On this day, people draw faith and inspiration from seeing that they are part of a community that boasts millions of believers and worshippers.


**HISTORY OF WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY**

John A. Dalles, a pastor from the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America (PCUSA), researched the history of this day. The origin of this day is a brainwave that came to Dr. Hugh Thompson Kerr, pastor of Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh. He came up with this idea in 1930 when he served as moderator of the General Assembly. Dr. Kerr's younger son, Rev. Dr. Donald Kerr, himself pastor emeritus of the Roland Park Presbyterian Church in Baltimore, stated that World Communion Sunday arose from the celebration at the Division of Stewardship at Shadyside. His father had attempted to bring churches together in service of Christian unity, and the idea grew from there. Initially, this idea did not take hold. Whatever celebrations there were grew only

incrementally, and people did not give this day a lot of thought. With the Second World War came an increased understanding of one's own mortality, and the spirit of this day caught hold. This day symbolized the effort of bringing the world together, in a spiritual sense, thought Kerr. This celebration was adopted in the U.S., in the period during World War II, and soon, the organization, now known as the National Council of Churches, started endorsing and promoting the event to churches worldwide, led by their leader, Jesse Moren Bader.

Many celebrations revolve around the 'Last Supper' theme when Jesus Christ broke bread with his disciples right before he was betrayed by Judas. People even partake in the universal Christian practice of baking bread.

Today, this day is celebrated the world over, bringing together the unique flavor of all denominations with a strong individual spirit, just like the world we live in.



***From Father Robert – Reflecting On Today's Gospel***

Today's gospel comes immediately after Jesus speaks some hard words to His disciples: warnings about being a stumbling block for others on the journey of discipleship. What is needed is correction, repentance, and forgiveness that is generous and uncalculating, even in aggravating circumstances. It all seems a bit too much

for the disciples, so they ask, “Increase our faith.” Quality not quantity is a cliché that we often use, seriously or frivolously, with reference to many different situations. In this one, the apostles (not the larger group of disciples) are asking Jesus for “more” faith, but Jesus responds with a qualitative image of faith: faith that is like a tiny mustard seed that the sower God plants in our heart. Buried deep, it germinates in darkness, but if we fail to tend the seed it will never break through its protective membrane and push into our lives. When disciples do live by faith, even “mustard seed faith,” they can continue to do extraordinary things like persisting in the forgiveness about which Jesus has just spoken in the verse preceding the Bible text.

To impress us with this truth, Jesus uses another image: an uprooted mulberry tree. These trees can grow up to seventy feet high, and their root system is extraordinarily invasive. Those of us who have coped with root damage to plumbing systems would appreciate the first-century Palestinian law that prohibited the planting of mulberry trees near cisterns. Using exaggeration to make His point, Jesus says that the word of a disciple empowered with mustard seed faith would be able to lift up a mulberry tree and transplant it into the sea! Such is the metaphorical strength that God bestows on the person of faith, even in impossible, ridiculous situations.

Our faith is to be the faith of “salves,” not in the abusive sense, but in the way that Paul refers to himself as “a slave of Christ Jesus, called to be an apostle and set apart for the gospel of God” (Romans 1:1). Since Jesus’ audience comprises those who are to be the apostolic leaders of communities, the parable of the Master and Servant is directed first to them and then, by further extension, to all Christians. The servant’s duties are

described as shepherding, plowing, and serving his master at table. The ministry of Christian leaders is to care for their flocks, plow the field of their communities to make them ready for the sowing of God’s Word, and feed their people at the Lord’s table. There is to be no self-adulation or congratulations, no expectation of special rewards or entitlements, no elevation of themselves to domineer over “their flock,” as this always belongs to the Master. Such servants are to consider themselves unworthy of any special reward, because what they do is to be expected of them in response to the grace of God that has been so generously given to them. A significant title of the bishop of Rome is “servant of the servants of God.”

A lack of humility can result in leaders who become self-righteous and adopt an attitude of spiritual superiority that hinders their shepherding and serving of the Christian community and that makes it difficult for the “little ones,” especially, to approach and trust them. No disciple is exempt from personal sinfulness and immersion in the sin of the world. To judge ourselves as more worthwhile, more deserving than others puts us under the judgment of God. In the center of this parable is the master’s table, at the center of our lives, at this Sunday Eucharist, is the table before which, presider and people together, we profess, “Lord, I am not worthy.” For our integrity as disciples, our lives must witness what our lips proclaim.



***Questions for Further Reflection and Meditation***

Have you ever prayed for an increase in faith? Is it part of your regular prayer practice? Why or why not?

Reflect on Thomas Merton's words, "I believe that the desire to please You does in fact please You." Do you desire to please God?

Is an increase in faith the result of your decision, or the grace of God? Which do you think you rely on more? Which do you think is more important to you at this moment in your life?

What is a "hard heart"? What do you do to ensure that your heart remains "soft?"

The Sacristan prepares for the celebration of the liturgy by placing the vessels needed on the Credence Table and makes sure that everything that is needed for the celebration of the liturgy is ready and in place. At the conclusion of the liturgy, the Sacristan removes the vessels, the Lectionary, the Presider's Book and the Lector's Binder and replaces them in the Sacristy, makes sure that the vessels have been purified, dried, and put away until the next time they are used, extinguishes the candles at the Altar and Ambo, turns off the lights, locks the main doors to the church, and makes sure the building is secured. The

Sacristan may be either a woman or man, or several people to alternate the duties each week. If you would be interested in this ministry, please contact me. The necessary training will be provided. Many thanks for considering this ministry, especially as we approach our annual Ministry Fair.



## Fire Department Chaplaincy

On July 1, 2022, East Contra Costa Fire Protection District (ECCFPD) was consolidated with Contra Costa County Fire Protection District (CCCFPD). Since 2016, Father Robert has served as the Chaplain for the firefighters, their families, and the Staff of ECCFPD. This past Wednesday morning, a meeting was held at the headquarters of CCCFPD to bring together all those who are involved in and providing Honor and Dignity to the firefighters, their families, retirees, and staff of the newly-expanded and consolidated fire district.

At the conclusion of that meeting, Fr. Robert was presented with a shadow box containing photographs of his time as Chaplain of ECCFPD as well as one of the Ceremonial Axes used by the Honor Guard for many events, observances, and funerals during his time as Chaplain. As the plaque indicates, it is given in gratitude for Fr. Robert's presence and ministry to the members of the fire district and is a singular honor to be presented with one of the four Ceremonial Axes.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Fr. Robert was informed that CCCFPD intends to have the Honor and Dignity Committee in place by January 1, 2023 that will include Peer Support, Critical Incident Stress Management, and Chaplaincy with Father Robert becoming their First Chaplain in the history of the District.




