but which are at odds with what we believe as Catholics and, therefore, must be avoided. First, it is expressly prohibited for the cremated remains of a member of the faithful departed to be either separated and distributed to multiple people or places, or to be scattered. They must be kept together and buried in sacred ground. The CDF is quite clear in this respect: "In order that every appearance of pantheism, naturalism or nihilism be avoided, it is not permitted to scatter the ashes of the faithful departed in the air, on land, at sea or in some other way, nor may they be preserved in mementos, pieces of jewelry or other objects."

The CDF also states, "The conservation of the ashes of the departed in a domestic residence is not permitted." This has become more common in recent years, especially between spouses. That is, the practice has developed in which when one spouse passes away, the surviving spouse will keep the cremated remains of their deceased spouse in their possession at home until they themselves pass away, with the intention of being buried together. As much as this practice may have real sentimental motivation, it is actually not in accordance with what we as Catholics believe about death, burial and the afterlife. It is important that the entire funeral rites and prayers be offered for the soul of the Christian who has died, and when the ashes are kept until a later date, the prayers and rites offered at the cemetery are denied that soul until an unknown later date, and thus the celebration of their funeral remains incomplete. Keeping the ashes of loved ones at home also results in a significant lack of closure in a spiritual sense, as well as in a psychological and emotional sense for the surviving spouse. It is essential to remember that the most significant, most loving act that one spouse can do for their deceased spouse is to allow them to have a complete Christian burial, and to pray for their souls. This is, therefore, an encouragement from our Church to let go of practices that our society might think are important for sentimental reasons in favor of doing that which our faith in Christ teaches us is of greatest importance: praying for the dead.

I know that some of the teachings of the CDF in this regard may be challenging to us, especially because the death of a loved one is such a source of grief and pain. But it is of the greatest importance that in that pain, we cling most heartily not to that which the world says will bring us peace, but what God has revealed will bring us His peace which is beyond all understanding. I close with a brief story from the life of St. Monica, the mother of St. Augustine.

St. Monica became ill while she and St. Augustine and his brother were traveling in a foreign country. St. Augustine describes her final moments before death, and her attitude encapsulates how the Christian should view death. "The day was now approaching when my mother Monica would depart from this life. We were overwhelmed with grief, but she held her gaze steadily upon us, and spoke further: 'Here you shall bury your mother.' I remained silent as I held back my tears. However, my brother haltingly expressed his hope that she might not die in a strange country but in her own land, since her end would be happier there. When she heard this, her face was filled with anxiety, and she reproached him with a glance because he had entertained such earthly thoughts. Thereupon she said to both of us, "Bury my body wherever you will. One thing only I ask you, that you remember me at the altar of the Lord wherever you may be."
