Over the last few weeks, I've read two books that told in detail the story of Father Emil Kapaun, Catholic priest and decorated Army Chaplain from Pilson Kansas. The first one is called "The Story of Chaplain Kapaun" by Father Arthur Tonne and the second called "No Bullet Has Found Me Yet" by John Stansifer. They both relay the remarkable life this holy man of God lived. What a wonderful example he set for those he interacted with and an example that is still relevant for us today. From his early life in Pilson, his time in priestly formation, his time as a parish priest and especially the time he served as an army chaplain, he set an example of love for those he served. He served those under his care, often without a thought for his own health or welfare. Those Father encountered had nothing but praise for him. In fact, he was universally loved.
