**THE SECOND SUNDAY IN
WINTER'S ORDINARY TIME**

From Father Robert – Reflecting On The Gospel

The scripture passages for this Sunday are rather like a hinged door. The Lectionary pushes it open to allow us to gaze backward at the significant figure of John the Baptist, who points to the One we have celebrated as coming among us in the flesh in the Advent and Christmas seasons. And these same readings also direct our gaze forward to our ongoing call to be servants of God among the nations for the long haul of Ordinary Time. The number of Sundays between the Baptism of the Lord (also called the First Sunday in Winter's Ordinary Time) and the First Sunday of Lent varies each year, depending on the date on which Lent begins.

What is stressed in today's readings is appropriate as we move out of festal high points: we are called, in all seasons, every day, to live what we are by the grace of God: chosen and gifted people.

In the gospel we meet John the Baptist once again, who also knew his place in salvation history. He sees Jesus coming toward him and points Him out as "the lamb of God, Who takes away the sins of the world." Those listening to John, including those sent from the Pharisees, would be sensitive to the Hebrew biblical, cultic, and liturgical symbol of the lamb, which recalled both the messianic Suffering Servant tradition and the Passover Lamb in the history of Israel's deliverance. Gathered as a eucharistic assembly, we affirm our faith in the One to Who John pointed, Who is coming to us not on the Jordan's banks but as the center of our liturgy: the Lamb of God Who, by His life, death, and resurrection, has taken away the sin of the world. The gospel refers to "sin," to the collective brokenness and sinfulness of the world, not to individual sins, and to the collective social and structural evil that will be arrayed against Jesus by His enemies. As human beings we have solidarity in this sin.

The evangelist introduces us to John the Baptist in his prologue because the vision of the prologue is what we hear John is sent to proclaim: Jesus as the pre-existent Word, the Spirit-filled One, the Son of God. Today's reading suggests that John recognized Jesus when He came to John for baptism, unreported in this gospel. At Jesus' baptism, explains the Baptist, the Holy Spirit descended on Him and still remains with Him. John the Baptist's mission was always to point to Jesus, never to himself. The last words that the Baptist speaks later in the Fourth Gospel sum up his calling: "He must increase; I must decrease." Our discipleship, too, without possessiveness, without blocking the view of Jesus, most point others to the One Who is "coming toward" them. We all need the humility of John the Baptist that recognizes that when we are acting prophetic; it is not our cause,

our actions, our self-image, but God's about which we are witnessing.



Living Liturgy – Becoming Witnesses

Today we are called to witness Jesus, which is no ordinary undertaking. There is a beautiful tapestry by John Nava hung over the baptismal font at the Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels in Los Angeles. What is captivating about this piece of art is its simultaneous simplicity and grandeur depicting the baptism of Jesus. The simple image is one of John the Baptist (facing the viewer) pouring water on the bowed head of Jesus whose back is to the viewer. The central tapestry of this five-paneled monochromatic work is profoundly ordinary in its portrayal of the sacrament yet the message of mission and identity that it proclaims is far from ordinary.

Baptismal identity is not only about a conversion to Jesus but a witnessing to the world in the light of Jesus. Baptism sends us out to claim our identity as Christians who imitate Jesus as light to the nations. Christian witness first requires the humility of Jesus. We bow to whatever God calls us to. God has chosen us. Witness does not always involve grand gesture but can be simple acts. Teresa of Calcutta's witness to the poorest of the poor in Calcutta reminds us that little by little the work of God gets done through us, inspiring the saying: "We

can do no great things, only small things with great love."

These days of Winter's Ordinary Time ought to be filled with extraordinary witness. The "ordinary" only refers to the ordering of weeks between the seasons of Advent and Christmas, Lent and Easter. It does not refer to a diminished quality of the liturgy. And, so, we recognize the importance of our everyday actions in witnessing our Christian faith with joy and humility.



Questions for Further Reflection, Meditation, and Sharing

How might you imitate John the Baptist's mission of making Jesus known?

What are some of the moments of calling you've experienced in your life? How did you identify God's voice?

When we think of "God's will" we often focus on big decisions like our state in life and our career. But God's will is more often lived out in the small, ordinary choices we make every day. Where might God be calling you to greater holiness amidst the mundane realities of your life?

Justice Corner by Carolyn Krantz, Pastoral Associate

Do you think of yourself as “a light to the nations?” Most of us can barely see ourselves as a little beam at the end of each day, but that is what Isaiah has God saying, “I will make you a light to the nations.” Maybe if we think about the celebrations we have experienced together during the Christmas season, we can see this parish as a light in the midst of the ravaging of the floods in California and violent acts we have

experienced during early January. We pray that we may be a sign of God's presence in East County throughout the year.

But we do not do it by ourselves. We need to act as a community to bring justice forward and lessen the violence in our world. We begin to do this when we say with Psalm 40: “God is my delight and your law is within my heart.” We do this when we acknowledge that we are called to be holy in Jesus, as St. Paul says in the Epistle. We are not holy on our own account, but because Jesus gives us His grace. Our response must be to listen, give thanks and act justly in love.

When life is busy, but suddenly there is a moment of peace, do we have the courage to go within and give that moment to the Lord? Do we recognize the moments of grace when we have a moment of prayer and do we say “thank you?”

The Gospel again takes us to the beginning of Jesus' ministry. Here, John has been advised by the Holy Spirit to recognize Jesus' authority by the presence of that Spirit. We, too, can recognize God's action in our lives by reflecting on the Presence of the Spirit. Where did you manage to say the right thing in a difficult situation? Where did you have the courage to remain silent when someone attacks you verbally? Where did you act to defend the poor and disenfranchised? In these moments, God is making you a “light to the nations.”


I remember a speaker who when asked a difficult question, paused and went within before responding, when I would have burst out with an answer. Can we learn to do that? Try next time you are confronted by an angry family member to pause before answering. Find the Spirit (the light) within before responding, or pause and take it to

prayer and give the response the next day.

The Gospel for today tells of Jesus confirmation. John knows it is Jesus because of the Spirit's presence. You can recognize yourself as God's child when you recognize and give thanks for the Spirit in your daily actions. So it is important to acknowledge when you say the right thing, or give the right advice. Our hearts are filled with longing for peace and unity. We long for the courage to act and speak as Jesus would. Peace in conflicting situations only come through prayer. We must wait for God's inspiration. We must challenge unjust actions and support those who offer ways to change.

In 2023, after three years of illness and the destruction of many parts of our beautiful California, we cannot go back to the way things were. We must invent a new way of acting. We are heralds of the church of the future, a church that resembles companions on the road bringing the love and light of Christ to all we meet.

God never leaves us on our own if we humbly seek His/Her guidance in our lives. By Baptism we are all anointed in His grace. It is by being in touch with that grace that we find peace. We must listen to those deep whisperings in our hearts. We must share those whisperings with others to find the road through 2023.






